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

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report on the health and vital statistics of the Borough of Aylesbury for the year 1950.

Incorporated in the report is the survey by the No. 1 (Northants) Mass Radiography Unit, administered by the Oxford Regional Hospital Board, which provided facilities from June to August for X-ray examination of all residents in the area who wished to take advantage of the scheme.

The incidence of infectious disease during the year was not abnormal. Two cases of enteric fever were notified, one of which was resident in the Borough. As a result of investigation in the latter case three other members of the family were found to be carriers and isolated, being subsequently cleared of infection. The original source or vehicle of infection was never discovered.

There was no case of diphtheria or anterior poliomyelitis during the year, but whooping cough and measles continue to be the most debilitating diseases of children. Seventy-three cases of whooping cough in children under 10 years, and twenty-nine of measles being notified during the year. One case of food poisoning was notified. It was a mild case, S. typhi murium, was isolated, and the patient made an uneventful recovery after treatment at home.

I am happy to record my thanks to all members of the Council, and particularly the members of the Public Health Committee, for their help in maintaining healthy conditions in the town. Commendation is also due to all members of the staff for their willing assistance and good work throughout the year,

## GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES.

Hospitals.

Hospital accommodation for the Borough is provided by the Royal Bucks and Tindal General Hospitals. Infectious disease cases are admitted to the Aylesbury Isolation Hospital.

The three hospitals are administered by the Aylesbury and District Hospital Management Committee.

Cases are admitted to the Stoke Mandeville Hospital if bed space is unavailable at the General hospitals.

Pathological Specimens.

The majority of specimens for examination are submitted to the Pathology Laboratory, Stoke Mandeville Hospital. The services of the Public Health Laboratories at Luton and Oxford are utilised whenever necessary.

Ambulance Services of the Borough.

The ambulance services in the area are the responsibility of the Bucks County Council.

Five ambulances are stationed in the Borough for use in the town and surrounding district. Included in this number is a sitting-case ambulance and a vehicle garaged at the Isolation Hospital for transporting infectious disease cases.

Maternity and Child Welfare.

This service is controlled by the Bucks County Council. Infant Welfare Clinics are held at Pebble Lane, Quarrendon Estate and Southcourt.

Diphtheria and Whooping-Cough Immunisation.

The Bucks County Council, being the Local Health Authority as defined by the National Health Service Act, 1946, administer this service.

Treatment of Venereal Disease.

A venereal disease clinic is held regularly at the Royal Bucks Hospital, where free treatment is given. This clinic is administered by the Aylesbury and District Hospital Management Committee.

# SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES IN THE AREA.

Water Supply.

The water supply for the Borough is supplied by the Bucks Water Board from wells situated at New Ground, Dancers End and Hawridge which are along the Chiltern range of hills.

During the year the following bacteriological samples were taken by the Bucks Water Board:—

The reports on these samples were all satisfactory and the water was "clear and bright in appearance and conforms to the highest standard of bacterial purity."

A sample taken from a domestic source was submitted for chemical analysis and the report was as follows:—

"This sample is practically clear and bright in appearance, neutral in reaction and free from iron and other metals. The water has very moderate hardness and it contains no excess of salinity or mineral constituents in solution. It is of the highest standard of organic and bacterial purity.

These results are consistent with a pure and wholesome water suitable for drinking and domestic use and the manufacture of beverages.

Twelve samples for bacteriological examination were taken from domestic sources by this Department and all proved to be satisfactory.

All dwelling houses in the Borough are connected to the mains supply and the quantity of water supplied to the town is adequate.

Drainage and Sewerage.

Part of the drainage and sewerage of the Borough is on the separate system, with surface water from buildings and streets in the more modern areas of the town being discharged to water courses.

The foul water system continues to function satisfactorily but on certain sections of the surface water system flooding has occurred due to the inadequate size of the pipes. Agreement has been reached between the Borough and County Councils and owners of property concerned to effect the necessary works to abate such flooding.

Sewage from the low-lying Buckingham Road, California, Mandeville Road and Tring Road areas is raised by means of pumps to the main outfall sewers.

Sewage Disposal.

All sewage from the town is treated at the Sewage Disposal Works situated in Griffin Lane.

The plant consists of detritus and sedimentation tanks, followed by rotary filters and land treatment.

The plant functions satisfactorily during dry weather giving a good effluent but when the sewage is supplemented by rainfall the works are inadequate to deal with the increased flow and flooding of the plant results.

# Public Cleansing.

It has been found that due to the increase of house refuse and the age of the plant, it is difficult to dispose of the refuse in a satisfactory manner.

Arrangements are being made for all refuse to be disposed of by controlled tipping at a site near the outskirts of the town.

The collection service continues to be operated in an efficient manner.

Open-Air Swimming Pool, Park Street.

The Swimming Pool water is treated by the chlorine-ammonia process.

Five samples taken during the period May to October proved that the plant was working and being operated satisfactorily.

Indoor Swimming Bath, Bourbon Street.

.Only the slipper baths are in use at these premises; no complaints have been received during the year from this source.

# Eradication of Bed Bugs.

Sixty-five rooms were disinfested against bed bugs, D.D.T. liquid and/or dust being applied on all occasions.

## Schools.

A new school situated at Oak Green was opened early in

the year.

All schools in the town are provided with an adequate water supply and the sanitary accommodation is satisfactory.

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the work carried out by the Public Health Department in the year 1950.

#### HOUSING.

Scarcity of building labour and materials and the need for the fullest employment on new buildings has once again prevented the resumption of routine housing inspections.

Investigations following complaints has resulted in 112 inspections and 367 re-inspections of dwelling houses being carried out under the Public Health and Housing Acts, in consequence of which fifty-one informal and thirteen Statutory notices were served, and forty-one houses were rendered habitable.

In five instances work was carried out by the Council in default of the owners, in compliance with the requirements of Section 10 of the Housing Act, 1936. The costs of such work amounted to £78 7s. 1d. which was recovered from the owners.

An undertaking was accepted from the owner of Nos. 9, 11 and 15, Upper Hundreds, that the houses would not be used for human habitation in view of their dilapidated condition. Two of the properties are now vacant, and housing accommodation will be provided for the third family as soon as possible.

In one case in which Closing Order procedure under Section 11 of the Housing Act was contemplated owing to extensive dilapidation, the property has now changed hands and the new owner is prepared to carry out the necessary repairs.

Overcrowding.

During the year three cases of overcrowding were investigated.

It is impossible to assess the actual degree of overcrowding in the Borough, but there can be no doubt that a considerable amount of overcrowding does exist.

Several enquiries for the "permitted numbers" of dwelling houses have been received and dealt with in the year, and the figure of the "permitted number" has been supplied in respect of all newly completed Council houses.

## Disinfestation.

Twenty-three premises were inspected for verminous infestation and resulted in sixty-five rooms being disinfested. D.D.T. solutions and powders were again used with satisfactory results.

## FOOD.

# Slaughterhouse.

For the eleventh year all slaughtering was carried out at the Government controlled Slaughterhouse in Silver Lane. Despite certain minor improvements, including the provision of hot water over the wash-hand basins and reconstruction of part of the drainage system, both following recommendations from this Department, all that has been said previously regarding the inadequacy of the premises has been emphasised by the heavy kill during the year.

This was particularly noticeable during the third and fourth quarters of the year, when inspections necessitated the working of 152 hours overtime.

The heavy increase in the number of pigs slaughtered during the second quarter of the year was due to the fact that the bacon factories in the area were unable to cope with the large number of pigs sent in, and many had to be diverted to other slaughterhouses.

The report of the Inter-Departmental Committee on Meat Inspection was expected last Autumn, but has not been published to date.

Following investigation of the unsatisfactory samples, repeat testing proved in each case that the necessary standard was achieved.

## BAKE-HOUSES.

The general standards of cleanliness and hygiene in the thirteen bakehouses of the town continue to be satisfactory. Two cases of foreign bodies in bread and cake were reported and investigated during the year and warnings as to the need of the utmost care to guard against such accidents were given.

#### ICE CREAM.

Nine premises are registered for the manufacture of ice cream and fifty-six premises for the sale of ice cream in compliance with the provisions of Section 14 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938. Seventy-four visits were made to ice cream premises during the year to ensure that the necessary standards of hygiene were observed, and forty-three visits for sampling purposes.

Thirty-nine samples for bacteriological examination were taken, and apart from two instances when unsterilised serving instruments had been used, all the reports were satisfactory.

Much work has been carried out at the premises mentioned in last year's report and I have now to state that consistent satisfactory reports on samples taken are being received.

# CLEAN FOOD CAMPAIGN.

Following the inaugural meeting referred to in my last report, the Aylesbury Hygienic Food Traders' Guild was formed and officially opened on August 1st, following many months of Committee work.

At the moment there are twenty-four Trader Members and eighty-six Employee members, all of whom have undertaken to observe the Codes of Practice laid down for their particular trades.

A film show in connection with the Guild was held on December 5th when the attendance was badly affected by adverse weather conditions. It is proposed to arrange lectures and demonstrations for food handlers during the coming year.

# WATER SUPPLY.

A piped water supply is laid on at every house in the Borough, the water being supplied by the Bucks Water Board.

The bacteriological standard of the water remained satisfactory, as shown by the reports on the twelve samples of water submitted to the Pathology Laboratory, Stoke Mandeville Hospital, for examination.

No complaints of excessive hardness were received during the year.

# PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

This Act, which came into operation on April 1st last, replaced the Rats and Mice Destruction Act, 1919, which is repealed. The main changes are:—

- 1. The Borough Council is now the Statutory Authority for the purposes of the Act instead of acting under delegated powers from the County Council.
- 2. There is an obligation on occupiers of land to notify the Local Authority of the presence of rats or mice.
- 3. One half of the expenses incurred in carrying out the provisions of the Act will be met by an Exchequer grant.

The figures of work done under this heading as set out in the following table indicate that the incidence of rat and mouse infestation remains fairly static, and that the public are aware of the services offered and make good use of them.

Co-operation with the business interests in the town remains good and sixteen agreements for a total sum of £156 10s. have been entered into. The actual cost of all other work done on business premises is recovered, while a free service is given to private dwellings.

The service treatments of the sewers showed that the amount of rat infestation had not increased appreciably, but the Refuse Disposal and Sewage Works were heavily infested before treatment was carried out in the Autumn.

The case reported as outstanding in the last report was successfully dealt with early in the year, and no re-infestation from this property has been reported.

In addition to the rodent work, seven wasps' nests were destroyed and one building was treated for cockroaches.
