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

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES. Infectious Diseases.

their appreciation and use by the population.

Cases of infectious disease requiring hospital treatment are admitted to the Aylesbury Joint Board Isolation Hospital, Aylesbury (69 beds, including 2 blocks of the cubicle type). The hospital is under the medical superintendence of the Medical Officer of Health of the Borough, and has a consultant surgeon.

Pathological Specimens.

Pathological Specimens are examined at:-

- 1. The Emergency Public Health Laboratory Service, South Parks Road, Oxford.
- 2. The Stoke Mandeville Ministry of Pensions Hospital, Aylesbury.

Voluntary Hospital.

The town is served by the Royal Bucks Hospital, which also provides accommodation for the neighbouring districts. Although excellent work is carried out by this hospital, the accommodation and staff are inadequate to deal with the large demands on the hospital.

During 1944 temporary relief has been afforded by the Tindal House E.M.S. Hospital and the Stoke Mandeville (Ministry of Pensions) E.M.S. Hospital, which have admitted cases (figures unobtainable, but running into hundreds) when no beds have been available at the Royal Bucks Hospital. If and when these auxiliary hospitals leave the area the need for extra hospital accommodation for the inhabitants of the Borough and district will become aggravated.

This urgent want is particularly applicable to the maternity beds, as even now the accommodation for such cases is extremely limited, and the demand for same will most likely be increased in the immediate post war years.

Ambulance Services of the Borough.

The St. John Ambulance Brigade maintain three ambulances for dealing with accident and other cases. The ambulance services of the Borough are adequate.

Maternity and Child Welfare.

The Infant Welfare Centre, situate in Church Row, is under the control of the Bucks County Council, and is open as an Infant Welfare Clinic every Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. The premises are also used as a dental clinic for children of school age.

The urgent need for maternity beds has been stressed above.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

Diphtheria immunisation has continued to be carried out during the year. One hundred and nineteen school children have been inoculated at the monthly school clinic, Pebble Lane, Aylesbury; two hundred and fifty-three children under the age of five have been immunised at the Infant Welfare Centre.

Government Sick Bay.

Number treated:—Forty-one in-patients, nineteen outpatients.

Minor ailments occurring amongst the evacuees have been treated in the Sick Bay at 9, Bicester Road. The number actually treated during the year has been insufficient to task the staff maintained. The need for this Sick Bay has now ceased.

Treatment of Venereal Diseases.

The County Council is a participant in the London and Home Counties Joint Scheme operated by the London County Council, so that local victims of these diseases may receive free treatment, either at the Royal Bucks Hospital, or any other approved clinic.

The number of cases of venereal diseases amongst Aylesbury inhabitants receiving treatment at the Royal Bucks Clinic during 1944 was forty-four. This does not include those local inhabitants who seek treatment at other centres.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply.

The Borough receives its water supply from the wells by the Chiltern Hills Spring Water Company.

The supply has been satisfactory in quality, but not always in quantity, the supply having to be cut off at night during the summer period.

No analysis has been made of the raw water, but eleven samples from tap supply have been taken during the year, and in each case the result was satisfactory.

All save two houses in the Borough are supplied directly from public water mains, the exceptions having private wells.

Drainage and Sewerage.

The drainage and sewerage of the Borough is satisfactory, and is on the partially separate system, surface water from streets and buildings being discharged to water-courses at various points. Owing to the differences in level, four localities are provided with pumping stations to lift the sewage into the main sewers. These are situated at Mandeville Road, Buckingham Road, California and Tring Road.

Sewage Disposal.

The Sewage Disposal Works, situated near the boundary of the town, continues to function satisfactorily.

Public Conveniences.

The supervision of these conveniences is under the Chief Sanitary Inspector.

The town is well served by the conveniences for both sexes under the island in Kingsbury Square, used as a centre for omnibus services, and also at the Vale Ground, High Street; there is a gentlemen's convenience adjoining the Cattle Market, and temporary urinals in Upper Hundreds and Walton Road.

Public Cleansing.

This has proceeded in a satisfactory manner.

Open Air Swimming Pool, Park Street.

The purification of the water in the open-air Swimming Pool continues to be satisfactory.

Indoor Swimming Bath, Bourbon Street.

These premises have only been used for slipper baths during the year.

Eradication of Bed Bugs.

Sixty-two rooms have been disinfested against bed bugs; "Thermotox" gas blocks and "Zaldecide" insecticide being used successfully.

Schools.

The general sanitary condition of the Elementary Schools in the Borough is good, and the water supply is sufficient.

In addition to the above, other visits include those under the Housing Act, Factories Act, Shops Act, Public Conveniences, Rats and Mice Destruction Act, Petroleum Act, Disinfestation of Vermin Infested Properties, and Inspection of Billets. These are all shown under their respective headings in this Report.

HOUSING ACT, 1935.

Active work under the above-mentioned Act is still in abeyance, but 110 inspections and 78 re-inspections have been carried out. In only one case was it necessary to take statutory action to enforce the execution of repairs.

Under the Government's scheme of priority for works of an urgent and essential character 34 certificates of essentiality were issued during the year. This has entailed a considerable amount of work in checking applications and supervising work in progress, and on one occasion it was necessary to interview the Regional Licensing Officer at Reading to enable work which ultimately provided an additional flat, to be proceeded with.

In addition to the normal work of repair carried out under this scheme, alterations which have had the effect of providing additional accommodation in the Borough to the extent of 5 flats have been approved and executed.

MILK (SPECIAL DESIGNATIONS) ORDER, 1936

Three Cowkeepers within the Borough are licensed by the County Council as producers of "Accredited" milk. Another Cowkeeper is licensed by the County Council to produce "Tuberculin Tested" milk.

Two dairies hold "Pasteuriser's" licences, five milk purveyors are licensed to retail "Tuberculin Tested" milk, and one to retail "Pasteurised" milk, and another purveyor is licensed to bottle and retail "Tuberculin Tested" milk. These licences are issued by the Borough Council.

Forty-nine samples of milk were taken during the year, the majority of which satisfied the requirements of the Milk (Special Designations) Order. In the case of those which failed to reach the required standard investigations were made and the source of failure eliminated, further samples proving satisfactory.

Following complaints of poor keeping quality of Pasteurised milk supplied in the Borough exhaustive investigations were made, and apart from one period round Whitsun, no evidence was discovered which could support the complaints; on the contrary, from evidence produced by some of the largest consumers of Pasteurised milk in the Borough it was evident that the Pasteurisation was efficiently carried out consistently throughout the year.

The reason for the reduction in the number of licences is due to War conditions, consequently the storage quantity and fees are less in proportion.

CANAL BOATS ACTS AND REGULATIONS.

During the whole of the year under review the branch of the canal serving Aylesbury has been closed due to lack of water, and no inspections have been possible.

SHOPS ACTS.

Strict supervision under the above-mentioned Acts is not so necessary as in times of peace, closing hours being now far below those allowed by the Acts.

5 visits were made during the year.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES.

Wilful damage and misuse at the premises without a fulltime attendant continued and caused many complaints during the early part of the year. The conditions were partly due to changes in the staff, some of whom were unsatisfactory.

At the end of August two men were appointed to take charge of the unattended conveniences and to act as reliefs at Kingsbury Square, and since that date the complaints regarding the condition of these conveniences have fallen to negligible proportions, and the amount of damage done has also declined.

409 visits were made during the year.

RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACT, 1919. RODENT INFESTATION ORDER, 1943.

A very appreciable amount of work has been done under this heading, as will be seen from the following summary.

The Committee appreciate the difficulties of administration caused by the Ministry's insistence on recovery of costs of work of rodent destruction from the occupiers of property, and further comment on my part in this report would be superfluous.

In addition to the above Mr. S. Skoyles has continued to deal with certain premises in the Borough, and estimates to have destroyed 273 rats.

WATER SUPPLY.

Eleven samples have, been submitted to the Analyst during the year and all were found to be fit for drinking and domestic purposes.

BILLETS.

All possible assistance has been given to the Billeting Officer and the W.V.S. to ensure that proposed billets are

clean and suitable for the purpose. This procedure also provides the opportunity when claims for damage to billets occur, to form a clear judgment upon the responsibility for such. The number of billets inspected was 575, and this necessitated 720 visits.

DISINFESTATION.

Disinfestation of premises against vermin has been carried out by gassing and spraying, whilst the gassing chamber at the rear of Church House has been used for the treatment of bedding and clothing, and in all cases where bedding has been used in billets this has been done before sending same to the laundry.

The gassing chamber mentioned above was in use on thirteen occasions.

62 rooms were treated against vermin.

FOOD DECONTAMINATION.

Lectures and demonstrations in food decontamination were continued during the early part of the year, but have been discontinued since the reduction in Civil Defence duties. The members of the squad continue to hold themselves available for duty should the necessity arise.

GENERAL.

The foregoing sets out briefly the main work of the Department during the year, but it is of course impossible, in a report such as this, to indicate the various visits, interviews and miscellaneous duties incurred throughout the year.

No further news has been received of Douglas Andrew. Dennis Rixon is still on service in England, and Douglas Keen in India.

Mr. E. Birch, who was seconded from the Bradford City Council, commenced his duties with the Department on 17th January. Mr. Birch has carried out all the duties entrusted to him in an efficient and tactful manner, and his assistance has been of great value to me.

Finally, I wish to express my thanks to members of the Council for their continued help and encouragement, to members of my staff for their loyal co-operation, and to my fellow officers for advice and assistance.
