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
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

To the Chairman and Members of the Council.

GENTLEMEN,

Presenting my Report for the past year, I beg to state the industrial position in the district has not materially improved and therefore the number of unemployed is very little different from the past few years.

VITAL STATISTICS.

The Report as usual contains the extensive Summary required by the County Medical Officer of Health embracing the year's work of the Sanitary Department.

Population.—The Registrar-General's Estimate of our numbers shows again a reduction rather disconcerting to our future. The return is 19,620 against 19,820 for last year—a reduction of 200.

Birth-rate.—Referring you to Table I, Column 5, in the Report, it shows a slight increase over last year, i.e., 15'3 against 14'3 per 1,000 of the population. It is approximately an average of the last five years. The number registered is 301 comprising 160 males and 141 females. Of these, 4 males and 5 females were illegitimate.

The Births Notification Act is very satisfactorily carried out as I find no slackness on the part of the midwives, etc., in notifying the births attended within the period specified.

Appended is a list of the Notifications during each month of the year showing numbers attended by midwives and doctors.

Mortality.—Tables III and IV in the Report exhibit the mortality figures in all cases and separately for Infants under one year. Table III is the corrected return of deaths from all causes as classified by the Resistrar-General.

In the Summary will be found classified by age incidence deaths from Tuberculosis.

The number of deaths registered in the district is 215 compared with 188 during 1936 and 215 for 1935. Of these 215 five were of non-residents. On the other hand 73 deaths of residents occurred in other districts, i.e., in Hospitals, etc. Therefore the nett deaths were 215+73-5 i.e., 283, comprising 161 males and 122 females, making a death-rate of 14'4.

In order that a fair comparison with all other districts in the Country taking into consideration varying age incidence and social differences the Registrar-General multiplies this 14'4 rate by a factor, namely 1'19 called the comparability factor and this raises the nett rate to 17'1 per 1000 of the population.

The Cancer rate while diminished compared with the previous year is still high: 22 deaths from this disease (13 males and 9 females) compared with 29 for 1936.

The Table for Tuberculosis contained in the Summary shows a total of 15 deaths from this disease, the same as 1936.

Appended is the distribution of deaths in the five Wards.

Infant Mortality.—Table IV shows 21 deaths during infancy, that is during the first twelve months of life. This is an improvement on 1936 when the number was 24. The Infant death-rate equals 69 per 1000 births. The average rate for the past five years was 76. The second page of the Summary and Table I show the varying figures. 13 of these deaths were due to Prematurity, Debility at birth and Malformations. It is hoped that with ante-natal care of mothers, and Infant Welfare at the Clinics many of these losses will be avoided.

Help is given to mothers, expectant mothers and the babies through the Council's Milk Scheme and other necessary nourishments supplemented by grants from the Trustees of the Linen and Woollen Trust and other funds.

In all this Maternity and Child Welfare work I wish to thank the Ladies' Voluntary Committee for their valuable help during the year.

Infectious Diseases.—Table II gives particulars of the Notifiable Diseases showing the age incidence and prevalence in the five Wards. During the year Measles was fairly prevalent but not severely and not so as to warrant school closure. As this disease is not notifiable the only measure of the prevalence was the absenteeism of the schools. Chickenpox, also not notifiable, was fairly prevalent. With these two exceptions the district did not suffer much from these Diseases as the Table II shows.

Tuberculosis.—There has been a material reduction in the incidence of this disease as Table II and the Table in the Summary show. Number of Respiratory cases notified is 11 comprising 7 males and 4 females. Of this type in 1936 17 were notified—9 males and 8 females. Of the other type 11 were notified during the year—6 males and 5 females compared with 17 for 1936, that is 12 males and 5 females. The deaths for both types number 15—6 males and 9 females. While the number of deaths was the same in 1937 and 1936 I must point out the fact that the deaths must be correlated with previous years' notifications.

Sanitary Circumstances.—The Council has decided upon wholesale conversion from the pail to the water closet and is making conversions to the number of 300 in the present year in the Central Ward.

Arrangements have been made with the Liverpool Corporation for a greatly enlarged supply of water for this purpose. In the Summary will be found the number of conversions already made and the remaining number of pail closets.

Scavenging.—Ashbins are being substituted for ashpits.

Hospital Accommodation.—Details are in the Summary. The Ministry has now approved of the County Scheme for forming a Joint Board with Hindley, Ince, and Billinge with Winstanley for the use of the Council's Infectious Diseases Hospital for cases of Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria and Enteric in the combined area.

Housing.—There is considerable activity still in private building and the Flora Street Housing Scheme comprising over 80 houses is nearing completion. As there are at the present time before the Ministry Clearance Orders embracing 138 houses the Council are preparing Schemes to find accommodation necessary for these demolitions.

SLAUGHTER-HOUSES.
