## STATISTICS AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE AREA

Area: 1,906 acres.

Aspull Urban District is situated some three miles north-east of Wigan and seven miles west of Bolton. The north-western portion of the area reaches to the greatest height above sea level (525 ft.) and from this point an uninterrupted view of the countryside for miles around may be obtained.

The present Urban District Council consisting of nine members governs the district, which is divided into three Wards. The Council, together with the Councils of the neighbouring Urban Districts of Hindley and Westhoughton, administer Borsdane Wood, through which runs the brook forming one of the natural boundaries of the Urban District.

The main industries are baking, weaving, tile manufacturing and agriculture. Several other smaller factories operate within the area.

## GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

### LABORATORY ARRANGEMENTS

Bacteriological examinations are carried out by the Department of Bacteriology, Royal Albert Edward Infirmary, Wigan. Chemical analyses are undertaken by the County Analyst, County Hall, Preston. These arrangements are entirely satisfactory.

### AMBULANCE ARRANGEMENTS

During the year non-infectious, infectious, accident and maternity cases were dealt with adequately by the Ambulance Service operated by the Lancashire County Council. The ambulances are stationed at Hindley and Standish.

### NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

No action was taken by the Authority during the year, under Section 47 of this Act.

### PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS DISEASES

A total of 87 cases of infectious diseases were notified during the year. This figure comprises 60 cases of measles, 20 cases of whooping cough, 2 cases of respiratory tuberculosis, 1 case of non-respiratory tuberculosis and 4 cases of infective jaundice.

The following table shows the number of cases of these diseases occurring within various age groups.

Food Poisoning—No cases of food poisoning were notified during the year.

Tuberculosis—The dispensary services under the control of the Regional Hospital Board and Aspull cases attend the Chest Clinic, Millgate, Wigan.

## SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

### WATER SUPPLY

The Bolton Corporation is the statutory water undertaker for the Urban District, although certain functions are carried out within the area by the Makerfield Water Board.

There are three sources of supply to the district.

The north-western portion of the district, that is the area adjacent to Butcherfield Row and part of Haigh Road, is supplied from Wilderswood Reservoir at Blackrod. This supply is pumped to Aspull by the Makerfield Water Board.

Properties at Pennington Green and Hall Lane derive their supply of water from the reservoir at Rivington via the Liverpool aqueduct.

The remaining parts of the district receive the Thirlmere supply provided by Bolton Corporation.

All premises with Aspull receive a piped supply from the public mains. During the year 48 new dwellings were connected to the public supply.

The water is soft upland surface water and laboratory reports indicate that it is fit for drinking and all domestic purposes.

The combined fluorine content varied between 0.021 and 0.10 parts per million.

## DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

A survey has been completed by a firm of Consultant Engineers on the existing sewerage system in the Bolton Road and Hall Lane area.

The new sewer, with a diameter varying from 12 ins. to 21 ins., will run for a distance of approximately 3 miles to connect with the existing sewer in Cale Lane.

When this work is completed quite a large area of land will be made available for house building, etc., which was previously unuseable.

## PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

The two conveniences in the area, New Springs and Finger Post, continue to be the target for vandals. It seems almost impossible to protect these facilities and much time and money is spent in maintaining them at a reasonable standard.

## TENTS, VANS AND SHEDS

There are no licensed caravan sites within the district.

## SMOKE ABATEMENT

There are two factory chimneys in the district and no action has been found necessary during the year.

## OFFENSIVE TRADES

There are no registered premises within the district.

## SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS

There are none in the district.



## VERMINOUS PREMISES

During the year 21 houses were treated for cockroaches, ants or silverfish using Pybuthrin.

Quite a large number of Council Houses on the Hilton Estate have hawthorn hedges and these were severely affected by an infestation of the Small Ermine Moth (*Yponeomeuta Padella*).

These small greyish-white moths lay eggs in groups in late July and August and each egg mass may contain 50 eggs. They are yellow at first but gradually darken to resemble the colour of the bark. The caterpillars are blackish-grey with darker spots and feed on the young leaves in the Spring. Towards the end of May large webs are spun until June or July when the cocoons appear.

Hedges which are attacked over a period of years will deteriorate and can be killed.

We were able to destroy the caterpillars by spraying with Trichlorphon (Dipterex 80).

## RODENT CONTROL

One man is employed part-time on rodent control work.

During the year 269 visits were made to premises in this connection, dealing with 117 infestations of rats and 20 infestations of mice. This shows a decrease of 9 infestations on the previous year.

The presence of rats or mice, or even the suspicion of such, should be reported immediately to the Public Health Inspector, as an early notification will often lessen the task of the rodent operative.

During May and June 174 manholes on the public sewerage system were baited. There were only 3 complete 'takes' and 2 partial 'takes' and subsequent baiting of these manholes and adjacent ones revealed no further 'takes.'





## SCHOOLS

Schools are visited periodically in connection with refuse collection, rodent control, washing facilities and sanitary accommodation.

It is difficult to believe that in the year 1968 all schools have not such necessary facilities as indoor sanitary accommodation and particularly adequate wash hand basins with hot and cold water.

The task of teaching personal hygiene is made very difficult by the lack of these facilities at a time when the children are at their most formative years.

Whilst progress is being made in the provision of equipment in school kitchens one of the major difficulties is the inadequate size of some of our kitchens.

The only answer appears to be the provision of suitable buildings but this is controlled by finance.

## HOUSING

As it is some years since the Housing Waiting List was last brought up to date a detailed survey was carried out in which all persons with outstanding applications were contacted and asked to complete new application forms.

The survey showed that the number of applicants on the Housing Waiting List at 31st December, 1968 was 92. In addition to this 34 Council House Tenants have submitted a request for an exchange of houses.

As we were unable to build any Council Houses during the year Slum Clearance was minimal. Five houses were closed and three of the families allocated Council Houses.

Plans for the re-development at the Top Lock Area have been finalised and it is hoped to commence building as soon as possible in 1969.

This will be only the start of serious Slum Clearance in Aspull which we hope will gather momentum with the building of Council Houses in the Scot Lane Area in the near future.

## RENT ACT, 1957

There have been no applications and a reduction in number of queries appertaining to the Rent Act, 1957.

### 7.—HOUSING ACTS: IMPROVEMENT GRANTS, ETC.

No applications were received for Improvement Grants during 1968.

Of the twenty applications received from owner occupiers for Standard Grants during the year, 16 were for the full standard and 4 for the reduced standard and all were approved.



## PUBLIC CLEANSING

A weekly collection of refuse has been maintained during the year with the exception of the July and September holiday weeks.

The number of paper sacks in use was increased during the year by the purchase of plastic bins for containing the paper sacks. Apart from being more economical than the freestanding wire sack holders the life expectancy is greater and they are of a more pleasing appearance.

This means that approximately 50% of our refuse is now collected in paper sacks with a resultant reduction in noise, spillage and dust loss when the refuse is put into the vehicle.

In my opinion this method of refuse collection is the most advantageous as a new clean paper sack is provided weekly, which reduces smell and also helps to eliminate breeding facilities for flies, etc.

The refuse collection team consisted of a Driver/Foreman, 5 Loaders and a man engaged on the refuse tip.

As a result of negotiations with the refuse team and the National Union of General and Municipal Workers the Council were able to conclude a Productivity Agreement which resulted in the reduction in the number of loaders from 5 to 3 and the payment of a bonus of approximately 20% of their basic pay.

This agreement was confirmed by the Department of Employment and Productivity in December, 1968 and the scheme is to commence on the 4th January, 1969.

Household furniture and other unwanted articles are still being deposited in various parts of the district.

Apart from the fact that our countryside is dispoiled it is quite unnecessary, as we will arrange for the collection of domestic articles without charge to the occupier.

A new Massey Ferguson tractor/loader was purchased which is coping with refuse disposal quite efficiently.

Tipping is almost completed at the Haigh Road Tip and we are indeed fortunate to have another site available within easy reach of Aspull at Toddington Delf.

It is unfortunate that tipping here is restricted to the winter months as I feel sure that controlled tipping could be continued throughout the year without nuisance to adjacent properties.

During the summer months more than adequate precautions are taken on fly control by the use of various insecticides and baiting for rats is carried out during the year.



## INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

### MILK SUPPLY

Lancashire County Council are the responsible Authority for issuing milk licenses.

No Ministry investigation by the Divisional Inspector of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food was found necessary during the year as a result of tuberculous milk.

One sample of milk examined for Brucellosis gave a positive result on the Milk Ring Test.

The farmer was informed and his Veterinary Surgeon isolated the animals affected.

### MEAT AND OTHER FOODS

There are no slaughterhouses in the district.

Butchers obtain their supplies from abattoirs situated in neighbouring areas.
