To the Chairman and Members of the Aspull Urban District Council.

Gentlemen,

I beg to submit to you my Annual Report for the year ending December 31st, 1908, together with the lists and tables required by the Local Government Board and County Council.

During the past year ten more deaths have been registered than in the previous year, consequently the Death-rate will be slightly greater. This may be accounted for to a great extent by the increase of births, which number 57 more than in 1907.

The Birth-rate which had been steadily declining for the past three or four years, is the largest of any during the past ten years.

The infectious diseases most prevalent during the year were Whooping Cough and Influenza. A few cases of Measles of a very mild type came under notice, but no deaths were recorded as due to it.

In January and February the district was visited by an extensive epidemic of Influenza. The disease was in many cases exceptionally severe, and convalescence in many instances protracted. Three deaths were attributed to it. This was followed by an outbreak of Whooping Cough, which continued from March until June, resulting in 13 deaths.

It was not found necessary to close any of the schools during the year.

The Zymotic Death-rate for the year is 2.98, the total number of deaths attributable to these diseases being 25, which is exactly the same as 1907; but, whereas in 1907 we had 7 deaths from Measles, 3 from Scarlet Fever, and one from Whooping Cough, during the past year we have had 13 deaths from Whooping Cough, and none from either Scarlet Fever or Measles.

Tables II., III., and IV. might be considered in connection with the above remarks on infectious diseases during the year.

Twenty-two cases of Scarlet Fever were reported, and these were scattered over the district, but no deaths resulted.

There were 9 cases of Enteric Fever, 4 were removed to the Sanatorium, 2 of whom died in that institution.

The cases, it will be noted, were scattered over the township, and could not be traced to any particular source. The premises and surroundings were in each instance inspected, and received attention.

Four cases of Diphtheria were reported:

Also a few cases of Erysipelas and Membranous Croup, bringing the total of notifiable diseases to 51, or 29 fewer than in the preceding year.

I would like to call your attention to the short Table VI., which contrasts the death rate of three important groups of disease. Zymotic, Pulmonary, and Tubercular. This Table points out that in every 1000 deaths 170 are due to Zymotic disease, 27 to Tuberculous disease, and 326 to Pulmonary disease such as Bronchitis and Pneumonia.

The workshops have been inspected and are clean and in good order.

The weaving shed at Dicconson Mill has been dismantled, and two new ones erected, the present sanitary arrangements will be discarded, and the erection of more commodious ones is under contemplation.

The drainage is good and the sewage is dealt with by the Wigan Authorities.

The roads and streets are undergoing steady improvement; the projected re-making of Mill Lane will much benefit the people living in that locality.

The Cowsheds and Dairies are generally satisfactory, but I propose bringing under your notice several in which I think certain alterations are desirable. The dairy at Bark Hill Farm which was reported some time ago, has not been materially altered; the floor is much below the outside ground, with no means of drainage, badly lighted and ventilated; and, in its present state not fit to be used as a dairy.

Periodical inspections of the district have been made by myself and your Inspector.

For several years I had to draw your attention to defective water supply; this I am pleased to say has been remedied. As you know the pipes were bored and cleansed with most satisfactory results.

A large accumulation was found in the pipes amounting in the aggregate to many tons. The supply is now satisfactory, and the quality of the water good. I would suggest, however, frequent flushing of the mains.

No offensive trades have been carried on during the year, and it has not been necessary to condemn any article of food exposed for sale.

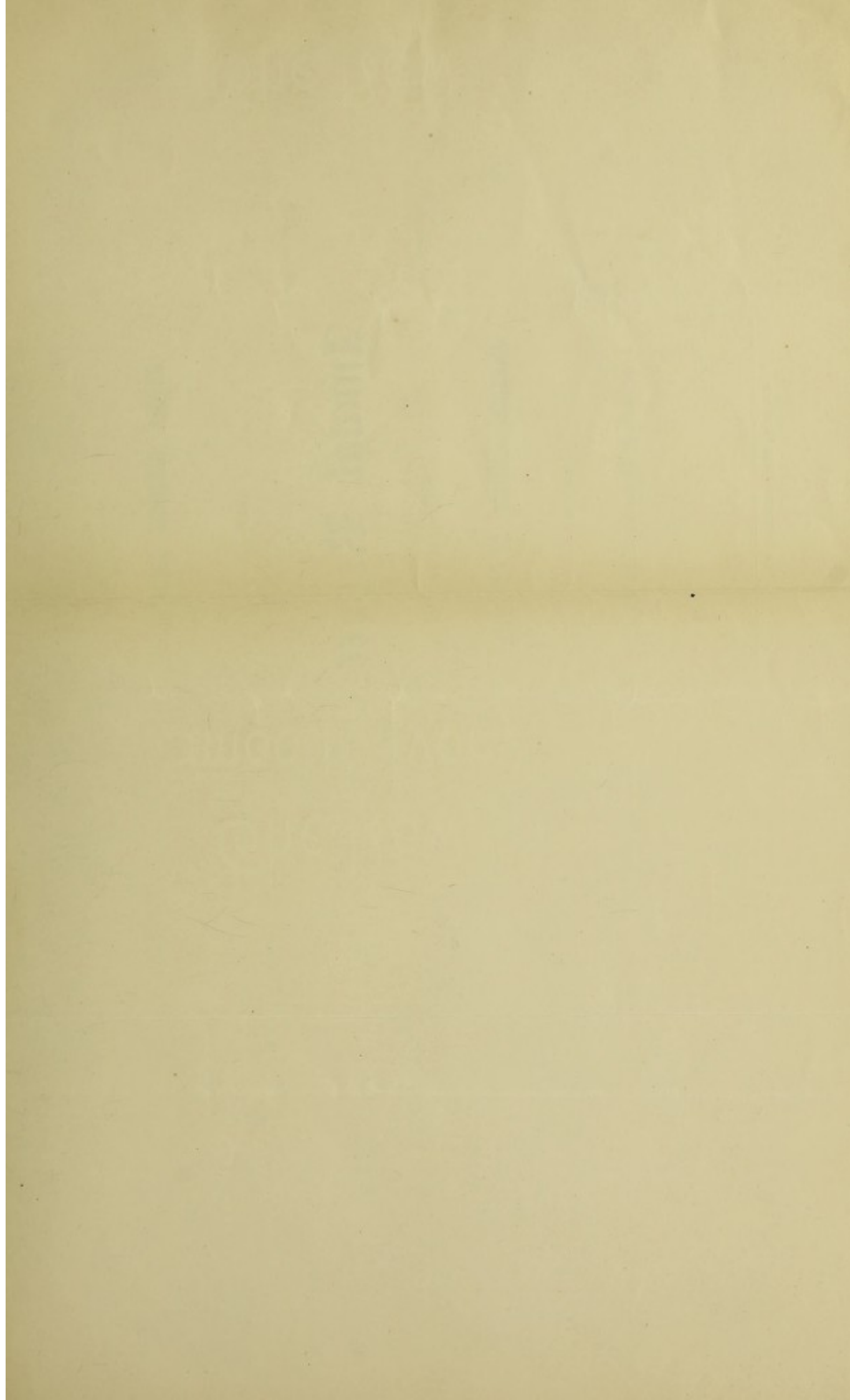
