Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present the Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year 1967, concerning the sanitary circumstances, administration and vital statistics of the district. It has been prepared according to instructions contained in the Ministry of Health Circular 1/68, dated 2nd January, 1968.

As you are aware, your Medical Officer of Health during the period in question was the late Dr. Segerdal, who had acted in that capacity for many years and whose death took place in April, 1968, a few weeks after the cessation of his appointment with you. Nearly all the statistics presented have been derived from records kept by him. I know it was his practice to give a short, but interesting and useful, account of the general health services in the area. I understand that no changes in these took place during 1967 so that the information contained in his last Annual Report still stands and it has not been thought necessary to repeat it here. One anticipates that, if opportunity offers, further comment will, in due course, be made on these matters.

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I have no doubt it would have been Dr. Segerdal's wish that thanks should be extended to Mr. Curtis, the Chief Public Health Inspector, to Mr. Farley and Mr. Batteson, the Additional Public Health Inspectors, to the staff of the Public Health Department, to the other officers of the Authority for their help and co-operation, and to the members of the Council for their consideration, and it affords me great pleasure to do this on his behalf.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

It gives me great pleasure to present this, my 14th Annual Report, being the Report for the year 1967.

The routine work of the department continued, but again much time had to be given to remedying the effects of mining subsidence, the worst hit area during the year being the Ramscliff Avenue housing site - houses, drains, sewers and pumping station being badly affected.

Although the Slum Clearance programme, as such, is virtually ended, individual houses continued to be found which have gradually deteriorated, are unfit for human habitation, and cannot be made fit at reasonable expense. A total of 316 dwellings have been dealt with formally since we started the Slum Clearance campaign in addition to houses demolished informally.

Steady progress was made with house modernisation; with a few exceptions all owners in the district have now been written to and advised as to how they can obtain grants and loans for this purpose. Plans were forwarded to each of the owners showing various ways of modernising typical houses.

New legislation introduced during the year included the Civic Amenities Act, 1967, and the Meat Inspection (Amendment) Regulations. The Civic Amenities Act is intended to help to preserve areas of special architectural or historic value, and to improve amenities generally. The Meat Inspection (Amendment) Regulations enable Local Authorities to fix hours during which slaughtering can be carried out.

FOOD HYGIENE (MARKET STALLS AND DELIVERY
VEHICLES) REGULATIONS, 1966.

The above legislation came into operation on January 1st, 1967, and is intended to raise the standard of Food Hygiene on market stalls, and vehicles which come under the heading of stalls, (e.g. mobile shops, etc.) and delivery vehicles.

Prior to the Act coming into operation letters were sent to all persons who retail food from vehicles, and by the end of the year most of the vehicles complied with the requirements of the Regulations.

THE MEAT INSPECTION (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS,
1966.

The above Regulations came into operation on September 30th, 1966, and the owners of both slaughterhouses in the district were consulted regarding the control of the hours of slaughter. The Council decided that slaughtering hours should be limited to 7.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m., Mondays to Fridays only. An appeal was made by one of the butchers to the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. The Ministry upheld the Council's decision.

MEAT INSPECTION - CARCASSES INSPECTED AND
CONDEMNED.

There has been a considerable reduction in the number of pigs slaughtered. This is due to one of the butchers having difficulty in getting staff during the early part of the year, and the outbreak of Foot and Mouth Disease was a contributory factor.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Tipping continued in the old cutting off Stoney Lane, Coleorton; in the Canal bed at Measham and off Measham Road, Donisthorpe.

Bins are emptied at intervals of $6\frac{1}{4}$ working days, but this period has to be extended for absence of workmen due to sickness, holidays, vehicle breakdown, etc.

Pans are emptied at weekly intervals.

The search for additional tipping space continued during the year. During the year, at the request of the Ministry, a meeting was held between this Authority and others to consider a joint scheme for burning refuse. The scheme was being promoted by the Swadlincote U.D.C. and Repton R.D.C. It was agreed by the Council that they would be a member of a Study Group to consider the scheme.

The Council instructed me to discuss with any interested, immediately adjoining, Authority the possibility of a joint disposal scheme.

An area of land suitable for tipping purposes was found in the Lount area, and at the year end the District Valuer had been asked to negotiate a purchase price with the owners and an application made for planning permission. If it is finally agreed that this purchase be completed, after negotiations have been completed, the scheme would be a joint one with the Ashby-de-la-Zouch U.D.C.

An order was placed for a Dennis Paxit IIIA Continuous Loader refuse collection vehicle following demonstrations by the manufacturers of four different types of machine to replace the Karrier Side Loader on the Measham side of the district.

The Council gave instructions for a scheme to be submitted to them setting out the implications and cost of providing a weekly refuse collection service.

Vandalism continued to be a source of nuisance and required the expenditure of £215 during the year.

During the year legislation required that lighting, other than footway lighting, should become the responsibility of the County Council. There was considerable argument as to what was meant by footway lighting and this had not been cleared up at the end of the year.

I again wish to thank you, Mr. Chairman and Members of the Council, for your courtesy and consideration during the year; express my appreciation for the ever ready co-operation of the Clerk of the Council, Accountant and the Housing Manager, and to thank the members of my own staff for their diligence and conscientiousness.
