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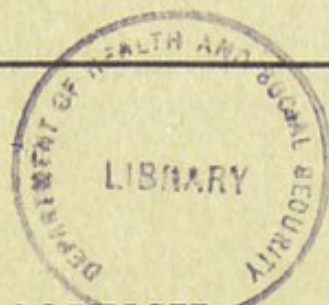

## STATISTICS AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE AREA

Area: 1,906 acres.

Population (Census 1971): 7,500.

Aspull Urban District is situated some three miles north-east of Wigan and seven miles west of Bolton. The north-western portion of the area reaches to the greatest height above sea level (525 ft.) and from this point an uninterrupted view of the countryside for miles around may be obtained.

The present Urban District Council consisting of nine members governs the district, which is divided into three Wards. The Council, together with the Councils of the neighbouring Urban Districts of Hindley and Westhoughton, administer Borsdane Wood, through which runs the brook forming one of the natural boundaries of the Urban District.

The main industries are baking, tile manufacturing and agriculture. Several other smaller factories operate within the area.

## **GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA**

### **LABORATORY ARRANGEMENTS**

Bacteriological examinations are carried out by the Department of Bacteriology, Royal Albert Edward Infirmary, Wigan. Chemical analyses are undertaken by the County Analyst, County Hall, Preston. These arrangements are entirely satisfactory.

### **AMBULANCE ARRANGEMENTS**

During the year non-infectious, infectious, accident and maternity cases were dealt with adequately by the Ambulance Service operated by the Lancashire County Council. The ambulances are stationed at Hindley and Standish.

### **NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948**

No action was taken by the Authority during the year, under Section 47 of this Act.

## **PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS DISEASES**

A total of 10 cases of infectious diseases were notified during the year. This figure comprises 7 cases of measles, 1 case of respiratory tuberculosis and 2 cases of whooping cough.

Tuberculosis—The dispensary services under the control of the Regional Hospital Board and Aspull cases attend the Chest Clinic, Millgate, Wigan.

## SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

### WATER SUPPLY

The Bolton Corporation is the statutory water undertaker for the Urban District, although certain functions are carried out within the area by the Makerfield Water Board.

There are three sources of supply to the district.

The north-western portion of the district, that is the area adjacent to Butcherfield Row and part of Haigh Road, is supplied from Wilderswood Reservoir at Blackrod. This supply is pumped to Aspull by the Makerfield Water Board.

Properties at Pennington Green and Hall Lane derive their supply of water from the reservoir at Rivington via the Liverpool aqueduct.

The remaining parts of the district receive the Thirlmere supply provided by Bolton Corporation.

All premises within Aspull receive a piped supply from the public mains. During the year 69 new dwellings were connected to the public supply.

Laboratory reports indicate that it is fit for drinking and all domestic purposes.

## DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

Work has commenced on the laying of the new sewer which will run from the boundary of Wigan in Wigan Road and terminate in Scot Lane, a distance of  $3\frac{3}{4}$  miles.

The work should be completed in 1972 and thus enable the Council to build approx. 200 houses on the Scot Lane site.

It will also allow private development to proceed on land where sewerage was not previously available.

## RODENT CONTROL

One man is employed part-time on rodent control work.

During the year 336 visits were made to premises in this connection, dealing with 186 infestations of rats and 31 infestations of mice. This shows an increase of 85 infestations on the previous year.

The annual sewer treatment carried out in August in which 216 manholes were treated showed only 2 partial takes.

## SCHOOLS

Schools are visited periodically in connection with food hygiene, washing facilities and sanitary accommodation.

Attempts have been made to see that suitable facilities are available in all our schools but unfortunately without success.

## HOUSING

The number of applicants on the Housing Waiting list at 31st December, 1971 was 147. In addition to this 37 Council house tenants have submitted a request for an exchange of houses.

Sixty-seven tenancies were granted in the current year and 16 exchange of houses were arranged for existing tenants. Forty-one of these tenancies were in respect of houses and flats allocated in the Top Lock Redevelopment Scheme.

Two Clearance Areas were declared in the Top Lock area involving 31 houses and 80 persons. An objection was made to the making of the Leeds Street (West) Clearance Area No. 8 and a Public Enquiry was held on the 9th March, 1971 following which the Ministry confirmed the Clearance Order. Objections were made to the making of the Liverpool Street (Central) Clearance Area No. 10 and the Leeds Street (South) Clearance Area No. 11 and a Public Enquiry will be held in 1972.

Demolition Orders were made in respect of 9 house and <sup>14</sup> 14 houses were the subject of Closing Orders.

Twelve one bedroomed flats have been completed at Crawford Close and 5 purpose-built handicapped persons flats have been completed at Hilton Place with 5 standard three bedroomed flats above.

## RENT ACT, 1957

There have been 6 applications for qualification certificates appertaining to the Rent Act, 1957, 5 of which were granted. An application for provisional approval was also granted.

No applications were received for Improvement Grants during 1971.

Twenty-five applications were received for Standard Grants during the year and all, with the exception of three were approved.



## PUBLIC CLEANSING

A weekly collection of refuse has been maintained during the year with the exception of the July and September holiday weeks.

All householders now use the plastic sack method for refuse disposal with the exception of the existing houses in Top Lock which are due to be demolished.

Our refuse collection productivity agreement is still functioning satisfactorily but, due to the increased use of the sack method of collection, the bonus has fallen considerably. The scheme has now been in operation for three years and has proved most successful.

Although, following the introduction of the productivity agreement, the number of complaints against the refuse collection service were comparatively few in 1970, it is gratifying to note that the number of complaints in 1971 were even less, i.e. only 12 complaints were received during the year, e.g. refuse not removed or replacement sack not provided.

This I feel is a true reflection of the type of service given by the Council and by our refuse collectors, a service which will be difficult to improve upon.

1971 has shown an increase in the number of requests for the removal of unwanted articles of household furniture, 98 visits have been made for this purpose. This is probably due to the fact that rate-payers are beginning to realise, that it is not necessary to indiscriminately dump their unwanted household articles on the roadside or in convenient fields, it is so much easier to ask their Local Council to collect them free of charge.



## INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

### MILK SUPPLY

Lancashire County Council are the responsible Authority for issuing milk licenses.

No Ministry investigation by the Divisional Inspector of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food was found necessary during the year as a result of tuberculous milk.

A total of 16 samples was obtained comprising 12 milks (one of which was a Channel Islands Milk) and 4 others as follows:—
