To the Chairman and Members of the Aspull Urban District Council.

Gentlemen,-

I beg to submit my Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Administration of the Township for the year ending December, 1922, together with the various tables prescribed by the Ministry of Health and the Lancashire County Council.

The Report is based on a scheme sent by the Ministry of Health.

GENERAL STATISTICS.

The area of the Township is 1,906 acres.

Its population in 1921 was 7,851.

The estimated population for 1922 is 8,136.

The number of inhabited houses is 1,670, containing 6,627 rooms.

Number of families or separate occupiers 1,806.

Rateable value of the Township is £24,759 15s. 0d., and a penny rate represents the sum of £80.

VITAL STATISTICS.

(a) BIRTHS.—The total number of births occurring in the district was 183, giving a birth-rate of 22.4 per 1,000 of the population. Last year's figure was 31.5, and the average for the past ten years was 27.4, so that the present figure shows a decline in the birth-rate.

Of these births 98 were males, 75 females, 10 were illegitimate, 3 males and 7 females.

(b) DEATHS.—The total number of deaths belonging to the district was 105. Of these 54 were males and 51 were females.

This gives a death-rate of 12.9. Last year it was 12.5 and the mean for the past ten years was 16.5 (these figures are per 1,000 population). So the death-rate has declined somewhat.

The number of women who died on account of child-birth but not due to sepsis was 1.

INFANTILE MORTALITY.

The deaths of infants under one year number 24. This gives an infantile death-rate of 131 per 1,000 births.

The mean for the past ten years is 123 per 1,000 births, and last year's figure was 98. This shows a big increase, but it was not due to any epidemic such as summer diarrhœa. Only three deaths were from this cause.

All the deaths from tuberculosis had been previously notified.

The notification of tuberculosis cases is carried out satisfactorily, and there is no evidence of wilful neglect in this respect.

CAUSES OF SICKNESS.

There was no particular cause of sickness apart from the cases notified. Pneumonia and Congenital Debility (including Premature Birth and Asthenia) stand out prominently in the death returns.

SUMMARY OF NURSING ARRANGEMENTS, HOSPITALS AND OTHER INSTITUTIONS AVAILABLE FOR THE DISTRICT.

Professional Nursing in the Home.

(a) General.—The Aspull and Haigh Nursing Association provides one nurse who assists in the nursing of patients at home, but does not attend cases of infectious nature such as Measles.

The Association is supported by voluntary subscriptions.

- (b) Infectious Diseases.—There is no arrangement for nursing these cases in the home of the patient.
- Midwives.—The Public Health Authority does not subsidise nor does it employ any Midwives.

There are 6 Midwives practising in the district.

- Clinics and Treatment Centres.—The Child Welfare, School Clinics, Tuberculosis, and Venereal Disease, are all under the care of the County Council.
- Hospitals provided or subsidised by the Local Authority or by the County Council:
 - (1) Tuberculosis.—This is provided for by the County Council.
 - (2) Maternity.—No provision is made for these cases.
 - (3) Children.—No provision is made.
 - (4) Fever.—Arrangements are made with the Wigan Public Health Authority.
 - (5) Small-Pox.—Arrangement is made with Wigan to take charge of these cases.

There is no provision made for unmarried mothers, illegitimate infants and homeless children in the district.

Sir,

I have great pleasure in submitting for your perusal my first Annual Report of the work done during the year ending 31st December, 1922.

As I only commenced duties on the 1st October, 1922, the majority of the inspections made were carried out during the months of November and December, consequently the defects found were unabated at the end of the year. This accounts for such a large proportion of the number of houses inspected not having been rendered fit.

The general sanitary condition of the Township is improving slowly, perhaps due largely to the increased cost of materials and labour, and also to the fact that the cottage property is owner by a large number of small owners. There is, however, a very marked desire, especially during the last few months to push forward the various sanitary improvements suggested.

We have been comparatively free from epidemics of infectious disease, and the death-rate may be considered satisfactory.
