VITAL STATISTICS

BIRTHS

The Registrar General gives the corrected number of live births in the District as 542 (283 boys and 259 girls), this being 2 births less than in 1968. Of these births 33 were illegitimate, i.e. 6% of the total. The corresponding percentage for England and Wales was 8%.

The uncorrected birth rate for 1969 was 14.4 and when the comparability factor (1.13) is applied, the corrected birth rate was 16.3 per 1,000 of the total population compared with 16.9 in 1968. The birth rate for England and Wales in 1969 was 16.3.

STILL BIRTHS

The registered number of still births in 1969 was 5 of which one was illegitimate, thus giving a still birth rate of 9 per 1,000 total births.

DEATHS

After correction for transferable deaths the net total assigned to the District by the Registrar General was 468 (241 males and 227 females). This is 10 less than in 1968 and gives an uncorrected death rate of 12.4. When adjusted for age and sex distribution to make it comparable with other districts, the death rate was 12.0 per 1,000 of total population compared with 11.9 for England and Wales as a whole.

MATERNAL MORTALITY

There were no deaths from maternal causes in 1969.

INFANT MORTALITY

Eight children (2 boys and 6 girls) under the age of one year, died in 1969. This gives an Infant Mortality Rate of 15 per 1,000 live births, compared with 18 for England and Wales as a whole.

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WATER SUPPLIES

No shortage of water supplies was reported from any part of the District in 1969.

Every Parish has a piped main water supply and 12,395 houses are supplied directly in this way by the Bristol Waterworks Company. However, although every parish has a main water supply, not every house can be supplied directly from the mains and there are still 90 houses in the District relying on other sources. Three are supplied from a main water standpipe, fifty-five depend on wells, twenty-two on springs and ten depend on collected rain water. During the year a piped supply was substituted for well water in two cases.

Bacteriological and chemical sampling of public supplies is carried out by the Bristol Waterworks Company, but some individual sampling is also done by the Council's Public Health Department. The results of such sampling are given in the Report of the Chief Public Health Inspector.

During the year an investigation was made into the lead content of the water supply to a number of houses where the supply came through old lead service pipes.

In three cases, where the water was from a private well or from collected rain water, the amount of lead found in the tap water was above the recognised permissable maximum level, and the occupiers were advised to change to main supply. The occupiers of one of the houses were an old gentleman and his wife, both in their eighties, both hale and hearty, and they had been using the well supply for more than forty years. As one can imagine, it was somewhat difficult to be convincing in arguing the dangers of possible lead poisoning.

LOCAL HEALTH AUTHORITY SERVICES

The County Council, as the Local Health Authority, is responsible for the provision of a number of personal Health Services, mainly connected with maternity and child welfare, the School Health Service and mental health.

Child Welfare Clinics are held in twelve Villages in the District. In 1966 a scheme of "attachment" of District Nurses to the practices of general medical practitioners was started and is proving most successful.

In Cheddar, a new Health Centre was opened during the year. This combines in the same building, accommodation for the family doctors working in the village, the home Nursing Service, and the Child Welfare Clinic.

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HOSPITAL SERVICES

Progress in the building of the new District General Hospital for the Area grinds slowly onwards, but at least, during the year a definite site for the new Hospital was decided.

A sample of water from each of the above supplies was submitted for chemical analysis during the year. All these samples were reported upon by the Analyst as being free from plumbo-solvency or other harmful contamination.

30 samples of water were taken for bacteriological examination from private premises not receiving a supply from the public mains. 7 of these samples proved to be unsatisfactory. 3 houses were provided with a supply of water from the public main in place of a supply from a private source.

12 samples of water were taken for chemical examination from domestic water supplies. 3 of these were found to contain excessive amounts of lead. The Medical Officer of Health has commented on these cases.
