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

TO THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF ASHTON-UNDER-LYNE.

MR. MAYOR, MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit my report on the health of the Borough for the year 1947.

The vital statistics for the year 1947 are encouraging, there has been a rise in the birth-rate of 4.1 per 1,000 over the previous five-year average, which means that the rate of bearing children has increased by 188 per annum over the five-year period 1942-46.

The crude death-rate has fallen by 1.5 per 1,000 over the corresponding period.

An absence of maternal deaths and an infantile mortality rate of 43 reflects great credit on the activities of the Maternity and Child Welfare Committee during the last ten years.

The total percentage of children of all ages who had been immunised by the close of the year remains at 58 per cent., which is not sufficiently high to banish diphtheria from the area.

DEAR SIR,

I have pleasure in submitting to you my second Annual Report of the workings of this department for the twelve months ending December 31st, 1947.

During 1947 5,294 calls were received for the use of an ambulance, as against 4,885 received in the year 1946, an increase of 8 per cent.

One baby was born in the ambulance during the conveyance of a patient in labour from her home to the County Hospital, and one child, seven months old, died in the ambulance whilst being taken to the Duchess of York's Hospital.

During the year this department answered seven emergency calls for assistance from the adjacent Ambulance Services; four from Stalybridge, one from Mossley, and two from Hyde, these calls were answered promptly under mutual aid.

AMBULANCES

At the beginning of the year this department had a fleet of five ambulances (two Humbers and three Austins). The Humbers were 12 years old, and their usefulness as ambulances was not satisfactory.

Of the three Austins, two were then 8 years old and, at the time of writing this report, they are in fair condition and in constant daily use. D.T.B. 220 has done 73,170 miles, and the road springs, both front and rear, could do with being removed and sent away for re-setting.

The third Austin was only one month old on July 1st, 1947. The second of the new Austin ambulances was delivered by Messrs. H. Lomas Ltd., and this made the fleet total six.

The two Humbers, A.T.B. 47 and A.T.B. 48 were handed to Mr. Sykes Handforth's department on December 5th, 1947, together with a large quantity of spare parts. The Log Books and Certificates of Insurance were handed to you, sir, on December 6th, 1947.

MILEAGE

The total mileage covered during the twelve months, as shown by the speedometers, was 33,779, as against 33,510 for 1946, an increase of 269 miles.

PETROL AND OIL CONSUMPTION

3,596 Gallons of Petrol were consumed for an average of 9.39 m.p.g. 35 Gallons of Oil were consumed for an average of 965 m.p.g.

GARAGE

The ambulances are now garaged at Lord Street. The transfer from the Passenger Transport Depot, Mossley Road, to Lord Street was effected at 5 p.m., on Thursday, November 27th, 1947.

The garage is an ideal building, and it is, more or less, self-contained, with a central heating plant, which has been repaired, and it is now in full working order.

The Electricians of the Passenger Transport Department have erected a 12-volt direct supply charging plant and three batteries can be charged simultaneously without being removed from the vehicles, by means of charging leads fitted with plugends and sockets on the vehicles connected direct to the battery. I consider this to be the most valuable asset in the garage equipment.

The Petrol Pump and the underground 1,000-gallon Petrol Tank are not yet in use, but I have made arrangements for the pump to be made usable, and the tank has already been pressure-tested successfully, and it is expected that within a week or so we shall have our own supply of petrol.

An application for a Licence to store Petroleum Spirit has been submitted to the Watch Committee. This has been granted, subject to the charging plant being moved 10ft. away from its present position; arrangements for this are in hand.

The exterior woodwork has all been painted, and the interior walls and woodwork have been whitewashed and/or painted.

OFFICE AND ACCOMMODATION FOR PERSONNEL

The six-roomed house, No. 23, Lord Street, has been acquired by the Corporation as an office and headquarters for the department, and it is situated almost directly opposite the garage.

The outside lavatory has been converted from a waste water to a flush type, and an inside lavatory has been put in the bathroom. Several repairs have been done by direct labour of the Corporation, and, with the exception of outside painting and some repairs to the spouting, both front and rear, which require attention, it is very well situated for its purpose as office and head-quarters.

PERSONNEL

The department is at present staffed by a Superintendent, four senior drivers, eight male and two female driver-attendants.

Mr. H. R. Goddard resigned in August, and Mrs. D. Davis also resigned in August on medical grounds, and her position has been replaced by a male driver-attendant.

Every member of the staff holds the First-Aid qualifications of the St. John Ambulance Association, and in the New Year I hope to make arrangements for them to have a refresher course on First-Aid.

SICKNESS

During the twelve months under review the number of days lost through sickness and injury leave is as follows:—

Male Staff (13) 5 days' sickness and 28 days due to accident at work. Female Staff (3) 117 days' sickness.

Notification of Births

(Public Health Act, 1936, Section 203).

The Act requires that all births occurring in the area of Ashton-under-Lyne (after the 28th week of pregnancy, whether alive or still) shall be sent to the Medical Officer of Health within 36 hours of the birth. All births occurring within the area are, therefore, notified to me whether the parent is a resident or a non-resident of Ashton-under-Lyne.

ANTE-NATAL CLINIC.

This Clinic is held every Friday afternoon, one week at Enville House Centre and the following week at Richmond Street Centre.

Fifty-one sessions were held during 1947, and 169 expectant mothers made 873 attendances.

An increasing number of patients now enter Hospitals and Maternity Homes for their confinements. Many of these do not attend the Borough Ante-Natal Clinic, but prefer to make private arrangements with the family doctor and hospital.

POST-NATAL CLINICS.

This Clinic is held on the first Monday afternoon in the month at Enville House Centre. There were 9 sessions in the year, and the number of patients who attended was 37.

ATTEMPTS TO IMPROVE THE GENERAL STANDARD OF CLEANLINESS AND HABITS AND TO COMBAT INFESTATION BY HEAD-LICE.

In accordance with suggestions from the Ministry of Health, steps were taken to improve the general standard of cleanliness in children under 5 years.

The Nurses have made early morning and late evening visits to the homes. Lethane Hair Oil has been advised in the treatment of head vermin. Where necessary, action was taken under the Scabies Order, 1941.

The Health Visitors, who are also the School Nurses, now undertake the treatment of Scabies cases.

PNEUMONIA.

There were 29 cases of Acute Primary Pneumonia notified (54 in 1946) and 2 cases (4 in 1946) of Acute Influenzal Pneumonia.

Influenza is not notifiable unless complicated with Pneumonia.

Venereal Disease

Public Health (Venereal Diseases) Regulations, 1916.

The Lancashire County Council, who administer these regulations, have a treatment centre at the Ashton-under-Lyne District Infirmary.

The following shows the work carried out at the Venereal Diseases Clinic at the Ashton-under-Lyne District Infirmary during the year 1947:—

Of the 233 new cases admitted during the year, 102 were Ashton residents. There were 70 cases found not to be V.D.

Penicillin is available for specified cases. Service cases are now reporting for continuation tests in fair number.

Scabies

The Scabies Clinic is held at the Disinfection Station, Town's Yard.

This building was originally constructed for the disinfection of Smallpox contacts, and is suitable for treating cases of Scabies. There is a Waiting Room, Bath Room, Treatment and Dressing Room and a Discharge Room. Clothes for stoving are passed through a revolving cupboard in the bathroom to the disinfector next door.

Treatments by appointment are given on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday—women and children in the mornings and men in the afternoons. A following-up Clinic is held at the School Clinic every Wednesday morning, when cases are seen by the Medical Officer.

The Health Visitors-School Nurses treat the women and children and a male attendant treats the men.

The treatment given is a bath, followed by an application of Benzyl-Benzoate Emulsion. Each patient is told to bring a change of clean clothes. Typewritten instructions are given regarding clothing and other necessary precautions. The local doctors have been notified of these arrangements.

Fresh sources of infection come into the town from time to time. By careful following up of contacts to known cases, and by treating whole families the infection has been kept down. In difficult cases, and particularly when re-infection occurs, action has been taken under the Scabies Order, 1941—to ensure the medical examination and treatment of contacts.
