The Population of the District 189,354; the area 04,565 acres The total number of births during the year were I48., 77 marks nale and 7I female. There were one male illigitimate birth and 3 female illegitimate births. The birth-rate per thousand was I4.9.

DELATH3.

The total number of deaths at all ages and from all causes were 90., 57 male and 33 female. The death rate per thousand being 9.6.

There were no deaths from Zymotic disease during the year (excluding fuberoulosis).

DIPHTHERIA .

Three cases occured in a small farmnouse on the extrime border of the district in close proximity to a mining town, and I mave no doubt were infected originally out of the district, the place was in protect and thoroughly disinfected, no death occured.

SCARLED EVEN.

Eleven cases were notified to me during the year, none were fatal. In most instances they were infected from cases outside the district. F ive were fatal removed to Hospital.

ENTLAIC FLVER.

One case only occurred in the District. This was imported, the patient suffering from the disease on his arrival. Allprecautions were taken.

TUBLACULOSIS.

Three cases were notified of this disease coourring in the respiratory tract and five in other places. All precautions are taken as to disinfection etc. and the cases are reported at the end of every Quarter.

SCHOOLS .

These are under the control of the County Medical Service, and are in fair condition. They are disinfected by the County.

HOUSILG.

The number of houses in this District is still inadequate, and many of those existing are in a very bad condition.

A debailed report will be found in your Sanitary Inspector's Report.

DAIRIES AND CONSHEDS.

These have been greatly improved, but a great deal still remains to be done. The constant visits of your Inspector is causing very marked improvements.

VATER SUPPLY.

The Water-supply generally has improved. I hope that the projected plane for Water Supply and Sewerage on the hardy, and for a Water Supply in Govilon will mature to the benefit of the inhabitants.

FACTONY AND WOMKSHOPS.







(I) Public Health (heat) Regulations 1924. There are two registered

slaughterhouses in this District, but NO Public SL-ughterhouses. These are, structurally in fairly good condition; and are only used very occasionally. All concerned accepted the 1924 regulations re the giving of notice of slaughter, in a favourable manner. Food surrendered IO lbs. Beef Liver.

(2) <u>River or Stream Pollution</u>. Pollution of rivers or streams in this District has not been found serious enough to merit any special action.

(3) <u>Milk Supply</u>. The wholesomeness of milk product. in the District is, on the whole very satisfactory. Milksellers are consciencious in their efforts to improve the conditions governing clean milk production.

Milk and Dairies(Consolidation) Act 1915. No action has been taken regarding Tuberculous wilk, but special attention is at all times puid to the general appearance of the cows, and of persons engaged in the handling of milk.

(4) <u>Isolation Rospital Accomposition</u>. Accomposition is provided for 24 patients. Only one type of disease can be treated at a time.

(5) <u>Bakehouses</u>. There are no bakehouses in the District.

(6) <u>Pathelogical and Bioteriological Specimens.</u> This work is carried out by the County Council.

(7) <u>Prevalence of Notificble Diseases.</u> Except for a very slight epidemic of Smallpox early in 1923, there has been no undue prevalence of Infectious Disease. It is hoped that the proposed Mardy and Govilon Sewerage Schemes will soon mature, to the benefit of the Public Health.




