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

Pathology Laboratory, Stoke Mandeville Hospital

Routine samples of ice cream and water and other specimens requiring bacteriological examination were sent to this Laboratory throughout the period of this Report. Reports were received with the minimum delay, and the help and advice given by the Medical Director were much appreciated.

Open Air Swimming Pool, Park Street

Fourteen samples were taken from the above Pool, (eleven for chlorine and pH content, and three for bacteriological examination), all of which were satisfactory.

The number of bathers using the Pool during the period under review was 71,947. The figure for 1972 was 41,035.

Sauna Path

The number of attendances at the Sauna Bath during the fifteen months was 2,993.

School Swimming Pools

At the request of the County Health Inspector, the Department accepted responsibility for sampling the school swimming pools in the Borough.

Eighteen samples (ten bacteriological and eight for chlorine content) were taken during the period under review. One of these samples proved to be unsatisfactory due to low chlorination.

Hot Baths

Attendances at the Hot Baths, adjoining the Swimming Pool at Park Street, amounted to a total of 1,570 during the fifteen months.

Schools

The water supply and sanitary accommodation to all schools in the Borough are adequate.

Mr. Hannay stated that the total rainfall for the year was 17.77 inches; which was well below the yearly average of 24.68 inches, and the lowest since 1964, when 17.70 inches was recorded.

The amount of rainfall for March was the lowest recorded for that month for twelve years, and the rainfall in June was the second highest for that month for nineteen years.

The highest daily rainfall occurred on 19th June, when 1.22 inches was recorded.

A substantial proportion of the District Public Health Inspectors time was spent in the administration of this aspect of our duties, 735 inspections of food premises were made, and 7 informal notices, requiring the execution of works, to bring premises up to a standard to comply with the Food Hygiene (General) Regulations, 1970, were served, all the notices were complied with.

Four prosecutions for offences under the Food & Drugs Act were taken during the fifteen months. The first concerned a piece of cotton thread in a bread roll. The case was proved and a fine of £20 was imposed. The second case concerned dirty milk bottles. The case was proved and a fine of £20 was imposed. The third case was in connection with bread rolls, which contained insects, (rice weevils and flour beetles), this case was also proved, and the fine was £20 plus £10.14 costs. The fourth case concerned a mouldy sliced brown loaf. The case was proved, and a fine of £25, plus £13.50 costs was imposed.

MILK AND DAIRIES

There are sixty-one retailers of milk in the Borough registered under the above Regulations.

Isted to motted no stangen ICE CREAM

There are one hundred and twenty-one premises in the town registered for the sale of ice cream, in addition, a number of vendors, who are not subject to registration, tour the streets in mobile vehicles selling ice cream and ice lollies. Most of the mobile ice cream vendors now sell soft ice cream, and the majority of the bacteriological sampling of ice cream, in the Department, is directed towards this outlet.

The following table shows the grading which was given to the various bacteriological samples submitted for examination. Grade 3 and 4 samples are considered to be unsatisfactory, and the principal reason for an unsatisfactory sample being obtained is the inadequate cleansing of the equipment.

Out of a total of nineteen samples of ice cream which were examined bacteriologically during the period, seven were unsatisfactory.

Thirty-five visits were paid to ice cream dealers premises and premises from which mobile vans operated during the fifteen months covered by the report.

CLEAN AIR ACT, 1956 AND 1968

The Aylesbury No.2. Smoke Control Order,1972, which was confirmed by the Secretary of State for the Department of the Environment on 16th August,1972, came into operation on the 1st July,1973. The Area comprises 1,604 domestic dwellings, of which 1,581 are privately owned. In addition there are 12 industrial premises, 48 commercial premises, and 15 other premises, i.e., schools, churches, etc. The No.2. Area comprises 388 acres.

The Aylesbury No.3. Smoke Control Order,1972, which was confirmed by the Secretary of State for the Department of the Environment on 18th April,1973, came into operation on the 1st November,1973. The Area comprises 1,357 domestic dwellings, 1,237 of which are privately owned. In addition, there are 22 industrial premises, 26 commercial premises, and 9 other premises, i.e., schools, churches, etc. The No.3. Area comprises 249.5 acres.

During the period of the report twenty-four smoke observations were carried out, and twenty-seven complaints were received concerning emissions of smoke, grit and fumes, all of these complaints were investigated, and the appropriate action taken.

Under section 6 of the 1968 Act, ten applications for prior approval of chimneys, serving furnaces, were received during the period of the report.

INVESTIGATION OF ATMOSPHERIC POLLUTION

In co-operation with Warren Spring Laboratory, Department of Scientific and Industrial Research, four sites for volumetric apparatus are maintained in the town, and daily recordings of smoke concentrations and levels of sulphur dioxide are made.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

One hundred and twenty-three inspections and re-inspections under the provisions of the above Act were made during the fifteen months under review. Ten informal notices for contraventions of the Act were served. Generally speaking, however, the notices were for contraventions of a minor nature.

Sixteen accidents were reported during the period under review.

One of these accidents involved a 16 yrs old boy, who lost the tops of three fingers of his left hand whilst cleaning a hand operated slicing machine. Although the legal notices were displayed near the machine, this apprentice had been in the habit of cleaning it.

A prosecution was taken against the Company under sections 18 and 19 of the Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act, 1963. However, the Magistrates dismissed the summons on both counts, being satisfied that so far as section 18 was concerned, the Company had exercised due diligence, and so far as section 19 was concerned, it was considered that the apprentice was under adequate supervision.

NOISE ABATEMENT ACT, 1960
