

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE BRECONSHIRE EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

Mr. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present to you the 44th Annual Report on the School Medical Service and its work during the year ending 31st December, 1954.

During the year 2,330 children were medically inspected who were attending the Primary Schools and 1,419 attending the County Grammar and Secondary Schools, compared with 2,954 and 1,221 respectively in 1953.

The arrangements of the age-groups of school children for medical examination were altered during 1953, as permitted by the School Health Services and Handicapped Pupils Regulations, 1953. This alteration of age-groups was continued during 1954 and such arrangement seems to have justified itself and appears to have worked satisfactorily.

It is interesting to observe that the school nurses performed nearly 40,000 school nursing inspections during the year, which is equivalent to every child being examined on the average four times during the year.

It is gratifying to note that of the Primary School children examined during the year by the school medical staff, 97.8% were found to have satisfactory health, and only 2.2% were found to be below par.

The figures corresponding for the Secondary Modern and County Grammar School children vary only slightly from the Primary School figures, being 94.6% satisfactory, and 5.4% below the requisite standard needed.

Handicapped Pupils—Special Schools.—In the Tables VII and VIII appended to this report, will be found full details of handicapped children in the County for whom places have been found in Special Schools.

Penoyre Open Air Residential School for Delicate Pupils. During the year, six children—all delicate—were admitted to this school, and eleven pupils were discharged. On the 31st December, 1954, six pupils were still resident at the school.

I feel, however, that if the school could compel retention of such delicate and handicapped pupils, greater benefit to the child from a more prolonged stay would ensue. As things stand at present a child can be admitted on medical recommendations today, and can discharge him or herself tomorrow, despite all protests, and contrary to all medical advice.

Examinations of Teachers and Candidates for Training Colleges.— During the year 1954, 86 teachers were medically examined prior to scholastic appointments, and 90 college and University candidates also. The examination of candidates for Training Colleges is, as you know, a duty of the school medical services.

The ancillary work entailed in such examinations is ever increasing, and the time taken, often at short notice, is of necessity encroaching severely on the set timetable of the medical staff. Additionally, it is laid down by the Education Committee, that each teaching candidate, prior to being appointed must have a Chest X-Ray; the cost of this X-Ray is borne by the Local Health Authority, under Section 28 of the National Health Service Act, 1946.

In 1954 the cost of such X-Ray examinations was £127.

Mass Radiography.—The Mass Radiography Unit visited the County during the year and catered for the general public. Special times were allocated to school children over 13 years of age to be examined and the summary appended to this report gives the number of children examined from the various schools.

It is pointed out that all children attending the Talgarth C.P. Mixed School were permitted to attend for examination by special arrangements with the Mass Radiography Service.

From the table it will be observed that no definite case of tuberculosis was discovered among the school children, and for the information of the members of the Committee it might be interesting to note that only two cases of tuberculosis were discoved among the general population.

Education Act, 1944, Section 57(3).—During the year 2 children were referred to the School Medical Services Committee in accordance with the Education Act, 1944, Section 57(3) as being ineducable and referred to the Mental Health Sub Committee.

School Closures.—No schools were closed on account of infectious diseases during the year.

Once again I wish to express my thanks to the teaching staffs of the schools for their courtesy and help throughout the year, and also to the nursing staff for their co-operation in fulfilling the duties which as a department we are required to undertake.

REPORT OF SCHOOL DENTAL OFFICER.

I have the honour to present to you a report on the School Dental Service for the year ending December, 1954.

Mr. P. J. George commenced duty as Assistant Dental Officer on 1st January and the late Mr. R. G. Downes, Principal Dental Officer retired on 31st August on completion of 30 years service.

The year's statistical tables show a considerable increase in the number of children inspected, whilst the number treated is greater than for the previous three years. The figures show an increase in the number of extractions both of temporary and permanent teeth, though the number of fillings inserted is smaller.

With the co-operation of the School Medial Officers, greater use has been made of general anaesthetics, the number of administrations of nitrous oxide and oxygen being 22 against 1 in 1953. The present anaesthetic apparatus however is not very satisfactory, as it is an old type and has seen many years service. A new type of apparatus has been ordered and delivery is expected early in the new year.

The new clinic in Crickhowell is nearing completion and when equipped will be visited for two sessions per month. The regular Clinics at Ystradgynlais, Brynmawr, Cefn, Builth and Brecon have been continued as in previous years.

In the past, preventive measures against dental caries largely rested on two things: (1) correct diet and (2) the practice of oral hygiene. To these may soon be added a third—fluoridation of water supplies.

In North America about 20 years ago it was found that those communities whose water supply contained small amounts of fluorides were less prone to dental decay than other communities whose water supply was free from fluorides. A good deal of work has since been done in this field and it is claimed that the difference is in the region of 50% to 60%.

In England Dr. Weaver found a similar state of affairs in a survey of children in North and South Shields with two contrasting water supplies.

The optium concentration of fluoride is considered to be one part per million. At concentration of 3 or more parts per million, mottling or discolouration of the teeth is apt to occur.

Some authorities in the U.S.A. have added fluorides to the water supply to bring the concentration up to 1 to 1.2 parts per million and over a period of 5 to 7 years have noticed a reduction in dental decay particularly among children.

The Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Health has stated that fluoridation of water supplies in Anglesey, Darlington, Watford and Kilmarnock was expected to start in the summer. The results of these experiments will be watched with interest.

One eleventh of your Officers' time has been allotted to the treatment of expectant and nursing mothers and pre-school age children. As anticipated, this branch of our work has increased considerably.

Ten children were supplied with partial dentures to replace teeth lost through accident or dental caries and 11 children were fitted with regulation plates for the correction of irregularities.

Tribute must again be paid to the teaching staff throughout the County for their co-operation during the year.
