

Births.

The birth rate at 16.9 is higher than that for the country as a whole, (16). About one seventh of the births registered took place at home within the district and the percentage of illegitimate live births at 6 was lower than the figure for England and Wales at 8.

Deaths.

The death rate at 11.6 is just below the national rate, (11.7), and much below last year's rate of 14.2. Two fifths of the deaths occurred outside the district and 66 were of persons over 75 years.

Infantile Mortality.

Two babies under 1 year died, one at home and one in hospital, the deaths being due to an upper respiratory infection and congenital abnormality respectively. The infantile mortality rate at 9 was just half that for England and Wales and as a matter of fact all the rates, (with one exception), relating to infant deaths were well below the corresponding rates for the whole country.

MEALS ON WHEELS.

The usual visiting of applicants for the Meals on Wheels service continued, in the course of which 30 visits were paid and 23 applications were approved. Towards the end of the year the Council agreed to recommend that as from 1st Nevember, 1970, the subsidy per meal be increased from 1/6d to 2/6d, bringing the total cost of the meal up to 3/6d, one shilling being collected from each recipient, your Council contributing 1/3d and the County Council a like amount.

Consideration was given to the possibility of extending the service to the villages of Appleby Magna, Heather, Newton Burgoland, Swepstone, Snarestone and Osgathorpe, and, as a first step, the names of persons who might qualify were sought. As a result 42 additional visits were paid and the following recommendations made:-

To the Chairman and Members of the Rural District Council of Ashby-de-la-Zouch.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in again presenting my Annual Report for your consideration. The year has been one of steady progress; there have been the usual problems due to mining subsidence, although not quite to the extent of previous years. We have endeavoured to speed up house improvement, particularly with the aid of standard and improvement grants, and we have taken every opportunity to press owners of property to take advantage of these. This is the first year during which it has not been possible to report the completion of at least some Council houses, but it is a fact that a number of small sites in various villages will be developed during the coming year, detailed plans being prepared by your consultant architects at the present time. It is at least pleasant to know that we have made a start on putting our own house in order by the preparation of schemes to modernise all the pre-war Council houses and that work has been completed on a small number of these.

At long last the scheme for providing sewers in the village of Coleorton has been prepared in some detail and one can envisage the abolition of the pan closets situated immediately outside the back doors of 44 Council houses in this village. The only other "built up" area in the district with pails immediately at the rear of the property - Acresford - will soon be free of these, sewers having been laid, the pumping station erected and only the delivery of the pumps is now awaited.

Electricity is supplied to each van and is paid for by meter.

Some difficulty was experienced in dealing with persons occupying vans on the verges of one length of road.

A total of 28 visits were made. The total number of licensed sites in the district is 27.

PREVIENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

The early months of this year saw a continuation of the co-ordination of rodent control measures between the Urban and Rural areas, and steps were taken to encourage farmers to carry out rodent control measures on their farms. Measures were also taken to establish permanent baiting sites on Authority's tips or allotments, and to arouse a similar interest in the treatment of fringe properties on the outskirts of villages. These measures have met with some success.

As far as it can be ascertained there has been no indication of Warfarin resistant rats.



OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963.

The administration of the Act was maintained throughout the year at this Authority and some 142 inspections were made with at least one general inspection to each premise. No accidents were notified as is required by Section 48 of the Act, but steps were taken to bring this requirement to the notice of the occupiers whenever a visit was made to their premises. Since the offices and shops in this area are small in size, as a general rule, and have few employees, it is quite possible that no accidents have occurred which should be reported to the Local Authority.

The enforcement of the Offices, Shops and Railway Premises (Hoists and Lifts) Regulations, 1969, has posed no problems since there are only two lifts within the meaning of the Regulation in the District. One of these is an electrically operated lift in a food premise, whilst the other is at the offices of the National Coal Board which they do not require and which they have deliberately made inoperable.

General.

A total of 302 Improvement Grants and 457 Standard Grants have now been approved to the owners of properties in the Rural district, and detailed discussions held with many owners who have been informed that grants will be recommended to the Council. We have now had a full year's experience of the working of the Housing Act, 1969, which, amongst other things, increases the amount payable by way of Improvement Grant from £400 to £1,000, and which allows substantial items of repair to rank for grant. In actual fact, grants made by the Council during the year have fallen between these two figures.

A Local Authority may now give Improvement Grant where two houses are converted into one, provided that they are satisfied that neither house is, by itself, capable of improvement, or that the conversion of two into one would make a real contribution to the particular needs of the district by providing larger houses. Each case must be considered on its merits. In the past Standard Grants could only be given where the house would be provided with a bath in a bathroom, but, if it is not reasonably practicable to do this, grant can now be given where the bath is provided in some other part of the dwelling, provided that this is not a bedroom.

The greatest difficulty has arisen not, as was expected, in trying to decide which items should count as repairs eligible for grant, but, rather, whether or not the cost of total repair, modernising, extension and improvement approaches the cost of a new dwelling offering comparable accommodation. Grant applications now seem to refer to dwellings where much more extensive works are being carried out than formerly.



Visits were made to all the food premises in the district throughout the year in an effort to raise the standard of food hygiene practice. Progress in this field is slow since it is often the case that people obtain situations in the food trade or take over a food business without any previous training and do not always realise the possibilities of contamination of food. When contamination of food by organisms which may contain disease can only be seen under a microscope it is difficult to impress upon the persons concerned the real source of the danger, and the need for subsequent scrupulous cleanliness in the handling and preparation of food in all circumstances.

Visits have been made throughout the year to the Knacker's yard in this district in connection with the above Regulations concerning unsound meat for the consumption by animals.


MEAT INSPECTION - CARCASES INSPECTED AND CONDEMNED.

100% meat inspection is carried out at both of the claughterhouses in the district and the number of animals slaughtered has remained approximately the same as last year.

The periodical visits made by the Veterinary Surgeon of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food have been increased to quarterly instead of half yearly. The purpose of the visits is to inspect the standard of hygiene at the actual slaughterhouse. 

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

The refuse tips in the villages of Coleorton and Measham continued to be used throughout the year. No tipping of household refuse was carried out at the tip at Donisthorpe.

During demonstrations of mechanical equipment at the proposed Lount tip it was found that coal outcrops at, or near, the surface and that one seam is exposed where surface workings have been carried out in the past. This gave rise to considerable concern because of fire danger, and, following discussion with representatives of the Opencast Coal Executive, it was agreed by a sub-committee of the Public Health Committee set up to deal with all matters relating to this tip that an application be made for planning permission to work three seams and extract about 25,000 tons of coal from the site. It was also agreed that a nominated contractor apply for a license to extract the coal. At the year end it was not clear whether or not a license would be granted because of the fear of the National Coal Board Deep Mine organisation that water from this site night gain access to deep mine workings.

The County Council work study team submitted a scheme for consideration by this Council with a view to improving, and possibly making cheaper, the refuse collection service. This, however, has not, as yet, been considered by the sub-committee set up to deal with this matter.

When the work of reconstructing the sewage works at Ravenstone has been completed all night soil will be disposed of at these works, and we should be able to discontinue the present practice of dumping night soil on the lagoons constructed at one refuse tip and at the Swannington old sewage works site.
