TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE BRECONSHIRE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you the sixty second annual report of the School Medical Services of Breconshire, for the year ending 31st December, 1972.

Of 1,648 children given a full comprehensive examination only 3 pupils were found to be unsatisfactory medically. These 3 children were referred to their general medical practitioners.

Many more pupils, of course, were found to have minor defects or ailments. For example during the year 85 pupils were referred to your Consultant Ophthalmic Surgeon for minor eye defects.

I am perturbed to learn again that your school nurses found 291 pupils with infected heads (head nits or lice) out of 16,875 nursing examinations carried out. Whilst this is a decrease from the total numbers found in 1971 (304) it still leaves no ground for complacency.

We must also be constantly aware of the presence of foot or plantar warts in school children. As more and more swimming baths are opened in the county and as organised school swimming sessions come about, the spread of foot ailments could very well come about.

Already one swimming bath superintendent has brought this to my notice in the Brecon area.

Lastly I must express my gratitude to all those persons who have helped the medical, dental and school nursing staff carry out their work during the past year.

EYE OPERATIONS.

Cases of eye operation are now referred by Mr. G. W. Hoare, F.R.C.S., the County Ophthalmic Surgeon, to the new Ophthalmic Unit at St. Woolos Hospital, Newport, which opened on 1.1.69.

During the year 10 children were operated on.

Cases in the Ystradgynlais Area are now examined and treated by Mr. F. G. Hibbert, F.R.C.S., Consultant Ophthalmic Surgeon from Swansea Hospital and any children whom he considers to require operative treatment are referred directly by him to Swansea Hospital.

ORTHOPTIC TREATMENT.

The Orthoptist employed at the Brecon Hospital continues to treat children referred to her by Mr. Hoare from his School Clinics and this work has increased to such an extent that the Orthoptist now attends at the Brecon Clinic as per arrangements with Brecon and Radnor H.M.C., more often than the one session per week originally allotted for this work when the scheme first commenced in 1960. This new arrangement for orthoptic treatment for our children works very satisfactorily.

Cases in the Ystradgynlais Area who need Orthoptic treatment are now dealt with at Swansea General Hospital under Mr. Hibbert's supervision thus avoiding the necessity of having to travel regularly to Brecon Hospital for this purpose.

Orthoptists are also employed at Merthyr General Hospital and St. Woolos Hospital, Newport, and these facilities can be used by Breconshire children if required.

ORTHOPÆDIC SCHEME.

A number of children were seen by the Orthopædic Surgeon, Mr. Roy Treasure, F.R.C.S., at the monthly clinics held at Brecon Hospital, when your Orthopædic Nurse attends to assist the Specialist by arrangement with the Regional Hospital Board.

By arrangement with the Regional Hospital Board, Mr. Treasure held Orthopædic Clinics at the Brecon Clinic on

3 occasions during 1972.

REPORT ON THE SCHOOL DENTAL SERVICE, 1972. BY THE PRINCIPAL SCHOOL DENTAL OFFICER, MR. J. H. SUTCLIFFE, L.D.S.

I have the honour to present to you a report on the school dental service for the year ending 31st December, 1972

There have been no changes in staff during the year but Mr. R. L. Davies your Area Dental Officer was absent on paid leave, from 1st October while attending the Dental School, University Hospital of Wales, on a course leading to the Diploma in Dental Public Health.

Regular fixed clinics have been held as in previous years at Brecon, Brynmawr, Builth Wells, Cefn Coed and Ystradgynlais, and additional sessions have been held following routine school inspections in these areas. The minor clinics at Crickhowell, Hay-on-Wye and Tirabad have been visited for treatment following school inspections.

When these latter clincs were built it was considered that a large expenditure on equipment would not be justified as it would be unused for the greater part of the time. This being the case, they were equipped with the bare essentials. However, circumstances are changing and the proposed building of a Health Centre at Crickhowell will necessitate a more comprehensively equipped dental surgery. Looking to the future, a mobile dental clinic would not only serve the more rural schools but would also provide better facilities at Hay and Tirabad. Provision has been made for this in the estimates for 1973/74.

The detailed figures for inspection and treatment are given in Part IV. These figures, when compared with those for 1971 are an improvement in several respects. Not only do they show a greater number of school children inspected, a greater number of teeth conserved but a welcome fall in the number of teeth extracted and also in the number of dentures provided.

In addition to the figures shown, treatment has been provided for the trainees at Brecon Adult Occupation Training Centre.

It is again my pleasure to pay tribute to Head Teachers and their staffs and to thank them for their co-operation during the year.

POLIOMYELITIS VACCINATION.

This is a service provided under Section 26 of the National Health Service Act. I would, however, like to express my appreciation to the Head Teachers of schools in the County for their co-operation in allowing pupils to attend at the Clinics for vaccination.

During the year the age range of persons eligible for vaccination remained at 6 months to 40 years, and vaccination was carried out at the various clinics in the county, and also by the general medical practitioners.

In April, 1961, the Ministry recommended that a fourth dose should be given to school children at school entry and this policy was continued in Brecon during 1971. Additionally a further dose is given to children at 15 years of age.

The issue of oral vaccine (Sabin) was commenced by the Ministry in 1962 and this was brought into use in our clinics, where it has entirely superseded the Salk vaccine. The primary course of oral vaccine consists of three doses given at intervals of 2 and 4 months respectively taken with sugar or syrup.

B.C.G. VACCINATION AND TUBERCULOSIS.

In 1959 proposals were submitted by the County Council to the Welsh Board of Health for the extension of the Council's original scheme, which was approved in 1954. The extension of the scheme provides for the skin testing or re-skin testing annually of all pupils over the age of 13 years and for vaccination or re-vaccination, if necessary. This extended scheme was carried out by your Medical Officers in 1972, and details of the work are given in Part VIII of this report. Details of the X-ray examinations resulting from these skin tests are shown in Part IX.

T.B. SERIAL TESTING IN SCHOOLS.

In addition to the annual skin testing and B.C.G. vaccination of children over 13 years of age in schools, a scheme was introduced in Breconshire in 1961 whereby school children of all ages are skin tested annually and positive reactors X-rayed.

Annual tuberculin testing of all school children provides accurate and reliable information regarding the number of children infected from natural sources during any period of twelve months.

The annual conversion rate of non-reactor children will serve as a reliable index of the prevailing risk of infection in the community. When the conversion rate is found to be abnormally high in any class, school or district it indicates that viable tubercle bacilli are being disseminated freely and that intensive case-finding investigations should be applied, including possibly the mass radiography service.

A teacher disseminating viable tubercle bacilli would also be detected early and the spread of infection would be

stopped.

Investigations should also be carried out among the home contacts of the convertors in an attempt to discover the source of the infection.

Serial tuberculin testing therefore provides a method of detecting sources of infection which otherwise would not

have been discovered until later.

Details of this work carried out in 1972 are shown in Table X and the resulting X-Ray examinations are given in Table XI.
