2. GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

LABORATORY ARRANGEMENTS

Bacteriological examinations are carried out by the Pathological Department of the Royal Albert Edward Infirmary, Wigan, and the arrangements are satisfactory. A report on every examination is made to the Public Health Department.

During 1955 reports were made to the authority on 25 examinations

of milk and 3 of water.

AMBULANCE ARRANGEMENTS

During the year, Non-Infectious, Infectious, Accident and Maternity Cases were dealt with adequately by the Motor Ambulances belonging to the Lancashire County Council, stationed at Hindley and Standish.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

No action was taken by the Authority during the year, under Section 47 of this Act.

3. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA:

WATER SUPPLY

The district is supplied with water from Bolton Corporation, Wigan Rural District Council and Liverpool Corporation. The supply is upland surface and is found to be bacteriologically pure. During the year 3 bacteriological examinations and one chemical analysis of the piped supply were made and these proved satisfactory.

All houses in the district have a piped supply of water from the main.

During the second half of the year the water supply became insufficient in one part of the district due to encrustation of the main. Steps are being taken to remedy this.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The combined system of drainage is in operation throughout the district. All dwellings with the exception of 14 isolated cottages and farms have a water carriage system of sanitation. The installation of a septic tank for 4 cottages was completed during the year.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

Street scavenging is under the control of the Engineer and Surveyor.

The collection and disposal of household refuse is under the supervision of the Sanitary Inspector.

One driver and 4 labourers are engaged whole time on refuse collection work. An adequate service has been maintained during the year. All refuse is tipped at the Marsh House tip.

There are 13 pail closets, one privy midden and approximately 2,140 dustbins within the district.

There are 2 factory chimneys in the district and no action has been found necessary during the year.

SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS

There are none in the district.

VERMINOUS PREMISES

During the year 8 houses infested with bed bugs were disinfested with 5% D.D.T. Spray and D.D.T. Fumers. This treatment has proved highly efficient.

RODENT CONTROL

32 infestations of rats or mice were cleared during the year in addition to the two sewer tests and treatments. The treatment of dwelling houses is free of charge but a charge is made for treatment of business premises.

11 Licences to store petroleum were issued during the year and 6 inspections were made under the Acts. 3 new 1,000 gallon storage tanks were installed during the year.

4. HOUSING

The township consists chiefly of working class houses which are old in type and are constantly falling into disrepair.

Overcrowding exists only to a minor degree and those requiring houses are married couples having to live with parents. 62 new housing applications were received during the year, of which 14 were applications for old peoples' bungalows.

During the year 16 old peoples' bungalows built by Contract, and 16 houses built by the Council's Direct Labour Department were completed and tenanted.

At the end of the year two housing schemes were in hand (a) for 8 two bedroom type houses and (b) for 18 two bedroom type houses.

As a result of Ministry investigations by the Divisional Inspector of the Ministry of Agriculture & Fisheries following a notification of tuberculous milk, the whole herd, which had been sold, was traced and one animal was slaughtered on the purchaser's premises. 3 animals had been sold and slaughtered.

There is one small private slaughterhouse in the district at which 39 carcases were inspected during the year. The bulk of the meat supply to the district is from wholesalers in the County Borough of Wigan.

FOOD POISONING	

No cases of food poisoning occurred in the district in 1955.

6. PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS DISEASES

The number of cases of infectious diseases notified during the year was 108.

No cases of Diphtheria were notified in 1955. Free immunisation against Diphtheria is provided at the clinic, and during the year 74 pre-school children and 48 school children completed a full course of primary immunisation against Diphtheria. In addition 88 children were given a secondary or booster injection.

Of the above mentioned pre-school children 70 were immunised against Whooping Cough either with Whooping Cough vaccine only, or a combined (Diphtheria-Pertussis or Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis) type of prophylactic.

No immunisation against the enteric group was undertaken during 1955.

No local action has been taken with regard to the use of measles serum for phrophylaxis or attenuation, and there are no existing facilities for the typing of pneumococci and for the provision of appropriate type sera.

The general standard of cleanliness and habits in the district remain high and the cases of head lice dealt with at the clinic were few and were successfully treated with D.D.T. Emulsion.

DISINFECTION

Disinfection of houses is carried out with formaldehyde, and bedding and clothing are steam disinfected by arrangement with Hindley Urban District Council.

CANCER

12 deaths (9 males and 3 females) were certified as due to cancer during the year.

Facilities for Radium treatment are available to Aspull residents at the Radium Institute, Manchester, and at Wigan Infirmary, which for this purpose is a sub-clinic of the Manchester Centre.

The dispensary service is under the control of the Regional Hospital Board and Aspull cases attend at the Chest Clinic in Millgate, Wigan.

3 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis and one case of non-pulmonary tuberculosis were notified during the year. There were no deaths from pulmonary tuberculosis registered in 1955.
