GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICE IN THE AREA

LABORATORY ARRANGEMENTS

Bacteriological examinations are carried out by the Pathological Department of the Royal Albert Edward Infirmary, Wigan, and the arrangements are satisfactory. Chemical analyses of water samples are carried out at the City Analyst's Department at the City Laboratories, Liverpool.

A report on every examination is made to the Public Health Department.

AMBULANCE ARRANGEMENTS

During the year, Non-Infectious, Infectious, Accident and Maternity Cases were dealt with adequately by the Motor Ambulances belonging to the Lancashire County Council, stationed at Hindley and Standish.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

No action was taken by the Authority during the year, under Section 47 of this Act.

PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS DISEASES

The number of cases of infectious diseases notified during the year was 48.

No cases of Diphtheria were notified during the year.

Supplies of Diphtheria Antitoxin are kept at the Divisional Health Office and the local hospitals, and are always available to the medical practitioners.

Free immunisation is provided for any pre-school or school child, and is performed by the Medical Officer at the Clinic.

No immunisation against the enteric group was undertaken during 1964.

TUBERCULOSIS

The dispensary service is under the control of the Regional Hospital Board and Aspull cases attend at the Chest Clinic in Millgate, Wigan.

One case of Pulmonary Tuberculosis was notified during the year.

No deaths from Pulmonary Tuberculosis occurred during 1965.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA WATER SUPPLY

The district is supplied with water from Bolton Corporation, Wigan Rural District Council and Liverpool Corporation. The supply is upland surface and is found to be bacteriologically pure. During the year 2 bacteriological examinations and 9 chemical analyses of the piped supply were made and these proved satisfactory. The combined fluorine content varied between 0.10 and 0.35 parts per million.

All houses in the district have a piped supply of water from the main.

The County Borough of Bolton are the responsible Authority for the Supply and Maintenance of the water undertaking for the district.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The combined system of drainage is in operation throughout the district. All dwellings with the exception of 12 isolated cottages and farms have a water carriage system of sanitation.

The district is faced with the problem of sewers being inadequate and overloaded if further development of the district is
to take place. The foul sewer system from Hilton and Crawford
Estates is functioning to capacity, any further development in
the Scot Lane area will necessitate new sewerage provisions. The
system from Scot Lane Settling Tank catering for the Bolton
Road, Hall Lane and Top Lock areas is mainly the old system and
requires investigation. Periodic cleansing is required on stretches
of this sewer due to silting up. With the exception of a small area
of the Urban District which is treated by the Hindley Urban
District Council the district's sewerage system connects to the
Wigan County Borough system who treat the effluent.

During the year 58 inspections were made in connection with drainage and sewerage.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

Street scavenging is under the control of the Engineer and Surveyor.

The collection and disposal of household refuse is under the supervision of the Public Health Inspector.

One driver and five labourers are employed full time on refuse collection and a tractor and driver on the tip.

A five day collection is being maintained as far as possible in all parts of the district. On occasions, however, mainly due to the weather conditions and sickness this has not been possible.

The Council have in operation a scheme using Paper Sacks specially treated to withstand moisture and a certain degree of heat; 500 houses are now equipped with Paper Sack Holders. All the schools in the local authority's area are also adapted to this method of collection. The scheme is operating smoothly and has proved successful.

Controlled tipping is enforced at the Toddington Railway Cutting refuse tip.

A dust bin replacement scheme providing for the renewal of dustbins is in operation in the district.

There are 6 pail closets, and approximately 25,00 dustbins within the district.

SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS

There are are none in the district.

VERMINOUS PREMISES

During the year 11 houses infested with cockroaches and 3 ant infestations were treated with Pybuthrin. Nine other houses were disinfested of other insect pests either by spraying with liquid insecticide or by dusting with insecticidal powder. This type of treatment proved highly efficient.

RODENT CONTROL

155 infestations of rats or mice were cleared during the year in addition to the two sewer treatments. The treatment of dwelling houses is free of charge but a charge is made for treatment of business premises.

549 inspections (including re-inspections) were made in 1965.

One Rodent Operative is employed part-time on this work.

HOUSING

The township consists chiefly of working class houses which are old in type and constantly falling into disrepair.

Overcrowding exists only to a minor degree and those requiring houses are mainly those living in poor housing conditions. 43 new housing applications were received during the year, of which ten were applications for old people's bungalows.

Eighty-one houses were built by private enterprise during the year. The building of 10 shops at the Finger Post has been completed.

A further scheme for clearance of unfit dwellings during the next five years has been agreed by the Council and several houses have already been dealt with which are included in this programme.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

MILK SUPPLY

Routine inspections of farms and dairies have been carried out and a good standard of cleanliness maintained.

Lancashire County Council are now the responsible Authority

for the issuing of milk licences, and milk sampling.

No Ministry investigations by the Divisional Inspector of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food were found necessary during the year as a result of notifications of tuberculous milk.

MEAT AND OTHER FOODS

There are no private slaughterhouses in the district. Butchers obtain their supplies from surrounding abattoirs.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1955

Details of samples obtained in the Aspull Urban District under the provisions of the above Act, during 1965.

FOOD HYGIENE REGULATIONS, 1960

Routine Inspections have been made during the year to food premises and mobile shops under the above Regulations.

Although improvements are being made to food premises following informal action and letters requesting co-operation, there are still premises without the basic essentials of the Food Hygiene Regulations and it is becoming apparent that legal action will have to be resorted to in these cases.

Continued effort must be made on behalf of both the employer and the employees of food premises. The general public could also greatly help to facilitate the work of the Public Health Inspector by observing hygienic practices when in food premises and also by patronising shops that provide a clean and hygienic service for their customers.
