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



ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH.

TO THE

URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL OF BLAENAVON.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1967.

To the Chairman and Members of the Blaenavon Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit for your information my Annual Public Health Report for your Urban District for the year 1967.

As previously the report is compiled to comply with Regulation 15 (5) of the Public Health Officers Regulations, 1959, and with instructions contained in Circular 1/68 (Wales) dated 2nd January, 1968, from the Welsh Board of Health.

General Comment.

This was a most successful year for this Urban District from the aspect of environmental health and was especially noteworthy in a few mespects.

The year 1967 was the first year in the district's history when no notifications of pulmonary tuberculosis and received and there was only one case of the non-pulmonary form of this disease notified. This satisfactory position was also coupled with the fact that no death was assigned to any form of tuberculosis for the year. The position is better appreciated when compared with the facts of twenty years ago when there were 17 notifications received (15 pulmonary and 2 non-pulmonary) coupled with 14 deaths assigned to all forms of tuberculosis. The year 1967 was also the first year in the district's history when no deaths assigned to children under the age of one year were recorded. This is also a most satisfactory sign as the infant mortality rate for a district is a very sensitive index of progress in general public health. There were also no deaths allocated to suicide or road accidents.

During the year unfit properties continued to be represented, but progress in this direction rests on the rate at which replacement houses are built and this process should be speeded up in an old district such as this with an excess of unfit houses.

The district lost its Public Health Inspector towards the end of 1966 and the person appointed to the vacancy only remained a matter of some months before leaving again towards the end of 1967. After a period the post has been filled again, but work has obviously gone into arrears and time lost which cannot be recovered. The housing site at Ty Fry was completed during the year and contains 180 dwellings while the site of the prefabricated bungalows at Heol-y-parc was cleared and prepared for further development. There were over 70 condemned houses in the district at the close of the year whose occupants were awaiting re-housing.

The results of water sampling during the year showed a marked improvement which was mainly due to cutting out some of the older untreated sources of supply. However, there should be no further delay to the necessary works needed to give a water supply adequate in quantity and quality to the district as any up-to-date town should have in this day and age.

GENERAL STATISTICS AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

The population estimate for the district at mid 1967 as furnished by the Registrar General was 7,970 which once again continues the yearly downward trend in population for the town as shown over the last forty six years.

There were 101 live births (56 males and 45 females) allocated to this district for the year, which is a decrease of 11 as compared with the previous year. There were 2 illegitimate births (1 male and 1 female) included in the 101 live births which is 4 less than in the previous year.

The birth rate per 1,000 population was 12.7 which continues the downward trend evident last year.

The natural increase (i.e. births over deaths) for the year shows a deficit of 15 which is the highest figure for some years.

The stillbirths for the year numbered 3 (1 male and 2 females) which was one less than in the previous year. All were of legitimate birth.

The local birth rate for the year of 12.7 per 1,000 population can be compared with the national birth rate of 17.2 (provisional) if the local rate is first adjusted by a comparability factor of 1.16 which gives a local adjusted rate of 14.7

There were 116 deaths (71 males and 45 females) allocated to this district for the year which was 3 more than in the previous year. The crude death rate for the year was 14.6 per 1,000 population.

These deaths are assigned to their various causes and sex on Table $\overline{V1}$.

The cancers claimed 24 deaths (10 males and 14 females), or 21% of the total deaths for the year. Cancer of the lungs and bronchi caused 17% of all the cancer deaths.

Cancer of the lungs and bronchi caused 4 deaths (all males) as compared with 4 deaths in 1966, 2 in 1965 and 4 in 1964.

The diseases of the heart and blood vessels caused 65 deaths (40 males and 25 females), or 56% of the total deaths.

Diseases of the respiratory system (excluding tuberculosis and cancer) caused 10 deaths (7 males and 3 females), or 9% of the total deaths.

There was no death assigned to childbirth, pregnancy or abortion.

There was no death assigned to tuberculosis of any form, road accident or suicide.

The local crude death rate of 14.6 may be compared with the national rate of 11.2 after adjustment by multiplying by a comparability factor of 1.05 to give a local adjusted rate of 15.3

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES.

This is the eighteenth consecutive year for which no notification of diphtheria has been received for the district, but this does not mean that there should be any relaxation in the maintenance of a high level of immunisation in the child population.

TUBERCULOSIS.

The Chest Clinic for the district is located at the Park Buildings, Pontypool, which is within easy reach. The clinic is open all day on Tuesdays and Thursdays of each week and there are also facilities for X ray at Blaenavon Hospital which the Chest Physician visits if required.

This has been a record year for the district in-so-far as there were no notifications of pulmonary tuberculosis and only one of non-pulmonary tuberculosis. This is the first occasion on which no cases of pulmonary tuberculosis have been notified in Blaenavon over a period of a year, and it is coupled with the equally satisfactory state of having no deaths assigned to any form of tuberculosis for the same period. The contrast with the position twenty years ago is extraordinary.

A mass radiography survey for the general public of the district was arranged during the year but the attendance of 635 was less than which was expected. This may be accounted for by the fact that so many industrial concerns now make arrangements for surveys to be carried out at their factories periodically. The results of this survey are shown on Tables XV111 and X1X but there is little of significance other than the number of cases of pneumoconiosis which make up the greater part of the other abnormalities of the chest not requiring further observation.

There is a static mass radiography unit still operating at the Chest Clinic, 129, Stow Hill, Newport, for anyone requiring a chest X ray and it is open daily from Monday to Friday (9.0 a.m. to 1.0 p.m. and 2.0 p.m. to 5.0 p.m.) with an evening session on Thursdays from 5.0 p.m. to 7.0 p.m. TABLE XIV

Respiratory tuberculosis and lung cancer death rates for England and Wales - 1967.

The provisional death rate per million population for England and Wales 1967 for respiratory tuberculosis was 37 as compared with 43 for 1966.

The death rate for cancer of the lungs and bronchi per million populati was 584 (562 in 1966), which shows a further increase in deaths from this disease. In actual figures this means 28,250 deaths (23,546 males and 4,704 females) from cancer of the lungs and bronchi as compared with 27,019 for 1966. There were 1,797 deaths (1,322 males and 475 females) from pulmonary tuberculosis during 1967.

MISCELLANEOUS.

National Assistance Act, 1948.

Action to secure the compulsory removal of persons in need of care and attention under Section 47 of the above Act was not needed during the year.

Registered Common Lodging Houses.

This district has no common lodging house.

Public Swimming Bath.

The public swimming bath in this district is an open-air one controlled by the Council and provided with modern purification plant. Samples taken during the swimming season were satisfactory.

Superannuation Acts.

The Medical Officer of Health carried out 13 medical examinations on Council employees during the year and 1 of these referred to a "break-down" pension.

County Weights and Measures Officer's Report for this District.

The County Weights and Measures Officer, R.J. Bullen, Esq., reports that a total of 36 samples of food were taken for analysis in your district during the year. These 36 samples included 19 milks, 16 other foods and one ice-crean and all were certified as genuine by the Public Analyst.

Water Supplies.

A number of the older sources of untreated water supply to the town have been eliminated and of the 36 samples taken for bacteriological analysis during the year all but 2 were reported on as satisfactory. The water from No. 2 Reservoir is treated by slow sand filtration and later mixed with chlorinated water before going into the supply. The Engineer and Surveyor has a project on hand for a new reservoir to further improve the situation but is, I understand, encountering many difficulties which are hindering his project in this respect, and thus depriving this district of the satisfactory water supply which should have been made available many years ago.

INSPECTION OF FOOD AND FOOD PREMISES, ETC.

Fresh Meat.

All supplies of fresh meat are imported into the District as there is no public or private slaughterhouse in operation in the town. These supplies appear to be adequate to meet the town's needs and there is no evidence to suggest that a slaughterhouse is required in view of this fact. There is no poultry processing premises in the district.

Milk Supply.

There is no pasteurising plant in the town and the milk supply comes from plants outside the district.

During the year 15 samples of milk were taken and submitted to the Public Health Laboratory, Newport, for analysis and all were reported on as reaching the prescribed standard. No samples were examined for brucella abortus as no raw milk is sold in the town.

Inspection of Food Shops.

Food shops in the district were periodically inspected during the year to ensure compliance with the Food Hygiene Regulations, and notices served when such was not the case.
