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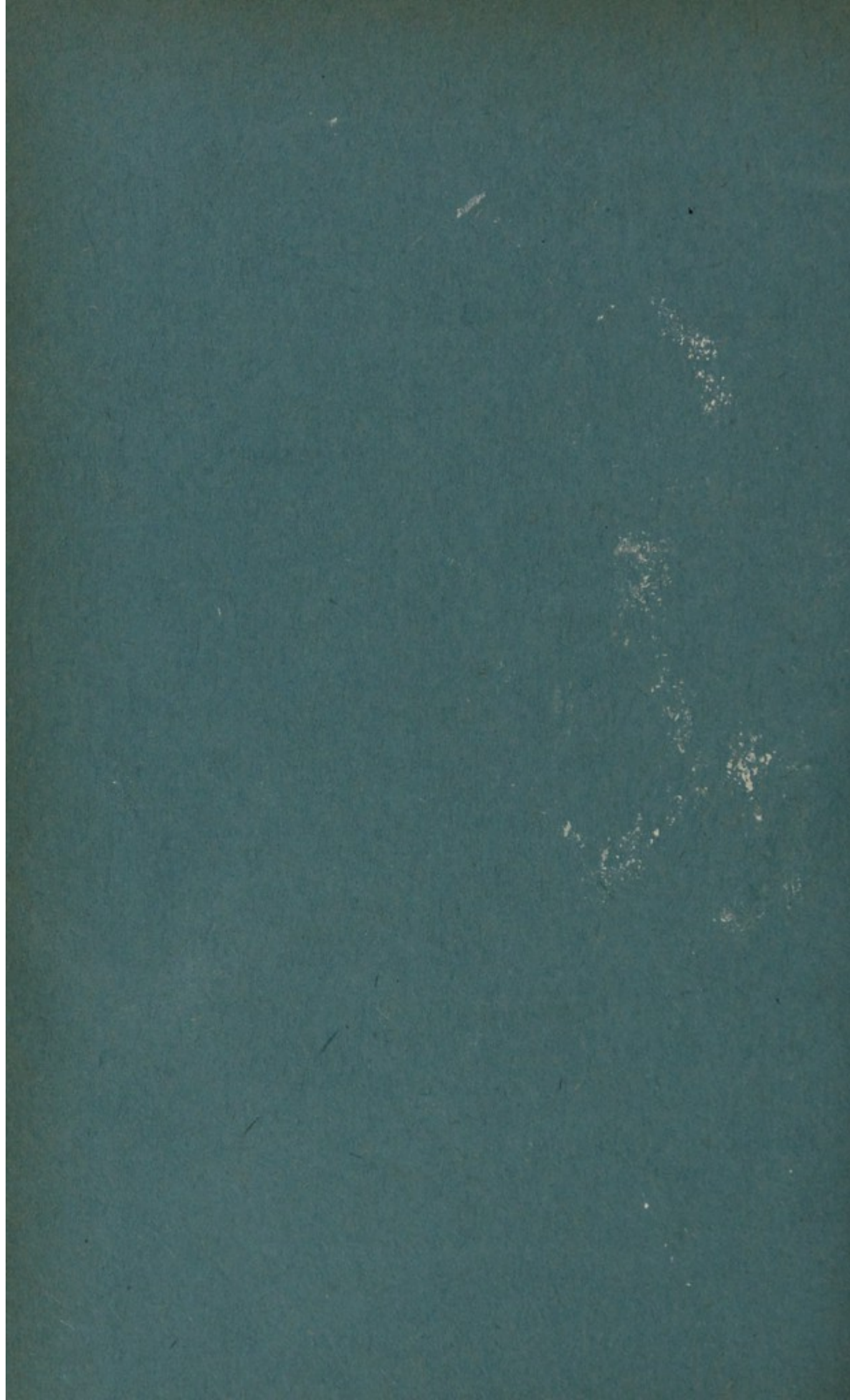

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE BRECONSHIRE EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you the 46th Annual Report on the School Medical Service and its work during the year ending 31st December, 1956.

During the year 2,536 children were medically inspected who were attending the Primary Schools and 1,727 attending the County Grammar and Secondary Schools, compared with 2,341 and 1,822 respectively in 1955.

The arrangements of the age-groups of school children for medical examination were altered during 1953, as permitted by the **School Health Services and Handicapped Pupils Regulations, 1953**. This alteration of age-groups was continued during 1956 and such arrangement seems to have justified itself and appears to have worked satisfactorily.

It is gratifying to note that of the Primary School children examined during the year by the school medical staff 98.85% were found to have satisfactory health, and only 1.15% were found to be below par.

The figures corresponding for the Secondary Modern and County Grammar School children vary only slightly from the Primary School figures, being 99.01% satisfactory, and 0.99% below the requisite standard needed.

Handicapped Pupils—Special Schools—In the Tables VII and VIII appended to this report, will be found full details of handicapped children in the County for whom places have been found in Special Schools.

Penoyre Open Air Residential School for Delicate Pupils.—During the year, five delicate children were admitted to this school, and two pupils were discharged. On the 31st December, 1956, four pupils were still resident at the school.

Mass Radiography.—The Mass Radiography Unit again visited the County during 1956, and examined school children

over 13 years of age at Builth, Sennybridge, Cefn Coed and Ystradgynlais at the same time as the general populations and some factory workers.

Details of the school children examined are given in the Table at the end of this Report.

Education Act, 1944, Section 57 (3)—During the year nine children were referred to the School Medical Services Committee in accordance with the Education Act, 1944, Section 57(3) as being ineducable and referred to the Mental Health Services Sub-Committee.

School Closures.—No schools were closed on account of infectious disease during the year.

Once again I wish to express my thanks to the teaching staffs of the schools for their courtesy and help throughout the year, and also to the nursing staff for their co-operation in fulfilling the duties which as a department we are required to undertake.

REPORT ON SCHOOL DENTAL SERVICE

I have the honour to present to you a report on the School Dental Service for the year ending December, 1956.

There has been no change in the staff of two dental officers and two dental attendants. Advertisements for a second Assistant Dental Officer have so far failed to attract any applicant.

The shortage of dental surgeons has been brought to the notice of the public by the press and the Government's concern was evidenced by the setting up of the McNail Committee in March, 1955, "To ascertain the reason for the lack of candidates of suitable calibre for training as dentists and to indicate the possible directions in which remedies might be sought." The Committee in its report recommended that the number of places for dental students must be increased as soon as possible for 650 to 1,000 each year and the "The foundation of a dental school in the University of Wales to accommodate permanently an annual intake of at least 50 students should be expedited."

Regular clinics have continued to be held at Brecon, Brynmawr, Cefn Coed, Crickhowell, and Ystradgynlais. The building of a new clinic at Builth is expected to commence in 1957 and when completed will facilitate treatment in that area, as the premises at present used are most unsatisfactory. The only item of equipment at Builth is a dental chair of very old pattern and this has had to be supplemented by the use of portable equipment. The purchase of further equipment will be necessary to bring the new clinic up to a modern standard. Assuming that the old chair can be retained for a few more years, the following equipment will be required:—Fountain spittoon, electric Engine, dental cabinet, aseptic table, electric steriliser and pedal type waste bin.

The year's statistical tables show no significant changes compared with 1955, though it is satisfactory to note that the number of fillings inserted has again increased whilst the number of teeth extracted has fallen. Approximately the same number of children (roughly 50 per cent. of those on the register) were inspected and offered treatment.

Table V is now in amended form and includes details of orthodontic treatment (treatment for irregularities of teeth) and dentures provided.

One eleventh of your officers' time was allotted to the treatment of expectant mothers and pre-school age children.

The County possesses no special accommodation either residential or day for these children other than a residential school, run by Merthyr Tydfil Authority, for those classed as delicate which caters for girls of all ages and junior boys, and the suitable placing in residential schools for all those requiring it for all the other types is often a problem of some difficulty. Through the kindness of the Monmouthshire Education Authority, Breconshire is allowed four places in their residential school for educationally subnormal boys at Hilston Park near Monmouth, and this provision is not only very much appreciated but has fully justified itself since it has the advantage of being reasonably close to enable parents to visit and there is not the parental reluctance to allowing the boys to go there.

Of the above 65, accommodation was found for the one blind child, for one spastic of low intelligence and for three delicate children.

It is not easy to find suitable accommodation for the Educationally Subnormal however much the parents are desirous of it. The following is a case in point—a girl of nine from a very respectable family. Residential schools for junior girls are few, two schools maintained by outside charities were turned down by the parents since the names by which they are known did

not appeal to them and finally special permission had to be obtained for admission to an independent school. The work involved in correspondence and visits to the parents has, however, been fully justified as they have been most satisfied with what has been done for the child who is making excellent progress.

As a county we are badly off for the treatment of speech defects and the position, owing to the dearth of speech therapists is not improving. Now and again neighbouring authorities have very kindly helped us, but the distance for the child to travel to the treatment centre is a drawback.

COLOUR VISION

All boys of 10 years and upwards are examined for defects in colour vision by the Ishihara book of coloured plates and the parents notified in every case found defective. During the year thirty one cases were found in 976 boys tested for the first time with the following result.

B.C.G. VACCINATION AND TUBERCULOSIS

Under the Council's Amended Scheme which provided for the B.C.G. Vaccination of school children between their thirteenth and fourteenth birthdays, which was approved by the Welsh Board of Health on 16th March, 1954, the Medical Officers of the Authority carried out this work at the Brynmawr County Grammar and Modern Secondary Schools, the Builth County Secondary School, and the Vaynor and Penderyn Bilateral School during 1956. The children who were found to shew a negative reaction on skin testing were given B.C.G. Vaccination and arrangements were made for the positive reactors to have chest X-rays at the nearest Chest Clinic. A further visit was paid to each school on a date at least seven weeks after the B.C.G. Vaccination was done when all those children who had been vaccinated were further skin tested to see if they had converted to positive. Those children who had not converted were given a further B.C.G. Vaccination.
