To the Chairman and Members of the RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL OF AYLESBURY

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES and GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report on the health and vital statistics of the Aylesbury Rural District for the year 1953, together with the report of the Chief Sanitary Inspector and Surveyor on the sanitary circumstances, and work of the Sanitary Inspectors throughout the area.

The year has been particularly notable in its freedom from infectious disease of epidemic proportions, apart from the anticipated biennial increase in measles notifications.

No case of diphtheria was notified and only five cases of whooping cough.

There was no case of food poisoning notified.

The nine cases of infection of the enteric group were cases of dysentery from the St. John's Mental Hospital at Stone.

Three cases of anterior poliomyelitis were notified during the year, two adults and one child. They were sporadic cases and the source of infection was not traced. Two of the cases died, the child died shortly after the onset of disease before admission to hospital. The third case recovered without complications following treatment at the Isolation Hospital.

The one case of cerebro-spinal meningitis notified occurred in a child as a complication of a cerebral abscess. Complete recovery followed treatment in hospital.

With the advances in chemotherapy and antibiotics there is an increasing tendency to treat the minor infectious diseases "at home" rather than in hospital. Evidence of this is seen in the cases of scarlet fever, for out of the 32 cases notified only twelve were treated in hospital, and six of these were pupils from the Blind School at Dorton where isolation accommodation is inadequate.

Included in the Report are the particulars and findings of the No. 1 (Northants) Mass Radiography Unit, in their survey of St. John's Hospital, Halton County School and Westcott.

I wish to thank the Council and Public Health Committee for their support and assistance throughout the year, also the Chief Sanitary Inspector, and staff of the Health Department, for their help during that period.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES

Hospitals

Hospital accommodation for the District is provided by the Royal Bucks and Tindal General Hospitals. Infectious disease cases are admitted to the Aylesbury Isolation Hospital.

These three hospitals are administered by the Aylesbury and District Hospital Management Committee.

Cases are admitted to the Stoke Mandeville Hospital or the Radcliffe Infirmary, Oxford, if bed space is unavailable. Similarly, infectious disease cases are admitted to infectious disease hospitals within the Oxford region when there is no accommodation locally.

Pathological Specimens

The majority of specimens for examination are submitted to the Pathology Laboratory, Stoke Mandeville Hospital. The services of the Public Health Laboratories at Luton and Oxford are utilised whenever necessary.

Ambulance Services

The ambulance services in the area are the responsibility of the Bucks County Council. Five ambulances are stationed in the Borough of Aylesbury for the use of the town and surrounding district.

Maternity and Child Welfare

This service is controlled by the Bucks County Council.

Infant Welfare Clinics are held at Aylesbury, Brill, Long Crendon,
Waddesdon, Quainton, Cuddington, Haddenham, Wendover, Whitchurch
and Worminghall.

Diphtheria and Whooping Cough Immunisation

The Bucks County Council, being the Local Health Authority as defined by the National Health Service Act, 1946, administer this service.

Treatment of Venereal Disease

A venereal disease clinic is held regularly at the Royal Bucks Hospital, Aylesbury, where free treatment is given. This clinic is administered by the Aylesbury and District Hospital Management Committee.

To the Chairman and Members of the RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL OF AYLESBURY

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to report on the work of the Inspector's branch of the Department for the year 1953. As this will be the last annual report bearing my name I wish to record my thanks to the Members of the Council for their interest in the work of the Department and continued support. I also take the opportunity of emphasising my appreciation of the loyalty and support of the staff during my period of service as Chief Officer.

HOUSING

There was increased activity in connection with properties which were unfit for human habitation. Several Demolition and Closing Orders were made and a number of Undertakings not to relet until made fit were accepted by the Council.

In two instances the houses were made fit and the Undertakings accordingly cancelled.

With the easing of the situation in respect of building materials there was evidence of some increased activity by owners to provide improved sanitary conditions, and also effect general repairs. A considerable amount of this work called for consideration, technical advice and supervision by the Department. The high cost of building work, however, in relation to the income from rents continued to have a limiting effect on the general situation in respect of property repair.

IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

Greater interest was shown on the part of owners in the Improvement Grant provisions of the Housing Act, 1949.

Grants in respect of several properties were approved, and a number of proposals were in the preliminary stage at the end of the year.

WATER SUPPLY

The majority of the houses in the village of Dorton were dependent on standpipes, the source of supply being a local spring. Systematic sampling revealed that the quality of the supply was unreliable. After discussing the various circumstances with the owners concerned arrangements were made for the properties to be connected to the Water Board's main.

The joint scheme for supplying five cottages on The Common, Brill, was carried out as arranged, and a considerable number of other properties were provided with mains water as a result of Statutory and informal action.

SEWERAGE

Ickford and Worminghall

The construction of the disposel works was in progress at the year end, and the laying of the sewers in both parishes was rapidly nearing completion.

Quainton Scheme Stage I

The laying of one section of the sewers and the formation of an irrigation area on the site of the future disposal works was completed under the supervision of the Department's staff. This section of the work eliminated a long standing nuisance in the Station Road area.

Aston Clinton

The Council's Consulting Engineers submitted a scheme for enlarging the works to provide for the considerable increase in the daily flow.

The volume of sewage flowing to the works at Aston Clinton, Wendover, Whitchurch, Haddenham, Stone, Waddesdon and Long Crendon causes overloading and samples of the effluent taken by the Thames Conservancy Inspectors from several of the works mentioned have been found, on occasion, to fall below the accepted standard.

It is fair to say that the men in charge have maintained the works generally in a satisfactory condition.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

Despite the continual shortage of labour, and the increase in the number of houses, the regular collection of house refuse was well maintained.

There was a noticeable increase in the volume of refuse brought to the disposal site, which seems to indicate that having a regular collection available householders make full use of the service.

The three Paxit collecting vehicles continue to give satisfactory service, and these machines, together with the ten-cubic-yard side loader, have, as a result of careful arrangement of the daily schedules, proved capable so far, but with difficulty at times, of dealing with the increased amount of work which it should be appreciated has now reached the limit for the present vehicles and manpower.

Disposal Following a working demonstration at the disposal site at Hartwell the Council acquired a Chaseside Hi Lift loading shovel, complete with bulldozer attachment which commenced work in August. It soon became apparent that with this machine effective control of the disposal site was possible to a much greater degree than hitherto. The general appearance of the site has been much improved, and at the end of the year a considerable area had been levelled in readiness for finalcovering. CESSPOOL AND PAIL EMPTYING SERVICE The latest addition to the Council's fleet, the Dennis 800 gallon Cesspool Emptier fitted with a diesel oil engine, proved its economy. The fuel oil consumption records show that this vehicle can be operated at half the cost of a similar machine with an engine using petrol. Full advantage of this economy is secured by the use of the machine on work which entails the greater mileage. The closing of the disposal site for Cesspool sewage at Whitchurch, and the increasing difficulty in securing suitable

sites in the near vicinity of the areas of work, has regulted in an increased mileage for several of the machines.

As an indication of the extent of the Pail emptying service a weekly collection of approximately 1,400 pails is undertaken in 32 Parishes. The value of this work as a contribution towards healthy environmental conditions where modern sanitation is lacking, is in my opinion inestimable.

It should be appreciated that workmen are becoming less willing to undertake this class of work despite additional monetary reward, and the service throughout the district has only been maintained by increasing the schedule of those workmen still willing to continue.

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949

Routine inspections of domestic, business and farm premises have been made, and appropriate treatment carried out. Special attention was directed to the conditions at the Council's Refuse and Sewage Disposal Sites and periodic test baiting and treatment of the sewerage systems also undertaken.

EDUCATION

Once again three students from West Africa, visiting this country to study Local Government, spent some time in the Department. They were given instruction relating to the administrative and technical work, and accompanied members of th staff when on duty in many parts of the district. They were thus able to gain some knowledge of the extent of the various works and the area for which the Council is responsible.
