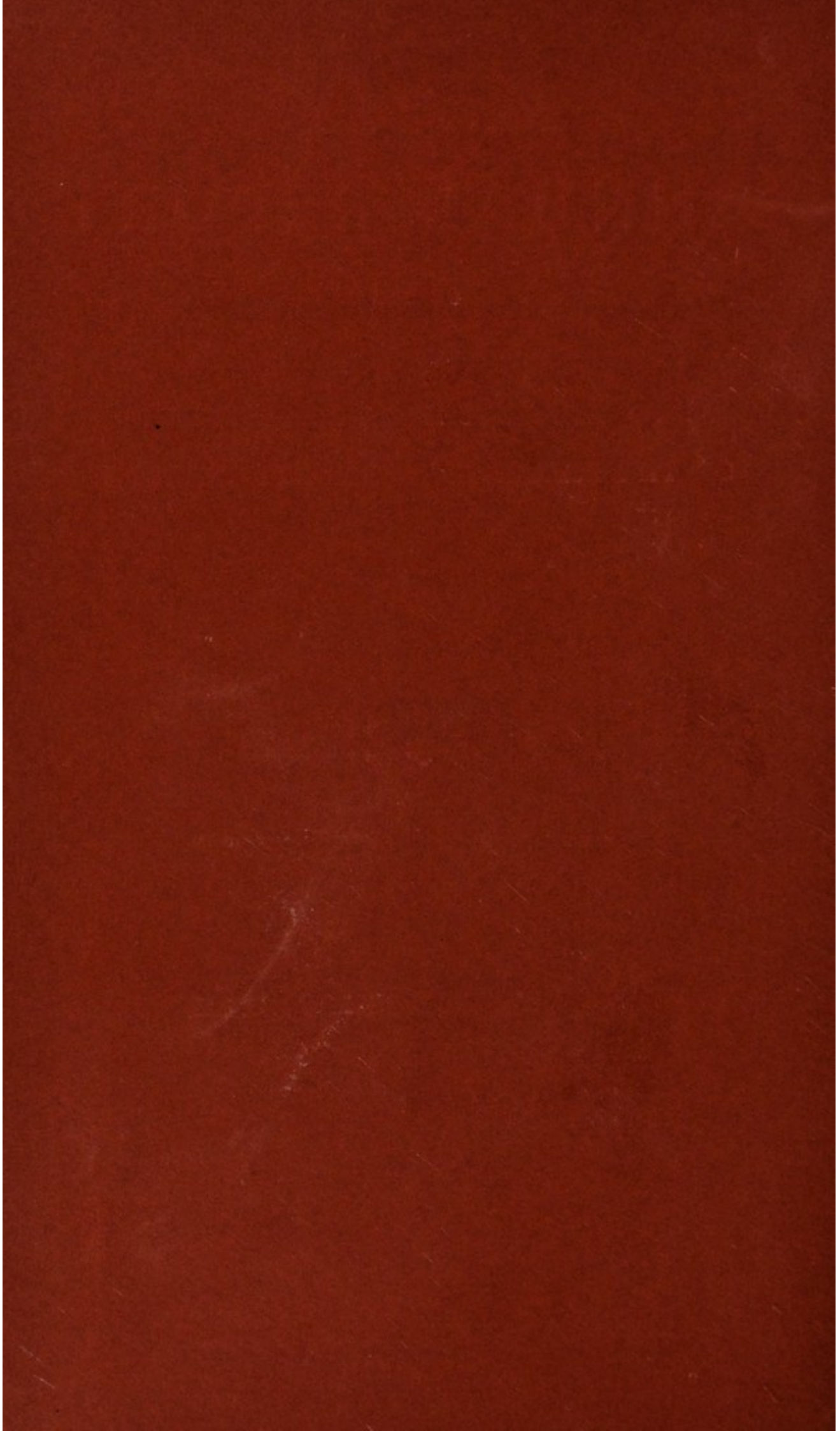

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE
BRECONSHIRE EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

Mr. Chairman Ladies and Gentlemen—

I have the honour to present to you the 48th Annual Report on the School Medical Service and its work during the year ending 31st December, 1958.

During the year 1,201 children were medically inspected who were attending the Primary Schools and 818 attending the County Grammar and Secondary Schools, compared with 2,072 and 1,334 respectively in 1957.

The arrangements of the age-groups of school children for medical examination were altered during 1953, as permitted by the School Health Services and Handicapped Pupils Regulations, 1953. This alteration of age-groups was continued during 1958, and such arrangement seems to have justified itself and appears to have worked satisfactorily.

It is gratifying to note that of the Primary School children examined during the year by the school medical staff 99.42% were found to have satisfactory health, and only 0.58% were found to be below par.

The figures corresponding for the Secondary Modern and County Grammar School children vary only slightly from the Primary School figures, being 98.93% satisfactory, and 1.07% below the requisite standard needed.

Handicapped Pupils—Special Schools.—In the Tables VII and VIII appended to this report, will be found full details of handicapped children in the County for whom places have been found in Special Schools.

Penoyre Open Air Residential School for Delicate Pupils.—During the year nine delicate children were admitted to this school, and two pupils were discharged. On the 31st. December 1958, twelve pupils were still resident at the school.

Education Act, 1944, Section 57 (3).—During the year two children were referred to the School Medical Services Committee in accordance with the Education Act, 1944, Section 57 (3) as being ineducable and the necessary reports issued to the Mental Health Services Sub-Committee. One child was referred back to the School Medical Services Sub-Committee under Section 8 of the Education (Miscellaneous Provisions Act), 1948.

School Closures.—No schools were closed on account of infectious disease during the year.

Once again I wish to express my thanks to the teaching staffs of the schools for their courtesy and help throughout the year, and also to the nursing staff for their co-operation in fulfilling the duties which as a department we are required to undertake.

Since this will be my final report before retirement after twenty-seven years service I must express my sincere gratitude firstly to the County Council staff both nursing and clerical for their unfailing help and co-operation at all times. To the teaching profession of the Grammar, Secondary Modern and Primary schools I owe a great debt of gratitude for their unfailing courtesy and interest at all times.

Since 1932 when I started in the County practically all the work consisted of school medical inspections and means for dealing with handicapped children by way of special residential education were not often used. The last twenty-five years has seen an enormous change and nowadays arrangements for special education in one way and another takes up a considerable amount of time. It would not seem difficult to forecast that the time will shortly come when the routine medical inspection in its groups by the school medical officer will be abandoned in favour of the school nurse reporting only on those children who in her opinion are subnormal and the medical officer only coming in for vaccination and immunisation, etc.

ORTHOPAEDIC SCHEME.

Orthopaedic Clinics throughout the County were held at regular intervals by the Orthopaedic Sister, Miss I. B. Leefe.

Urgent cases were sent to see Mr. A. O. Parker, the Orthopaedic Surgeon at the Prince of Wales Hospital, Cardiff. Mr. Parker attended the County on two occasions and Mr. James also attended on four occasions. These arrangements were made by agreement with the Regional Hospital Board.

REPORT ON THE SCHOOL DENTAL SERVICES.

I have the honour to present to you a report on the School Dental Service for the year ending 31st December, 1958.

The Staff of two dental officers and two dental attendants has remained unchanged. Repeated advertisements for a third dental officer have failed to attract any applicants.

Regular clinics were continued to be held at Brecon, Brynmawr, Cefn Coed, Crickhowell and Ystradgynlais.

The new clinic at Builth was installed with dental equipment in October and regular visits of two sessions per month have been made since November. This clinic has fulfilled a long felt want in Builth and has replaced the very unsatisfactory premises at Park House. The dental unit which has been installed is in line with modern practice of having the fountain

spittoon, dental engine, instrument bracket table, gas jet and warm water supply all in one unit and makes for the greater convenience of both operator and patient. A new dental chair, electric steriliser, aseptic table and dental cabinet completes the equipment.

In addition to regular visits of two sessions per month, treatment for children following routine school inspections and treatment for expectant and nursing mothers and pre-school age children can now be provided under ideal conditions.

Detailed figures of inspections and treatment carried out during the year are given in Table V.

Approximately 45% of children on the school registers were inspected. There has been a large increase in the number of children attending for emergency treatment though the total number inspected is slightly lower than in 1957.

Taken as a whole, the treatment figures show a slight decrease compared with those for 1957, and this is due to some extent to the increasing amount of time devoted to the treatment of expectant and nursing mothers and pre-school age children.

One significant figure is the number of children provided with dentures — an increase from 24 in 1957 to 33 in 1958. A certain proportion of these dentures were rendered necessary due to accident to anterior teeth but a considerable number were due to the fact that the decay was so extensive that conservative treatment was impossible. This figure is to some extent a measure of our inability to inspect children at sufficient frequent intervals to treat these cavities in anterior teeth at an early stage.

The Teachers throughout the County are always most helpful and I would like to take this opportunity to thank them for their co-operation during the year.

POLIOMYELITIS VACCINATION.

This is a service provided under Section 26, of the National Health Service Act, and is not a School Medical Service. I would, however, like to express my appreciation to those Head Teachers of schools in the county who have contributed to the smooth running of the scheme by their usual co-operation with the Health Department.

The actual figures of school children are not available as the groups now being vaccinated range from six months to 25 years of age.

All children of school age are eligible for poliomyelitis vaccination and much can be done by Teachers, together with the School Nurses, in advising parents to take full advantage of the scheme.

B.C.G. VACCINATION AND TUBERCULOSIS.

Under the Council's Amended Scheme which provided for the B.C.G. Vaccination of school children between their 13th and 14th birthdays, which was approved by the Welsh Board of Health on 16th March, 1954, the Medical Officers of the Authority carried out this work at the County Grammar and Modern Secondary Schools during 1958 as shown in the tables—Part VIII and IX.

The children who were found to shew a negative reaction on skin testing were given B.C.G. Vaccination and arrangements were made for the positive reactors to have chest X-rays at the nearest Chest Clinic. A further visit was paid to each school on a date at least seven weeks after the B.C.G. Vaccination was done, when all those children who had been vaccinated were further skin tested to see if they had converted to positive. Those children who had not converted were given a further B.C.G. Vaccination.
