Report of the Medical Officer of Health.

1951.

Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit my annual report on the sanitary conditions and the state of the public health in the Brecon Rural District for the year 1951.

The deaths are classified under the headings given in the new Abridged List of Causes of Deaths.

Illegitimacy. The number of illegitimate births registered as belonging to residents in the district was three.

Maternal Mortality. There was no death during the year which could be attributed to childbirth.

SECTION 2. GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES.

Public Health Officers. There were changes in your Public Health Officers during the year. Mr. E.D. Grant left in December, 1950 to take up another appointment and, in his place, Mr. R. Taylor commenced duties as Additional Sanitary Inspector on 1st. February, 1951.

Laboratory Facilities. During the year laboratory facilities were available at Cardiff, Newport, Carmarthen, Swansea, Aberystwyth and Brecon. Water samples were sent to the Public Analyst at Cormarthen and to the Public Health Laboratory at Cardiff, whilst any investigation required in the control of infectious disease was performed by the Public Health Laboratory at Cardiff. All the milk sampling including milk examined for the presence of tuberculosis was done by the Public Health Laboratory at Cordiff.

Ambulance Facilities. As a result of the National Health Service Act, 1946, the County Council are responsible for the provision of an ambulance service and made use of the existing St. John's ambulance for general use while ambulances from Merthyr Isolation Hospital conveyed patients suffering from infectious disease to Hospital.

Home Nursing, Under the new Health Act, the County Council are responsible for the provision of home nursing facilities. The nurses previously partly employed by various district nursing associations are whole time employees of the County Council.

Treatment Centres and Clinics. Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics administered by the County Council are held regularly in Brecon and Sennybridge. Ante-natal clinics and facilities for the treatment of minor ailments, immunisation, dental and eye defects and orthopaedic defects are available at the County Health officers. County Health Offices, Brecon. These are administered by the County Council.

Hospitals. The hospital needs of the residents of the district, for all diseases apart from infectious disease, are provided by the Brecon War Memorial Hospital. A certain number of patients are also treated in the large hospitals situated in Cardiff and Swansea.

The arrangements for the treatment of infectious disease remain the same as in previous years. Morthyr Borough Council treat the patients from the district suffering from infectious disease and these are conveyed to Merthyr in ambulances maintained by Merthyr Borough Council. These arrangements are proving extremely satisfactory.

For the treatment of cases of smallpox arrangements have been made by the Welsh Board of Health for beds to be available at the Penrhys Hospital, Rhondda.

Disinfection. In the main the methods used for any disinfection required have been fumigation and spraying.

SECTION 3. MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

These services are administered by the County Council and include clinics for maternity and child welfare, immunisation, dental treatment, orthopaedic treatment, visual defects and expectant mothers. Provision is also made for free and cheap rate milk and medicinal foods. The supervision of midwives, child life protection and the care of premature and illegitimate infants is also the responsibility of the County Council.

TION 4. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES.

Water Supplies. Water is derived for domestic and other purposes in the district from 32 Council supplies, private supplies, wells and springs.

Generally speaking, it is safe to say that the supply of water is poor, none of the supplies being chlorinated and only one filtered.

During the year, 175 inspections of public and private supplies were carried out. The water from public supplies was sampled bacteriologically on 19 occasions giving 11 satisfactory and & unsatisfactory results. Two satisfactory chemical samples were also obtained.

In the case of the unsatisfactory samples, investigations were made and remedied action carried out until check samples proved satisfactory.

88 samples of private supplies were taken and, of these, 38 were found to be satisfactory and 50 unsatisfactory. The majority of these samples were taken at the request of the Breconshire Agricultural Executive Committee in support of grant aided schemes for the provision of water to individual premises.

In all cases the Committee and the owners of the

supplies were advised of the results of the analyses.

The preparation of Engineering details etc. for the Council's major water scheme continued during the year, and numerous samples were also taken to ascertain optimum doses of alumina and chlorine.

4. Provision of an Additional Storage Tank to augment the water storage to the Cray Water Supply Scheme.

5. Extension of Water Main to the Llanddew Housing Site.

Of the Council's 32 supplies only 11 can be considered adequate for the immediate needs of the inhabitants for domestic purposes, and only those of Sennybridge and Devynock, Llanfrynach, Trecastle and Llangorse are adequate for a proper drainage scheme.

It will be seen from the above that adequate and wholesome supplies of water are very badly needed and every effort is being made to complete the preparation of the major scheme.

Drainage and Sewerage. During the year sewage disposal works were completed at Talybont and Llanddew. Work was commenced and good progress made on works at Llangorse, Llanfrynach and Trecastle, Preliminary details were commenced on similar schemes for Llanfihangel Talyllyn and Cray.

Public Cleansing. The collection and disposal of household refuse has been carried out during the year by contract labour under the supervision of the Chief Sanitary Inspector. A comprehensive scheme for the removal of refuse is now therefore in operation throughout the district.

The Council is at present maintaining 4 refuse tips, i.e. Sennybridge, Trecastle, Llanfihangel-Talyllyn and Talybont. These are, however, filling rapidly and the securing of new tipping sites is likely to become very urgent.

Sanitary Inspection of the Area. The sanitary inspection of the area was undertaken by the Chief Sanitary Inspector, Mr.W.J.Rees, and the additional Sanitary Inspector Mr.R.Taylor.

Section 6. Inspection and Supervision of Food.

As will be seen the district experienced epidemics of Measles early in the year and of Whooping Cough towards the end of the year. Both these epidemics occurred mainly in the Trecastle, Devynock and Sennybridge areas. The cases of Scarlet Fever and Poliomyelitis were removed to Hospital where the diagnosis of the latter case was not confirmed

Venereal Disease. The County Council has an agreement with the General and Eye Hospital, Swansea, for the treatment of these cases.
