There have been from all causes, both of the inhabitants in the neighbourhood, and of those belonging to Ashton-upon-Mersey who have died in other districts 91 deaths, that gives a death rate of 12.3.

There has been no epidemic during the past year, in order to prevent such as there were many cases of measles, All Saints' Schools were closed in May, and the measles did not spread.

There have been from all causes, both of the inhabitants in the neighbourhood, and of those belonging to Aston-upon-Lyrey who have died in other districts 21 deaths, that gives a death rate of 12.3. There has been no epidemic during the past year, in order to prevent such as there were many cases of measles, All children's schools were closed in May, and the measles did not spread.

and a special report is attached - in short there is the Manchester Hospital for consumption and disease of the throat. There are 100 beds at the Crossley Sanatorium, Delamere, and 50 beds at Bowdon.

Some of the beds at Delamere are charged at 2 to 3 guineas a week, others are free.

Being within seven miles of Manchester we are included in that district as far as these Institutions are concerned. For other infectious diseases, Baguley Sanatorium is for scarlet fever and diphtheria, Clayton for smallpox, and Monsal for typhoid fever.

In connection with tuberculosis no cows in this neighbourhood have been reported and no special trial of tuberculin has been made.

There are 9 cowsheds, 11 milkshops, 1 dairy; 21 inspections have been made, all has been found according to the regulations under the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Order as to lighting, ventilation and cleanliness.

No diseased meat has been reported.

There have been complaints about disagreeable smells to the north-east of the Authority - much of these undoubtedly proceeded from the river when it was very low in water owing to the very little rain in the Summer.

Members of the Council and your officials visited the two ~~sewage~~ ^{milk} farms lying on that side of the Authority, and ~~with~~ gentlemen of those respective farms, they assured us that everything possible should be done to prevent any smell proceeding from the farm.

Some of the outlying farms are supplied by wells, the water being good and the springs in the sand belt.

The River Mersey bounds the north eastern side of this district, it drains several towns in its course, the sewerage is supposed to be purified before entering the river.

The Sinderland brook is to the south and drains the upland, it was waterless during part of the Summer; it is fairly clear.

The drainage of the district is good and the sewage empties itself into sedimentary tanks and then on the land before emptying in to the River Mersey.

A few outlying farms drain into cesspools which are ventilated.

Hidden privies are emptied monthly.

Dry ashpits " " quarterly

Dustbins " " fortnightly.

Particulars of Sanitary Inspections and improvements throughout the district during the year ended 31st. December 1911.

Housing (Inspection of) Under Section 17 of the Housing & Town Planning Act 1909. 128 Houses have been inspected. Notices have been served in 41 cases which have all been complied with. 68 inspections are now before the Council including 3 cases of houses unfit for habitation. The work under this section will be proceeded with as quickly as possible and reports will be made to you as occasion requires.

Cowsheds: These have again been inspected and found to be in very fair condition. It was only necessary to call attention to small matters in 3 cases.

Slaughterhouses: These have again been found to be kept in a clean condition, and no complaint has been made.

Workshops: With one exception nothing was found to complain of in the inspections of these premises.

The total number of inspections is 265, particulars of which are to be found in the Tabular Statement attached to this report. In connection with these inspections 37 notices have been served, of which 32 have been complied with, the remainder are in hand.
