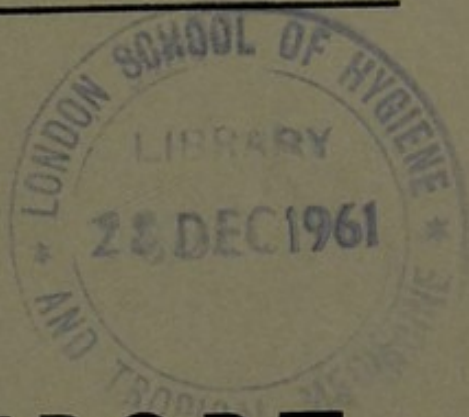
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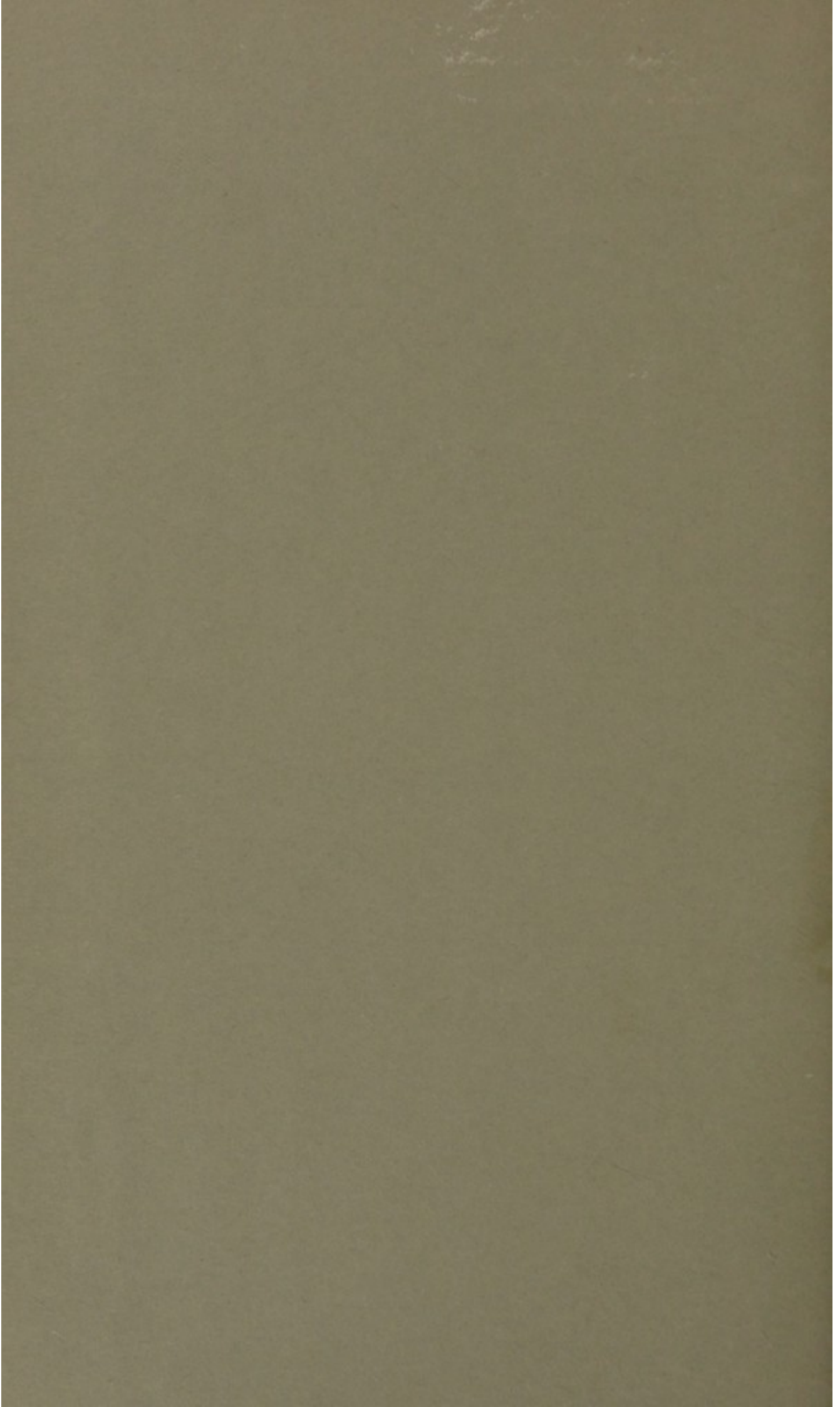

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE BRECONSHIRE EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,—

I have the honour to present to you the Fiftieth Annual Report of the School Medical Services in the County, during the year ending 31st December, 1960.

During 1960, 1,371 children were medically inspected who were attending the Primary Schools, and 1,289 attending the County Grammar and Secondary Schools compared with 1,489 and 1,413 respectively in 1959.

An analysis of the medical statistics relating to this Service indicates that the general health of the Breconshire school children is very satisfactory. In the Primary Schools 99.67% of those children inspected, were found to have satisfactory health, and only .033% were found to be unsatisfactory.

No child attending the County Grammar and County Secondary Schools, was found to have unsatisfactory health.

Handicapped Pupils—Special Schools—In part VI and VII appended to this report will be found full details of handicapped children in the County, including those for whom places have been found in Special Schools.

Penoyre Open Air Residential School for Delicate Pupils—During the year 3 delicate children were admitted to this school and 6 pupils were discharged. On the 31st December, 1960, 11 Breconshire pupils were still resident at the school.

Education Act, 1944, Section 57—During the year five children were referred by the School Medical Services Sub-Committee to the Local Health Authority under Section 57 of the Education Act, 1944, as being unsuitable for education in school.

School Closures—No schools were closed on account of infectious disease during the year.

Medical Inspections—Following the building of the new County Clinic at Builth Wells during the year, most of the school population of this area was medically and dentally inspected and treated at this new clinic. As this clinic is sited in very close proximity to the schools concerned, these inspections caused minimum interference to the educational curriculum of each pupil attending the clinic.

I think we can safely deduce that if the medical and dental staff work in ideal conditions the School Medical Service becomes more efficient. Consequently, on account of this, and for other reasons, it is hoped to foster this policy by erecting new County Clinics in 1961 at Tirabad, Cefn Coed, and Talgarth, and in 1962 in Brecon, Abercrave and Hirwaun.

Child Psychology Service—Last year I reported that a child guidance service was an essential part of a complete medical coverage to a school population. I am pleased to report that during the year, the County Council approved that this service be introduced into the County and it is hoped to initiate it in 1961. Arrangements have been made with the Regional Hospital Board for their Consultant Psychiatrist at the Mid-Wales Mental Hospital to assist in the Child Guidance Clinics, to be held in the first instance at Brecon.

Coupled with this, the County Council has approved the appointment of an Educational Psychologist and a Speech Therapist. A Psychiatric Social Worker is already jointly employed by the Authority and the Regional Hospital Board.

Dental Caries—It is disturbing to read in the Principal Dental Officer's report that approximately three-quarters of all children dentally inspected, needed dental treatment (3,157 out of 4,430 pupils) or 710 in every 1,000.

The "present appalling situation" as he describes it, must not continue unchallenged.

This introduction would be incomplete without reference to the co-operation and ready assistance afforded by the Chief Education Officer and his teaching and administrative staff, and the loyal and conscientious service rendered by the nursing and clerical staff of the School Health Service.

ORTHOPTIC TREATMENT.

As a result of negotiations with the Brecon and Radnor Hospital Management Committee, an orthoptist was appointed at the Brecon Hospital in 1960 and cases are now referred by Mr. Hoare, the Eye Specialist, to this orthoptist for treatment.

Orthoptists are also employed at Merthyr General Hospital, Swansea General Hospital and the Royal Gwent Hospital, Newport, and these facilities can also be used by Breconshire children if required.

ORTHOPÆDIC SCHEME.

Miss T. Howells commenced duty as the County Orthopædic Sister on June 1st, 1960, but resigned to take up hospital appointment on November 27th, 1960. Miss Howells held regular orthopædic clinics throughout the County during her stay with us.

Urgent cases were sent to the Prince of Wales, Cardiff, to be seen by the Orthopædic Surgeon.

A number of children were also seen by the Orthopædic Surgeon at the monthly clinic held at Brecon Hospital when your Orthopædic Sister attends to assist the Specialist by arrangement with the Regional Hospital Board.

No Orthopædic Clinics by the Orthopædic Surgeon were held on local authority premises during the year.

REPORT ON THE SCHOOL DENTAL SERVICES, 1960.

I have the honour to present to you a report on the School Dental Service for the year ending 31st December, 1960.

The staff of two dental officers and two dental attendants remains unchanged. The vacancy for a third dental officer remains unfilled.

Regular fixed clinics are held at Brecon, Brynmawr, Builth, Cefn Coed, Crickhowell and Ystradgynlais. Maesydderwen Comprehensive School is also visited on two days per month, the medical inspection room being available as a minor clinic. The new clinic at Hay has now been equipped and will come into operation early in the New Year.

The number of children inspected during the year was 4,430, of whom 3,157 were found to require treatment. These figures included children who attended for emergency treatment in addition to those seen at routine school inspections.

In 1952 less than half of the children inspected required treatment. The average for the years 1946 to 1952 inclusive was 50%. During 1953 and 1954 the percentage rose until in 1955 the figure was 73%. In other words nearly three-quarters of the children inspected were found to be in need of treatment. The figure has remained at more than 70% for the last six years.

In 1952, for every 1,000 children inspected 480 were found to require treatment, whereas in 1960 the figure was 710. This increase in the incidence of dental decay is undoubtedly due to the increase in the consumption of easily fermentable carbohydrates in the form of sweets, chocolates, biscuits and lollipops.

It would be facile to lay the blame on the ignorance of parents, but since the detrimental effects on the teeth of sugar and sweets have been brought to the notice of the public by the daily press, posters in clinics and schools, and by television programmes, this cannot be the case. Intelligent parents on bringing a child to the clinic with several decayed teeth, will volunteer the information, "He eats too many sweets." After requesting an urgent appointment for the relief of toothache, parents frequently bring the child into the surgery with a sweet in his mouth. The

reward for a visit to the clinic for the extraction of an aching tooth is frequently a call at the nearest sweet shop for an iced lolly.

Until there is a changed attitude on the part of parents there is little hope for an improvement in the present appalling situation.

POLIOMYELITIS VACCINATION.

This is a service provided under Section 26 of the National Health Service. I would, however, like to express my appreciation to the Head Teachers of schools in the County for their co-operation in allowing pupils to attend at the Clinics for vaccination.

The age range of persons eligible for poliomyelitis vaccination was extended during the year to include everyone from 6 months to 40 years of age, and open sessions were held at the various centres in the County.

Although it is not possible to state accurately how many school children had been vaccinated by the end of the year, I give below figures in respect of children between 4 years and 15 years of age:

B.C.G. VACCINATION AND TUBERCULOSIS.

In 1959 proposals were submitted by the County Council to the Welsh Board of Health for the extension of the Council's original scheme, which was approved in 1954. The extension of the scheme provides for the skin testing or re-skin testing annually of all pupils over the age of 13 years and for vaccination or re-vaccination if necessary. This extended scheme was carried out by your Medical Officers in 1960 and details of the work are given in Part VIII of this report. Details of the X-ray examinations resulting from these skin tests are shown in Part IX.

Special surveys were carried out in the schools marked with an asterisk in Table VIII, i.e., Colbren C.P., Llangynidr V.P. and Penrhos C.P. Schools, as a result of cases of tuberculosis occurring in these schools. I am happy to state that no further cases were found amongst the staff or pupils.
