

# GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICE IN THE AREA

#### LABORATORY ARRANGEMENTS

Bacteriological examinations are carried out by the Pathological Department of the Royal Albert Edward Infirmary, Wigan and the arrangements are satisfactory. Chemical analyses of water samples are carried out at the City Analyst's Department at the City Laboratories, Liverpool.

A report on every examination is made to the Public Health Department and during 1960, reports were made to the Authority on 17 examinations of milk and 12 of water.

#### AMBULANCE ARRANGEMENTS

During the year, Non-Infectious, Infectious, Accident and Maternity Cases were dealt with adequately by the Motor Ambulances belonging to the Lancashire County Council, stationed at Hindley and Standish.

## NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

No action was taken by the Authority during the year, under Section 47 of this Act.

# PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS DISEASES

The number of cases of infectious diseases notified during the year was 20 of which 15 were cases of Whooping Cough, 3 Measles, I Scarlet Fever and I Pneumonia.

No cases of Diphtheria were notified during the year.

Supplies of Diphtheria Antitoxin are kept at the Divisional Health Office and the local hospitals, and are always available to the medical practitioners.

Free immunisation is provided for any pre-school or school child, and is performed by the Medical Officer at the Clinic.

No immunisation against the enteric group was undertaken during 1960.

#### TUBERCULOSIS

The dispensary service is under the control of the Regional Hospital Board and Aspull cases attend at the Chest Clinic in Millgate, Wigan.

No cases of pulmonary or non pulmonary tuberculosis were notified during the year.

No deaths from pulmonary tuberculosis occurred during 1960.

#### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

#### WATER SUPPLY

The district is supplied with water from Bolton Corporation, Wigan Rural District Council and Liverpool Corporation. The supply is upland surface and is found to be bacteriologically pure. During the year 8 bacteriological examinations and 4 chemical analyses of the piped supply were made and these proved satisfactory.

All houses in the district have a piped supply of water from the main.

During the year the County Borough of Bolton became the responsible Authority for the Supply and Maintenance of the water undertaking for the district.

#### DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The combined system of drainage is in operation throughout the district. All dwellings with the exception of 14 isolated cottages and farms have a water carriage system of sanitation.

#### PUBLIC CLEANSING

Street scavenging is under the control of the Engineer and Surveyor.

The collection and disposal of household refuse is under the supervision of the Public Health Inspector,

One driver and four labourers are employed full time on refuse collection and a tractor and driver on the tip.

Difficulty is experienced in obtaining the proper type of labour in refuse collection. This is due no doubt to the supposedly menial character of the work and also the fact that there are a large number of alternative jobs available in the area. I must stress however that refuse collection is a very important service provided for the community and deserves very serious consideration in all its aspects.

The purchase by the Council of a tractor equipped with a bull-dozer blade, rear-loader and trailer has greatly facilitated work on the Marsh House tip.

A weekly collection is being maintained as far as possible in all parts of the district. On occasions however, mainly due to the weather conditions and sickness this has not been possible.

A weekly collection is maintained to all business premises and facilities are provded on the refuse vehicle for salvage collection. A total weight of 30 tons 19 cwts 2 qrs. of paper was sold during the year.

Controlled tipping is enforced at the Marsh House refuse tip and has shown very gratifying results. The filling in of a portion of the tip has been completed and the area grassed.

When the present area being used is completed it should provide an added amenity to the district of open park-land.

A dust bin replacement scheme providing for the renewal of 200 dustbins per year is in operation in the district.

There are 13 pail closets, one privy midden and approximately 2,215 dustbins within the district.

#### TENTS, VANS AND SHEDS

There are no licensed caravan sites within the district.

#### SMOKE ABATEMENT

There are two factory chimneys in the district and no action has been found necessary during the year.

Clean Air Act, 1956: The whole of the Clean Air Act, 1956, came into operation on 1st June, 1956. Previously this Authority had adopted bye-laws governing the installation of types of appliances in all new premises, suitable to burn permissible types of fuel.

#### SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS

There are none in the district.

#### VERMINOUS PREMISES

During the year 41 houses infested with cockroaches were treated with Pybuthrin. Twenty-two other houses were disinfested of other insect pests either by spraying with liquid insecticide or by dusting with insecticidal powder. This type of treatment proved highly efficient.

#### RODENT CONTROL

182 infestations of rats or mice were cleared during the year in addition to the two sewer treatments. The treatment of dwelling houses is free of charge but a charge is made for treatment of business premises.

1,671 inspections (including re-inspections) were made in 1960.

One Rodent Operative is employed for three days per week on this work.

#### OFFENSIVE TRADES

There are no registered premises within the district.

# PETROLEUM (REGULATION) ACTS 1928 and 1936

12 Licences to store petroleum were issued during the year and six inspections were made under the Acts.

#### HOUSING

The township consists chiefly of working class houses which are old in type and constantly falling into disrepair.

Overcrowding exists only to a minor degree and those requiring houses are mainly married couples having to live with parents. 51 new housing applications were received during the year, of which eleven were applications for old people's bungalows.

During the year 39 new houses were constructed by the local authority and tenanted. Consisting of one two-bedroom flat, 33 three bedroom houses, and five one-bedroom flats. 49 families were rehoused during the year, 30 from slum clearance properties and 19 from the housing list.

A further scheme for the next five years has been agreed by the Council and several houses have already been dealt with which are included in this programme.

At the end of the year there was no building in progress by the Local Authority, but 12 houses were in course of erection by private enterprise.

The five-year scheme for slum clearance has been completed, 69 houses having been dealt with.

# 7.—HOUSING ACTS—Improvement Grants, etc.

No applications were received for Improvement Grants during the year.

Four applications for Standard Grants were received and approved during the year. These applications were made by owner/occupiers.

In my opinion more use could be made of the scheme by owners of tenanted houses in the area. There are many properties within the area which could be vastly improved by means of Standard Grants. There is no doubt this was indeed the primary intention behind the introduction of Standard Grants.

#### INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

#### MILK SUPPLY

Routine inspections of farms and dairies have been carried out and a good standard of cleanliness maintained. 17 samples of milk have been analysed, and proved to be satisfactory.

The Milk (Special Designations) (Specified Areas) (No. 2) Order, 1958, came into operation on the 1st October, 1958. Therefore, on and after that date all dairymen retailing milk in any part of the area must sell the milk under special designation (that is "Pasteurised" "Sterilised" and "Tuberculin Tested") irrespective of whether the premises from which the milk is retailed are inside or outside the area, and any milk which is retailed outside the specified area from those same premises must also be sold under special designation.

FOOD HYGIENE REGULATIONS, 1955

All food premises and vehicles of hawkers entering the district have been inspected; also the vehicles of itinerant ice-cream vendors.

Considerable progress has been made without resort to formal action or prosecution, but much more remains to be achieved.

The obligations of the occupiers and food handlers as regards the condition of premises and methods of food handling are greatly stressed in the Regulations, but customers and consumers would greatly help to facilitate the work of the Public Health Inspector by observing hygienic practices when in food premises and also by patronising shops that provide a clean and hygienic service to their customers.


