

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE Mr. Chairman, Ladies & Gentlemen, I have pleasure in submitting my report on the health of the district for the year ending 31st December, 1969, as made to the Minister of Health in accordance with his instructions. The population as estimated by the Registrar General in June, 1969, was 11,810, this shows a decrease of 20 from the previous year of 1968. The number of births was 213, 25 more than the previous year, and there were 150 deaths, 12 more than in 1968. There were no suicide or motor accidents recorded in the district during the year but deaths from 'All Other Accidents' are shown as 4. There is a slight increase in the number of infectious diseases but with no significant pattern in any specific disease. In 1967 it was noted that for the first time since 1945 the district birth rate was in excess of the national average. 1968 however, failed to attain this peak and the rate was one point below the national average. It is perhaps significant that this year the pattern of 1967 is repeated and for only the second time

since 1945, the areas' birth rate is above the national average. In 1968 the local death rate was very close to the national average, it is now in excess of this figure by almost one point.

Conclusions drawn about the changing nature of the population in 1967 would appear to be substantiated from these figures.

I take this opportunity of thanking all members of the Council, and the staff of the Public Health Department and the Council's Officers for their help and co-operation during the year.

# HOSPITALS

There being no hospitals within the district, facilities are provided by the Manchester Regional Hospital Boards as follows:

- (a) General Medical & Surgical cases were treated at hospitals situated in the Municipal Borough of Ashton-under-Lyne; City of Manchester; County Borough of Stockport.
- (b) Infectious Disease cases were treated at Hyde Isolation Hospital, Westhulme Infectious Diseases Hospital, Monsall Infectious Diseases Hospital, Manchester.
- (c) Tuberculosis:Home visits, chest clinic and sanitorium treatment are provided for all known cases.
- (d) Maternity:Cases are admitted to the Lake Hospital, Ashtonunder-Lyne, and St. Mary's Hospital, Manchester.

# TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the environmental health and cleansing services of the district during the year 1969.

Progress promised in 1968 has been continued and during the year a great deal of work has been done implementing policies decided by the Council towards the end of 1968 and during the year.

With the clearing of the back log of routine visiting to food and other industrial premises and with the continued co-operation of the local trades people, the standard of food hygiene in the district has been maintained.

The Housing Act 1969, which came into force during the year, caused a great deal of re-thinking in connection with the housing stock of the district. In July a report was presented to the Council suggesting a 5 year Housing Policy, dealing not only with slum clearance but with urban renewal as suggested in the 1969 Act. As a result of this report, considerable progress was made during the year in the planning and preparation of a programme to transform the Guide Lane area by selective demolition and improvement. During the year one clearance area was declared and inspections made on the first of the Guide Lane areas, in preparation for presentation early in 1970.

The Audenshaw No. 5 Smoke Control Order was presented to the Committee in December and eventually was submitted to the Ministry for confirmation. At this time a great deal of concern was expressed about the shortage of solid smokeless fuel, particularly the coke, formerly available from gas works, closed down because of the advent of North Sea Gas. This matter was fully discussed with the South East Lancashire and North East Cheshire Advisory Committee, on Atmospheric Pollution, and concern was expressed over the houses converted before 1964 which were converted only to burn soft coke. Under the prevailing conditions, I feel that these houses should have a further conversion from Government funds in order that they may burn the fuels at present available.

During the year street sweeping and gully emptying were removed from the department to the Surveyor and the department accepted responsibility for the enforcement of the Petroleum Acts.

Refuse collection and disposal still occupy much of the department's time. The new vehicle provided in June helped to reduce the number of delays in the seven day collection. I am confident that when the vehicle replacement policy is fully implemented, this section will operate considerably more smoothly and the cause of irritation to the ratepayers will be removed.

In July a cockroach infestation occurred in the houses surrounding the land known as Jackson's Tip. The department treated the land and the houses and infestation was reduced. At the same time concentrated effort was made to fill in and level the land and this continued until October when supplies of covering material ceased to be available from the local builders. This operation will be continued in 1970.

I feel that 1969 achieved the progress promised in 1968 and I would like to thank members of the Council and its officers for their continued support throughout the year, and take this opportunity to formally express my appreciation to Dr. H.I. Ashford and the members of the department for the help they have given and the loyalty they have shown during the year.
