To the Chairman and Members
of the ASPULL Urban District Council.

Madam and Gentlemen,

I beg to present you with my Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary Administration of the Township for the year ending December 31st, 1926.

The Ministry of Health says that the Annual Report for 1926 should be an Ordinary Report, i.e., of a simple character.

In view of the fact that the appended tables are so exhaustive my preliminary remarks will be few.

Taking the year as a whole it may be looked upon as being about the average of most of the preceding years. The number of infectious cases reported will be found to be less.

Scarlet Fever 17 as compared with 29 in 1925.

Diphtheria 4 as compared with 16.

The general death-rate of 13.9 compares favourably with 17.2 of 1925, so that generally speaking the Health of the Township may be considered to have been good. Chicken-pox was prevalent during the latter part of the year; fortunately no case of Small-pox was reported.

Two special reports were submitted to you concerning property in the New Springs District. Legal action was taken, resulting in a conviction in each case. The defective property has since been placed in good repair and is now tenanted.

The conversion of privy middens to water carriage is steadily going on. Fifty-nine new water closets have been completed. The progress may be considered slow, but when the scarcity of money and the depressed times are taken into consideration we may congratulate ourselves on the progress made.

Frequent and periodical inspections with the Sanitary Officer have been made over the entire township, particularly with attention to Farm Buildings and Dairies. A notable improvement has been observed in most instances, and there is an evident desire on the part of farmers and vendors of milk to adopt modern methods in the cleaner production of milk. The exceptions form a small minority, and will have to be dealt with later by your Council.

To the Chairman and Members

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present for your consideration my Annual Report in connection with my duties as Sanitary Inspector for the year 1926.

Owing to the adverse industrial conditions which existed in this, a colliery district, during the greater portion of the year under review, the results as shown in this report are rather disappointing. In particular you will note that no house to house inspections under the Housing Consolidated Regulations, 1925, have been carried out, the reason for this being that in the majority of cases owners of property were not receiving any rent or rates, and consequently were not in a position to carry out the demands which we should necessarily have made upon them. It is my intention to more than make up this leeway during the coming year.

Taking all things into consideration I think that the work of conversion of privy middens to the water carriage system, and the provision of additional water closets has been fairly satisfactory, but renewed and persistent efforts are urgently needed with respect to this very important work. I think that it is very desirable on the grounds of health, cleanliness, and common decency, that each house should be provided with a separate closet, and it is my intention with your sanction, to commence

to deal with cases where there are two houses using one closet, special attention being paid to those cases where the privy midden empties into a common yard, and on to an unpaved or poorly paved yard surface.

It has been necessary, in two instances, to take legal proceedings, and in both cases we were successful in obtaining convictions.

Nos. 74, 76, 78, 80, 82, 84, 86, 88, 90, 92, 94, Longfield Street, and No. 12, Cale Lane.—Two privy middens, 6 closets to 12 W.C.'s.

Nos. 25, 27, 29, and 31, Wigan Road.—Two privy middens, 4 closets to 4 W.C.'s.

Nos. 19, 21, and 23, Wigan Road, and Nos. 1, 3, and 5, Cale Lane.—One privy midden, 4 closets to 6 W.C.'s.

Nos. 606, 608, and 610, Bolton Road, and No. 1, Worrall's Yard.—One privy midden, 2 closets to 4 W.C.'s.

Nos. 82, 84, 86, 88, 90, and 92, Haigh Road.—Four privy middens, 6 closets to 6 W.C.'s.

Nos. 1 and 3, Wigan Road.—Two W.C.'s provided.

In conclusion, Gentlemen, I beg to tender my sincere thanks to you, also the Medical Officer of Health and other Officials of the Council, for the courteous help and consideration extended to me at all times.

DAIRIES, COWSHEDS AND MILKSHOPS.

In addition to the usual routine inspections of these premises, special inspections have been made by the Medical Officer of Health and myself to ascertain how far they complied with the provisions of the Milk and Dairies Order, 1926. Since the coming into force of the latter named Order the cows and premises generally have certainly been kept in a cleaner condition. The importance of the personal factor in the production of a clean milk cannot be too greatly emphasised, and a great deal still remains to be done to interest milkers and others concerned in the production and distribution of this important food. Two samples of milk (one individual and one bulk) have been taken and submitted for bacteriological examination for the presence of T.B. Both samples proved to be negative.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

The number of cases of the most important infectious diseases notified during the year is considerably less than that of the previous year. Each case was visited and re-visited, and the inspection of the sanitary condition and arrangements of each house carried out. Disinfection of the articles and premises by Formaldehyde followed, and where necessary the limewashing of the premises was carried out. A similar procedure is carried out with regard to cases of Tuberculosis.

SLAUGHTER-HOUSES, MEAT SHOPS, ETC.

There are two Registered Slaughter-houses in the district. All animals are inspected at the time of slaughter, and apart from an occasional pig no animals are slaughtered at premises other than the slaughter-houses. The supervision of the purveyors who sell meat in the district from vans is becoming increasingly difficult, due to the fact that their numbers have increased considerably.
