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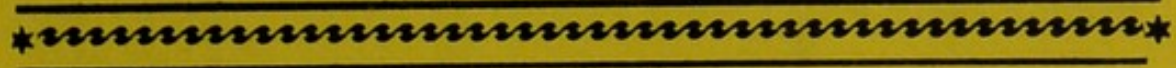

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE BRECONSHIRE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen—

I have the honour to present to you the Fifty-fourth Annual Report of the School Medical Services in the County, during the year ending 31st December, 1964.

The health of Breconshire's school population is very satisfactory indeed.

During the year, 1,010 children attending Primary Schools were medically examined, and 1,557 children who were attending County Grammar and County Secondary Schools.

Of these 2,567 children, not one child was found to be unsatisfactory medically.

Handicapped Pupils—Special Schools—In parts VI and VII appended to this report will be found full details of handicapped children in the County, including those for whom places have been found in Special Schools.

Penoyre Open Air Residential School for Delicate Pupils—During the year 1 delicate child was admitted to this school and 3 pupils were discharged. On the 31st December, 1964, 2 Breconshire pupils were still resident at the school.

Education Act, 1944, Section 57.—During the year five children were referred by the School Medical Services Sub-Committee to the Local Health Authority under Section 57 of the Education Act, 1944, as being unsuitable for education in school.

School Closures—No schools were closed on account of infectious disease during the year.

Educational Psychologist—Mr. John H. Davies, B.Sc. (Special), D.E.P. (Birmingham), commenced duty as the County Educational Psychologist on 2nd September, 1963.

Speech Therapist.—Miss G. A. Samuel, L.C.S.T., commenced duty as your County Speech Therapist on 1st October, 1963, and held regular fixed clinics in the County and also visits children in their homes when required.

In a previous Annual Report I advocated strongly that this Authority appoint these two officers and their first reports on pages 13 and pages 12 respectively, not only prove to be interesting reading, but also bear out this initial recommendation.

The County Psychologist in his first year's work has already interviewed, tested and assessed 116 Breconshire school children referred to him from various agencies and his expert guidance with these more difficult pupils has been more than appreciated by all those working in the School Service.

In order to facilitate his work I have allowed him in all county areas, complete access to the health clinics, from where he can work under optimum conditions.

From the County Speech Therapist's report one learns that nearly 100 pupils attended for speech treatment but it is surprising to learn even in this early stage of this specialised service that at the end of the first year there were well over 200 pupils awaiting observation and treatment.

Despite the fact that 9 speech clinics were held each week regularly, your Therapist had insufficient time to attend to all cases and it strongly suggests that more than one such officer should be appointed to meet the county's needs.

This introduction would be incomplete without reference to the co-operation and ready assistance afforded by the Chief Education Officer and his teaching and administrative staff, and the loyal and conscientious service rendered by the medical, nursing and clerical staff of the School Health Service.

ORTHOPTIC TREATMENT.

The Orthoptist employed at the Brecon Hospital continues to treat children referred to her by Mr. Hoare from his School Clinics and this work has increased to such an extent that the Orthoptist now attends at the Hospital more often than the one session per week originally allotted for this work when the scheme first commenced in 1960. This arrangement for orthoptic treatment for our children works very satisfactorily.

Orthoptists are also employed at Merthyr General Hospital, Swansea General Hospital and the Royal Gwent Hospital, Newport, and these facilities can also be used by Breconshire children if required.

ORTHOPÆDIC SCHEME.

Mrs. N. G. Neat, the County Orthopaedic Nurse (now deceased), held regular Orthopaedic Clinics throughout the County.

A number of children were seen by the Orthopaedic Surgeon, Mr. Roy Treasure, F.R.C.S., at the monthly clinics held at Brecon Hospital, when your Orthopaedic Nurse attends to assist the Specialist by arrangement with the Regional Hospital Board.

By arrangement with the Regional Hospital Board, Mr. Treasure held Orthopaedic Clinics at the Brecon Clinic on 4 occasions during 1964.

The details of school-children seen at these clinics are given below. These figures do not include children of under-school age who were seen.

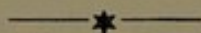

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DENTAL SERVICE, 1964 BY THE PRINCIPAL SCHOOL DENTAL OFFICER,

MR. J. H. SUTCLIFFE, L.D.S.



I have the honour to present to you a report on the School Dental Service for the year ending 31st December, 1964.

There has been no change in the staff of two dental officers and two dental surgery assistants. In spite of repeated advertisements, the vacancy for a third dental officer remains unfilled. The chronic shortage of entrants to the public dental service appears to be easing as many local authorities are now up to establishment for the first time in many years. The establishment of a Dental School in Wales augurs well for the future but some time must elapse before this bears fruit. Only the provision of good clinics with modern equipment will attract the newly qualified dental surgeon to the school service.

Regular fixed clinics have been held at Brecon, Brynmawr, Builth Wells, Cefn Coed, Crickhowell and Ystradgynlais and additional sessions held following routine inspection of adjacent schools.

The clinics at Hay and Tirabad have been visited for treatment, following routine school inspections. The minor clinic at Maesydderwen School has been visited for four fixed sessions per month and additional sessions held to suit requirements.

The new clinic at Cefn Coed has greatly facilitated the treatment of school children in this area. Prior to the building of this clinic only a limited amount of treatment could be provided owing to the pressure of other services on the accommodation available.

During the year, 5,063 children (including 302 specials) were inspected and 3,371 or 67% were found to require treatment. This is the lowest percentage since 1953 when the figure was 55%. From 1954 to 1963 the figure varied between 68% and 73% being 72% in 1963. There are three possible explanations for the present low figure. (1) Dental Health Education. The effects of this cannot be easily estimated as the results will only be seen in the long term. (2) The fact that a greater number of rural schools than usual was inspected and treated during the year; and (3) The fact that more children appear to be receiving regular treatment from the general dental practitioner.

More sessions were devoted to Dental Health Education than in previous years. In addition to chairside talks, several schools were shown a film strip accompanied by a recorded commentary following by a talk and demonstration of the electric toothbrush and the correct use of a standard tooth brush, using large models of the teeth. The cleansing effect of apples was also demonstrated.

One eleventh of your officers' time has been made available for the treatment of expectant and nursing mothers and pre-school age children.

It is again my pleasure to pay tribute to Head Teachers and their staffs and to thank them for their co-operation during the year. I also take this opportunity to thank the Committee for permitting me to attend the annual conference of the British Dental Association.

DENTAL TREATMENT.

In addition to the figures given in Part IV, 1 orthodontic plate and 3 dentures were repaired.

REPORT ON THE SPEECH THERAPY SERVICE, 1964,

by MISS G. A. SAMUEL, L.C.S.T.

During the past year, January-December, 1964, regular Speech Clinics have been held at Brecon, Brynmawr, Cefn Coed, Crickhowell, Ystradgynlais, Builth and Hay. Ninety-seven children attended for treatment, of whom thirty-nine were discharged after satisfactory progress and two because of unsatisfactory attendance records. A further thirty-seven children were kept under observation for this period, twelve of whom made satisfactory progress and, therefore, did not require treatment.

The remaining twenty-five will be kept under observation for a further six months.

The number of children on the waiting list in December, 1964, was two hundred and forty-two.

POLIOMYELITIS VACCINATION.

This is a service provided under Section 26 of the National Health Service Act. I would, however, like to express my appreciation to the Head Teachers of schools in the County for their co-operation in allowing pupils to attend at the Clinics for vaccination.

During the year the age range of persons eligible for vaccination remained at 6 months to 40 years, and open sessions were held at the various centres in the County. In addition a certain amount of vaccination was carried out by general practitioners on their own patients.

In April, 1961, the Ministry recommended that a fourth dose should be given to school children between the ages of 4 years and 12 years and this policy was continued in Breconshire during 1964.

I give below the figures of children between 4 years and 15 years of age who had been vaccinated by the end of the year:—

In addition, the issue of oral vaccine (Sabin) was commenced by the Ministry in 1962 and this was brought into use in our clinics, where patients now have the option of either Salk vaccine injections or Sabin oral vaccine which is taken with sugar or syrup. The primary course of oral vaccine consists of three doses given at monthly intervals whereas the primary course of Salk vaccine consists of 2 injections at an interval of three weeks; this is followed at an interval of 7 months by a third re-inforcing injection.

B.C.G. VACCINATION AND TUBERCULOSIS.

In 1959 proposals were submitted by the County Council to the Welsh Board of Health for the extension of the Council's original scheme, which was approved in 1954. The extension of the scheme provides for the skin testing or re-skin testing annually of all pupils over the age of 13 years and for vaccination or re-vaccination, if necessary. This extended scheme was carried out by your Medical Officers in 1964, and details of the work are given in Part VIII of this report. Details of the X-ray examinations resulting from these skin tests are shown in Part IX.

T.B. SERIAL TESTING IN SCHOOLS.

In addition to the annual skin testing and B.C.G. vaccination of children over 13 years of age in schools, a scheme was introduced in Breconshire in 1961 whereby school children of all ages are skin tested annually and positive reactors X-rayed.

Annual tuberculin testing of all school children provides accurate and reliable information regarding the number of children infected from natural sources during any period of twelve months.

The annual conversion rate of non-reactor children will serve as a reliable index of the prevailing risk of infection in the community. When the conversion rate is found to be abnormally high in any class, school or district it indicates that viable tubercle bacilli are being disseminated freely and that intensive case-finding investigations should be applied, including possibly the mass radiography service.

A teacher disseminating viable tubercle bacilli would also be detected early and the spread of infection would be stopped.

Investigations should also be carried out among the home contacts of the converters in an attempt to discover the source of the infection.

Serial tuberculin testing therefore provides a method of detecting sources of infection which otherwise would not have been discovered until later.

Details of this work carried out in 1964 are shown in Table IX and the resulting X-Ray examinations are given in Table XI.

REPORT ON THE SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICE, 1964,

by MR. JOHN H. DAVIES, B.Sc. (Special), D.E.P. (B'ham).

From 1st January, 1964, to 31st December, 1964, the School Psychological Service has received requests to assess 116 children. These have come from all Educational districts within the County and include children of all ages from 2½ to 15 years of age.

Table I shows the distribution of children referred by age and Education District.

Of these 116 children the great majority have been referred by either Head Teachers or the Principal School Medical Officer. These two agencies account for 95 children referred. Other agencies which have referred children are the Chief Education Officer, the Children's Officer, the Speech Therapist, parents, Superintendent School Welfare Officer, Medical Consultant and Probation Officer. Table II shows sources of referral.

A matrix has been prepared in order to show the fact that categories are not mutually exclusive, e g, in row 1, Poor Progress at School, 46 children show only this symptom, 10 show a behaviour disorder as well, 4 show a habit disorder, 2 are otherwise handicapped.

The disposal of the children is summarised in Table IV. It is difficult to be absolutely precise in classifying children under the following headings, since every child may be re-assessed if necessary, and assessments made are always at best approximations. Furthermore, children whose symptoms have completely cleared up to-day, may relapse in the future. However, Table IV is offered as a guide to assessing the results of the year's work.

The types of action taken vary from obtaining a school report on a child, and owing to the favourable nature of the report and lack of any particular difficulty at present, taking no action, to recommending residential special educational treatment. It should be explained however, that the cases where a school report was obtained and no further action was taken are peculiar in that they were brought to the notice of the Principal School Medical Officer before the inception of the School Psychological Service and appropriate action was then taken which is now found to have been successful.

It is the aim of the School Psychological Service to prevent children from requiring residential special educational treatment wherever possible. This is achieved by attempting to establish appropriate forms of special help in the ordinary day schools and by attempting to be of assistance to teachers to deal with children who present particular problems.

The Special Classes in Junior and Secondary Schools have been very valuable in providing for the needs of children who require a great deal of special educational attention. Unfortunately these facilities are not available throughout the whole of the County.

One method of providing special help for certain children has been to allow them to transfer from one stage of education to another at a later age than is customary. The results of this practice have not yet been fully evaluated but at present it is felt to be a valuable contribution to dealing with the problems of individual children.

In conclusion, it is gratifying to note that the service has been received so well by the Schools and other agencies, and I wish to pay tribute to the School Teachers of the County who have not only supported this service so well but have made such a valuable direct contribution.
