To the Chairman and Members of the Urban District Council of Ashington.

Mr. Chairman and Councillors,

I have the honour to present to you the report of the Medical Officer of Health and the Chief Public Health Inspector for 1971.

Dr. K. Dick retired in August 1971, and I would like to pay tribute to the work she has preformed during her term of office. This in fact should be credited as her final annual report.

Population The population fell again from 25,390 in 1970 to 25,300 in 1971. (Registrar General's estimate). These figures are accurate, following the census in 1970.

Births The number of registered live births was 510 - an increase of 47 over 1970 giving a crude birth rate of 20.1 per 1,000 estimated population (E. & W. 16.0) and an adjusted rate of 20.9 per 1,000 estimated population (E. & W. 16.0).

Deaths There were 324 deaths during 1971, this is 35 fewer than in 1970 and gives a crude death rate of 12.8 per 1,000 estimated population (E. & W. 11.6) and an adjusted death rate of 14.9 per 1,000 estimated population (E. & W. 11.6).

There were 11 deaths of infants under 1 year - 4 fewer than in 1970, giving an infant mortality rate of 21.5 per 1,000 live births (E. & W. 18.0). This is a considerable improvement but still above the figure for England and Wales.

Infectious Disease There were only 8 cases of infectious disease notified during the year. This must be a record for this district. There were 2 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis, 2 cases of non-pulmonary tuberculosis and 1 case each of food poisoning, scarlet fever, Measles and infective hepatitis.

The food poisoning case was in a child and the diagnosis was made too late to trace the source of the infection.

I would like to thank all members of the health department staff for their co-operation and help during my first four months as Medical Officer and to my colleagues in other departments for their courtesy, consideration and assistance.

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SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

General

The abatement of nuisance was as usual achieved mainly by informal action, and in respect of only four premises was it necessary to serve Statutory Notices.

Inspections were carried out in connection with all Improvement Grant applications and necessary repairs were carried out before the grants were approved. These repairs have been included in the tables.

A total of 190 houses were improved during the year, of which 145 were by Discretionary Grant, 23 by Standard Grant and 21 were Council houses.

One General Improvemnt Area, consisting of 94 houses (the Council owned Garden City Villas) was declared, and the systematic area improvement by the National Coal Board in co-operation with the Council was still proceeding.

Under Part III of the Housing Act 1969, three qualification certificates were granted and two applications refused, and one certificate of provisional approval was granted.

No applications for certificates of Disrepair under the Rent Act 1957 were made during the year.

Water Supply

The water supply to the area is provided by Tynemouth Corporation from Fontburn and Tosson to Hebron Reservoir, and by gravity main to Ashington, with an additional supply provided by the Coquet Water Board.

No alterations or additions to the distribution system were necessary during the year.

The storage tank at Bothal Village was by-passed throughout the year by a temporary direct mains connection.

Thirty nine water samples were taken for bacteriological examination, all of which were reported to be satisfactory.

Sewerage

The length of trunk sewer in the Summerhouse Lane area, found to be damaged by mining subsidence, was re-laid during the year.

A length of sewer was laid in the Lintonville area, discharging into a tank which will be emptied regularly, and eliminate the necessity for chemical closets in two more premises.

Swimming Baths

The swimming baths belong to the Ashington Miners' Welfare Institute, but are available to the general public as well as to Institute Members, and are open all year round.

The water used is from the main water supply and is treated by continuous chlorination and filtration.

Nine bacteriological samples of the baths were taken during the year, and all samples were reported to be satisfactory.

Regular sampling and testing is also undertaken by the Scientific Department of the National Coal Board in Ashington and copies of the reports are made available to this Department.

Schools

There are 13 Primary Schools in the district (7 Junior and 6 Infant) 6 Secondary Schools, a Grammar School, Technical College, Seniors Practical Instruction Centre, and a Training Centre for Handicapped Children.

The Hirst East Secondary Modern School was extended by 100 places, housed in temporary buildings across the road.

An additional 330 County High School places are proposed.

Cinemas and Public Buildings

Routine inspection of such buildings was carried out during the year.

Atmospheric Pollution

The installation of room heaters in Council Houses, which was abandoned in favour of fan-assisted open fires when a shortage of smokeless fuel was predicted, has not been resumed, though the threatened shortage never really materialised as far as Sunbrite was concerned.

While the improved open fires are approved appliances in that they are capable of burning coke, some of them will only burn the more re-active, and more expensive

Atmospheric Pollution (Cont'd.)

solid fuel. As long as tenants are given the option of bruning coal or coke, most of them will burn coal, being the cheapest, and ignore the long-term effect of the hazard to health and environment caused by smoke,

As long as we continue to install coal burning appliances, we are not only failing to contain or reduce domestic air pollution, but are encouraging it.

The joint operation, with Alcan Ltd., of monitoring equipment has continued, and should provide an excellent comparison of "before and after" measurements once the smelter plant comes into operation.

Fouling of Footways by Dogs.

We still receive complaints of dogs fouling paths, verges and grassed areas, particularly on open plan estates.

While a dog catcher and dog warden are now employed, the practice of allowing dogs to stray is so prevalent that it is difficult to control. Unfortunately, complainants are rarely prepared to identify the offending dogs and owners when fouling occurs and we consequently have not yet been able to take proceedings.

Rodent Control

Although the number of complaints was higher than last year, the number of actual infestations was less and necessary treatments were successfully carried out.

There was again a seasonal influx towards the end of the year when rats tend to move into more densely populated areas because of lack of food in natural habitats.

During the year surveys were again carried out of areas likely to harbour rodents, and refuse tips were treated at regular intervals. These regular surveys and treatments resulted in the early elimination of infestations and this shows in the relatively small number of infestations within the town.

No charge is made for the treatment of Council Houses, though private occupiers pay for Disinfestor's time and for the insecticide used.

A very high number of complaints of clover mite was received, mainly from the West End Estate, and presumably due to the mild winter. Normal spraying had little effect, and it was found necessary to remove a strip of grass at the base of the houses, leaving the soil rough turned, and then again spraying walls and windows.

This treatment was very successful, but it may be necessary to retain this soil barrier round the houses for a number of years in order to clear the mite completely.

No complaints of mosquito bites were received during the year, and though likely breeding grounds were examined, no larvae were found.

Pet Animals Act

One licence to sell Pet Animals was granted to a stall holder in the closed market.

Riding Establishments Act 1964 and 1970.

There is one riding establishment in the area, and following the submission of the Vetinary Surgeon's report, the licence was renewed for a further twelve months, but the licensee was informed that it would not be again renewed unless the buildings were brought to the standard required by the 1970 Act.

Refuse Collection and Disposal.

The second phase of the bonus scheme was introduced in May on the delivery of the two new Revopak collection vehicles. This reduced the collection frequency to once per week, except for premises with limited bin storage and certain trade premises. The number of collection vehicles was reduced from five to three.

The teams did not settle down on this scheme, but had to work overtime to complete the schedules, and further work study was carried out, resulting in a new bonus offer, which was finally accepted in December.

It was hoped that the revised scheme would operate satisfactorily.

Collections of bulk refuse were carried out in overtime, and during the year we dealt with 798 requests for the removal of furniture, cookers, cycles etc., all of which were collected free of charge,

The removal of derelict and abandoned vehicles was secured, mainly by informal action after the owners had been traced.

The refuse pulverising plant continued to operate satisfactorily. Break-downs occurred much less frequently, and modifications to the output conveyor, and the provision of a chimney to relieve pressure successfully eliminated the last of the regular causes of hold up in operation. The escape of dust from the plant within the building has been largely eliminated and it is hoped that a spray system to be installed next year will deal with dust resulting from the vehicles tipping into the hopper.

The remainder of the 22 acres held under the pre-1969 lease is expected to be handed back for agricultural use in January, leaving less than 7 acres in current use.

1,575 visits and inspections were made during the year in connection with refuse collection and disposal.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

Ice Cream

Six premises in the area are registered for the manufacture of ice creams though in only five of these, was ice cream manufactured during the year.

They were all inspected and were found to comply with the Ice Cream (Heat Treatment etc.) Regulations 1959, and with the Food Hygiene Regulations.

91 samples of ice cream were taken and submitted to the Public Health Laboratory.

Milk Supply

Three premises were registered as dairies and 65 persons as milk dealers. Since 1st January 1961, all milk licences have been issued by Northumberland County Council.

The County Health Department is also responsible for the taking of milk samples. 28 samples were taken during the year for bacteriological examination, and three samples failed to pass the tests.

There is one Producer Retailer in the district, and four samples of milk were taken for the Brucella Abortus Ring Test.

These were all reported to be negative.

Food Shops and Food Preparing Premises

106 premises are registered for the sale or manufacture of ice cream, and 25 for the manufacture of sausage, preserved food etc. and of these, two premises are registered for both purposes.

571 visits were made to food premises, and in addition food premises being inspected under the Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act were at the same time, dealt with under the food Hygiene Regulations.

Food Hygiene standards were found to be quite high, contraventions being generally of a minor nature.

Food and Drugs,

Regular sampling of milk and other foods is carried out in the district by the Northumberland County Council.

Details of this work have been kindly provided by Mr. C.L. Arlidge, Chief County Weights and Measures Inspector, showing that 23 milk samples and 63 samples of other foods were taken and submitted to the Public Analyst,

All samples were found to be genuine, except for one sample of imported condensed Full Cream Milk which was slightly deficient in milk solids. Representations were made to the appropriate Government Department. Meat and Other Foods

One slaughterhouse closed in July, and the three remaining slaughterhouses continued to operate and licence renewals during the year were as follows:-

Hygiene standards remained generally good and though minor defects appeared from time to time, these were quickly remedied.
