### REPORT

OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH TO THE URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL OF ABERTILLERY FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31st, 1968.

To the Chairman and Members of Abertillery Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

The Abertillery Urban District is situated in the Western Valleys of Monmouthshire, 13 miles north-west of Newport, and 20 miles southwest of Monmouth.

Its greatest length, north to south is  $6\frac{1}{2}$  miles, while it varies in breadth, east to west, from  $\frac{1}{2}$  to  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles. It has an area of  $10\frac{1}{4}$  square miles, being one of the largest Urban Districts in the County. The population is 22,950, and the rateable value is £,409,506.

The estimated product of a penny rate is £,1553.

The Urban Area is divided into 5 wards:

- Ward 1. Llanhilleth—This includes that part of Llanhilleth south-east of the Nant-Cuffin, with the portions of Crumlin and Hafodyrynys which are within the district. Members on Council, 3. Area, 894 acres. Estimated Electors, 2,499.
- Ward 2. Aberbeeg.—Comprises Aberbeeg and that portion of Llanhilleth N.W. of the Nant Cuffin. Members on Council, 3. Area, 927 acres. Estimated Electors, 2,240.
- Ward 3. Six Bells.—Comprises Warm Turn, Six Bells, and that portion of Abertillery south of Cwm Road and the Vivian Pit. Members on Council, 3. Area, 1,092 acres. Estimated Electors, 2,427.
- Ward 4. Abertillery.—Comprises the township of Abertillery, with the exception of the portions included in Wards 3 and 5. Members on Council, 5. Area, 1,151 acres. Estimated Electors, 3,574.
- Ward 5. Cwmtillery.—Consists of Cwmtillery with Penybont: Blaenau Gwent, and Brynteg. Members on Council, 6. Area, 2,400 acres. Estimated Electors, 4,810.

#### Sewage Disposal

The Western Valleys (Mon.) Sewerage Board deals with the sewage of eight urban districts, viz.:—

Abertillery, Abercarn, Risca, Tredegar, Ebbw Vale, Mynyddislwyn, Nantyglo & Blaina and Bedwellty.

together with part of St. Mellons R.D.C. and part of the Newport Borough. The scheme has worked well since its completion.

The carrying capacity of the trunk sewer has been affected from time to time by mining subsidence and diversions and relays have been necessary. The flows from local authority subsidiary sewers have increased due to rising living standards, and the consequent additional use of domestic water.

To meet these rising standards the Board has commenced a scheme for duplication or reconstruction of the original trunk sewer to bring its capacity up to a 6 x d.w.f. of 340 gallons per head per day of the population served.

A new Sea Outfall 60" diameter has been laid 1500 yards from the sea wall at St. Brides into the Bristol Channel and a 60" diameter conduit connecting this Sea Outfall pipe to a new 5 million gallon storage tank has been laid. Comminutors have been installed on this line to effect maceration of the sewage before storage and discharge. The operation of the penstocks to control the flow of effluent to the Bristol Channel at the times laid down in the Board's Acts are automatically controlled by a lunar clock. The scheme was commissioned in June, 1968 and is operating satisfactorily.

Three Contracts are now in progress which will increase the carrying capacity of the trunk sewer to the new standards between Bassaleg and Waunfawr Park, Crosskeys. Work on this scheme is proceeding well and it is hoped to commission these new lengths of trunk sewer in March, 1970. Further schemes for trunk sewer improvements are in the preparation stage and it is hoped to maintain continuity of trunk sewer improvements to bring it up to modern standards.

Completion of all improvement works should be accomplished by 1975.

#### THE ABERTILLERY & DISTRICT WATER BOARD.

The Engineer to the Board, PERCY BEARD, Esq., M.INST.C.E., M.INST.W.E., has supplied the following particulars.

The total rainfall for 1968, at Grwyne Fawr Reservoir, Breconshire, was 52.85 inches as compared with 60.52 inches in 1967, and 62.64 inches in 1966.

During 1968, the highest monthly rainfall recorded was 6.35 inches in October. Rain fell on 173 days at the Reservoir during 1968.

The mains and service pipes in the Board's district are continually tested and inspected for leakages and many repairs are carried out to fractured pipes.

The Board's Llanover Works where underground water from a disused Colliery is treated before being passed to supply continues to operate well and during the year 291,166,000 gallons of water have been passed into supply.

The Board's Works for distributing water from Llandegfedd Reservoir are operating satisfactorily and during the year 411,418,000 gallons of water have been passed into supply in the lower area of the Board. The Board's reservation from this source is 3 million gallons per day.

The work of laying the new 21 inch diameter main from Risca to Crosskeys has been completed and it is hoped that the main will be commissioned by the end of June.

The water supply position in the Board's area is now very sat sfactory.

#### Pit-Head Baths.

Pit-Head baths are established in connection with the Rose Heyworth, Cwmtillery, Llanhilleth and Arael Griffin Collieries.

#### Trends in Industrial Employment.

There are 491 males and 544 females working in light industries in the area, a total of 1035. From my inquiries there would appear to be an increase in the personnel working in the light industries during the year.

Various collieries have been closed but most of the employees, other than those of retirement age, have been deployed to other collieries.

Although no statistics are available because of the casual nature of the work and the fact that most of the work is not notifiable to the Local Authority under the Factories Act, 1961, there would seem to be an increase in the number of outworkers.

There are promising signs of a further increase in the number of light industries to be established in the area.



In conclusion, I wish to thank the Public Health Inspectors and other Departments of the Council for their willing cooperation during the year.

#### STORES AND VEHICLES.

Attention is being given to the cleanliness of vehicles, wrappers, etc., used for bringing meat into the district and for conveying meat to the shops, and the conditions are satisfactory within existing Law.

The men who handle such meat are compelled to wear clean overalls.

There is no public abattoir.

#### FRIED FISH AND CHIP SHOPS.

There are 9 registered shops in the area which are kept in a satisfactory condition.

39 inspections of these premises were carried out.

#### OTHER FOODS.

Meat, fish and fruit shops are regularly visited, and the food exposed for sale or stored is examined.

Pork butchers' premises, where sausage meat and small goods are prepared, receive great and constant attention.

Bakehouses are regularly inspected, and the sanitary conditions are noted and dealt with as required.

Two cases of food poisoning were confirmed in the district during 1968.

The Sale of Food and Drugs Act is administered by the Mon-mouthshire County Council.
