## 1. WATER SUPPLY.

Although the supply is administered by the Merioneth Water Board periodic samples were submitted for bacteriological analysis. All these proved to be highly satisfactory. Regular samples were also submitted for bacteriological analysis by the Merioneth Water Board.

## 2. DRAINAGE & SEWERAGE.

The town's sewers once again continued to function most satisfactorily and routine maintenance was carried throughout the year to keep the pipes clear. However one serious blockage occurred at Porkington Terrace during the month of August, and although little to no inconvenience was caused to the householders, the remedial works took three days. The cause was established as being an abnormally large accumulation of grease. Since this occurrence, the sewers are being treated with a chemical called 'Solvex' which disperses any grease that might accumulate along the run of the sewers.

Work was carried out on the stream at Brynteg Hill, where a collection chamber was constructed, and this achieved the desired effect. Bont Fach again functioned satisfactorily, and subsequently there were no incidents of flooding.

Once again there was a heavy demand for the services of the cesspool emptier, but I feel that were a large number of the very old cesspools in Llanaber functioning properly, the demand would be far less. Never-the-less it is hoped that more rapid progress can soon be made with the sewerage scheme for this area, which also includes the sea outfall, as once again, some complaints were received of sewerage contamination of the beach.

## 3. RIVERS AND STREAMS.

There were no cases regarding the pollution of rivers or streams although enquiries were made by a neighbouring authority in an effect to establish whether pollution of the Mawddach in the vicinity of the Crescent, was being caused from within the urban district. Investigations showed that this was not so.

## 4. CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

There were no known cases of change over from the dry conservancy system to the water carriage system.

1. WATER SUPPLY.

Although the supply is administered by the Northern Water Board periodic samples were submitted for bacteriological analysis. All these proved to be highly satisfactory. Regular samples were also submitted for bacteriological analysis by the Northern Water Board.

2. SEWERAGE & DRAINAGE.

The town's sewerage system was again continued to function most satisfactorily and routine maintenance was carried throughout the year to keep the pipes clear. However, one serious blockage occurred at Parkington Terrace during the month of August, and although it took three days, the cause was established as being an abnormal large accumulation of grease. Since this occurred the sewers are being treated with a chemical called 'Solvo' which dissolves any grease that might accumulate along the run of the sewers.

Work was carried out on the stream at Hyndley Hill, where a collection chamber was constructed, and this achieved the desired effect. Some back water functioned satisfactorily, and subsequently there were no incidents of flooding.

One year there was a heavy demand for the services of the cesspool emptier, but I feel that with a large number of the very old cesspools in the town functioning properly, the demand would be far less. However, it is hoped that some rapid progress can soon be made with the sewerage system for this area, which also includes the area where, as one again, some complaints were received of sewerage contamination of the beach.

3. RIVERS AND STREAMS.

There were no cases regarding the pollution of rivers or streams although enquiries were made by a neighbouring authority in an effort to establish whether pollution of the Washburn in the vicinity of the Grange, was being caused from within the urban district. Investigation showed that this was not so.

4. CLAY & COAL.

There were no known cases of change over from the dry conservancy system to the water carriage system.



## 5. PUBLIC CLEANSING.

The volume of refuse shows a marked increase each year, particularly during the summer months, but with very limited additional hours worked, the S. & D. Packamatic proved to be a very useful and efficient vehicle for this service.

Litter was again a very serious problem, and regardless of the number of litter bins, a certain element of the public seem to get great satisfaction from depositing litter on the ground. It was really sickening to see some mornings, the amount of litter deposited on the Beach by visitors.

The problem of the refuse tip was again with us, and following numerous meetings, the Joint Tip Committee comprising of the Dolgellau R.D.C. and this authority came into being, and although at very considerable expense, the tip was administered satisfactorily.

There are, unfortunately, no swimming baths or pools for the public within the urban district.

### Vermin :-

There were no cases of infestation reported during the period under review.

### Rodent Control :-

The Rodent Officer, who is shared by both Dolgellau Councils carried out his duties efficiently and effectively and there were no serious cases of rodent infestation brought to my notice.

### Food Hygiene:-

On the whole the standard of hygiene was high. However with new young staff being employed in various establishments, there were instances that left much to be desired. Never-the-less it was found that by discussing these contraventions with the young offenders, one achieved a medium of hygiene education, which apart from proving to be of interest to the assistants, also had the desired effect of making them realise their responsibilities as food handlers.

The quantity of food voluntarily surrendered for condemnation as being unfit for human consumption remained about the same.

## 7. OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES.

Inspections carried out showed that most establishments are well aware of their responsibilities, and a fair amount of work was carried out to modernise various premises.

## 8. HOUSING.

No new houses were started or completed during the year.
