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

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Aylesbury.

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report upon the health and vital statistics of the Borough for the year 1938.

Dr. Parrott resigned his appointment on the 30th September, 1938, after 33 years' service, and in the short period at the close of the year, during which I have had an opportunity of making a survey of the health services of the Borough, I have formed the opinion that the administration, and co-operation with other departments are admirable.

In this report for purposes of convenience I have incorporated the annual survey of the Borough Sanitary Inspector.

During the year the Borough has been free from any severe epidemic of infectious disease, certain schools (chiefly infants departments) having outbreaks of minor infectious disease such as chicken-pox and mumps.

The services of the Isolation Hospital in the Borough have been utilised to the full extent, forty-four cases of Scarlet Fever have been treated there, out of a total of forty-six occurring in the town.

Mr. Dugdale, the Deputy Borough Surveyor, has supplied the information concerning the recently erected public sanitary conveniences of the town, and statistics on the local rainfall. I wish to express my thanks to him and to all members of the Health Department who have assisted in the compilation of this report.

#### Section B.

#### GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES.

Pathological specimens. These are examined at the Pathological Laboratory, Princess Mary's R.A.F. Hospital, Halton, and at the Clinical Research Association, London.

Voluntary Hospital. The town and district is excellently served by the Royal Bucks Hospital, (115 beds), which is centrally situated in the County and Borough. A new commodious out-patients department has recently been erected and fitted with modern equipment.

Maternity and Child Welfare. The Infant Welfare Centre is under the control of the Bucks County Council at Pebble Lane, and is open every Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday. The premises are also used as a dental clinic and as a centre for diphtheria immunisation. 29 children were immunised against diphtheria during 1938.

Infectious Disease Hospital. The area is served by the Aylesbury Joint Board Isolation Hospital, (45 beds), situated on the outskirts of the town within the Borough boundary, between Aylesbury and Stoke Mandeville. It consists of a scarlet fever and diphtheria block, in which are observation wards planned on modern lines, together with a separate cubicle block A well equipped motor ambulance is garaged on the premises for the use of the district served by the hospital. The Medical Officer of Health is the Medical Superintendent, and the nursing staff consists of a Matron, Deputy Matron, two trained staff nurses, and six probationers.

Ambulance Services of the Borough. In addition to the ambulance possessed by the Royal Bucks Hospital, the St. John's Ambulance Brigade maintain two ambulances for dealing with accident and other cases. The ambulance services of the Borough are adequate.

#### Section C.

#### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply. The Borough comes wholly within the statutory area served by the Chiltern Hills Water Company.

Samples of Water for analysis and bacteriological examination are taken from different areas in the Borough each month and the result is submitted to the Health Committee. A gathering

ground, well isolated from habitations, and situated in the chalk of the Chiltern Hills at New Ground and Dancers End, has produced a supply excellent in quality for many years. Certain difficulties have been experienced in the pressure of water and the Company have recently taken steps to increase the supply from new borings.

No typhoid bacilli or other pathogenic organisms were found.

The Analyst stated that the water was of good quality and quite suitable for drinking and domestic purposes.

Drainage and Sewerage. The drainage and sewerage of the Borough is satisfactory, and is on the partially separate system, surface water from streets and buildings being discharged direct to watercourses at various points. Owing to differences in level, four localities are provided with pumping stations to lift the sewage into the main sewers. These are situated at Mandeville Road, Buckingham Road, California, and Tring Road. There is also a small pump house in Oxford Road to deal with an individual property.

Sewage Disposal. The Sewage Disposal Works, an account of which was given in the Annual Report for 1937, remains unaltered.

Closet Accommodation. No closets on the conservancy system exist in the town, all existing closets are water flushed.

Public Sanitary Conveniences. The progressive policy of the Borough Council has during the past two years, dealt to a large extent with this section of the Public Health services, so that at the present time the centre of the town is well catered for in this respect.

Underground conveniences for both sexes have been constructed in Kingsbury Square under the island used as a centre for omnibus services, and were opened towards the end of 1937.

At the same time conveniences for both sexes were erected in the High Street at the entrance to the Vale.

The Council have in mind the erection of further Public Conveniences on two other sites in the Borough.

Public Cleansing. This has proceeded in a satisfactory manner.

Smoke Abatement. Smoke nuisances from various factory chimneys have been reported, and although the nuisances have been minimised, there is still room for improvement in some cases.

The Sanitary Inspector advises the tenants on precautions to be taken to prevent recurrence.

## Section E.

#### INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

(a) Milk Supply.—Pasteurisation is carried out on a large scale at Messrs. Nestles' and the Co-operative Society's premises, the latter Company having recently purchased a new pasteurising plant. Frequent samples are taken to ensure that the plant is working satisfactorily, and that the raw milk is up to standard in fat content. The results of the cleansing processes to which the milk supply is subjected at these premises, emphasise the necessity for constant vigilance to ensure cleanliness of production at the source. It is to be hoped that the Bucks water scheme will assist milk producers in their endeavours in this direction.

Three Cowkeepers within the Borough are licensed by the County Council as producers of "Accredited" Milk. Another Cowkeeper is licensed by the County Council to produce "Tuberculin Tested" milk.

The returns show a falling off in the number of animals slaughtered and that the quantity of unsound food decreased by 5,813 lbs. It has not been necessary to take any legal proceedings during the year and the meat traders are to be congratulated upon the methods adopted to protect meat from dust and flies, for the general cleanliness of their premises and their slaughterhouses and for the care taken to ensure that no unnecessary suffering is inflicted upon the animals intended for food. Under the provisions of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938 new legislation affecting slaughterhouses comes into operation during 1939 and such will be placed before the Council in due course.

My thanks, also those of the general public are again due to the Aylesbury Cattle Insurance Society, whose efforts do so much to guarantee a disease free meat supply to everyone trading in this Borough.

#### SHOPS ACTS.

These Acts become more difficult to apply every year and much time has been occupied in explaining to shopkeepers the various provisions; especially has this been the case under the 1934 Act, dealing with the employment of young persons and the Sunday Closing Act. I am of opinion the traders of this Borough have no desire to contravene the Acts and until that opinion is altered I shall welcome the opportunity to assist them by explaining to any or all of them any point they desire to raise.

240 visits were made during the year.

#### GENERAL.

The foregoing are briefly the facts one is able to report upon. These could have been lengthened by superfluous remarks, plus hundreds of other minor matters occupying our time. The Department, was also called upon to put in a lot of additional work during the National Crisis and at the moment of writing the staff, together with additional clerical assistance, are helping with the Government Evacuation Scheme.

I would once again call the attention of the Council to the unsatisfactory condition of the accommodation roads in various parts of the town which in previous annual reports I have termed elongated dustholes.

I take this opportunity to thank the Health Committee, my colleagues and my very small staff for the consideration and assistance rendered me during the year.
