

To the Chairman and Members of the Breconshire County Council.

I have the honour to submit to you my Eighth Annual Report on the Vital Statistics and Sanitary Conditions of Breconshire for the year 1939.

The Report is very much abbreviated, but the essential statistics have not been omitted.

The Death Rate for the year was 12.94 compared with 12.1 for England and Wales and 12.89 for the County in 1938.

The Birth Rate for Live Births was 14.52 compared with 15.0 for England and Wales and the Birth Rate for Still Births was 0.76 compared with 0.59 for England and Wales; the corresponding Birth Rates for the County in 1938 being Live Births 13.96 and Still Births 0.92.

The Infantile Mortality Rate for the year was 50.91 compared with 50 for England and Wales and 62.07 for the County in 1938.

The number of deaths of Mothers during childbirth was 4, giving a rate per 1,000 total births of 4.96 compared with 7 deaths and a rate of 8.86 in 1938 and 4 deaths and a rate of 5.06 in 1937. The rate for England and Wales for 1939 being 2.82.

Again I have to express my thanks to the Chairman and Health Committee for the interest taken in the work of the Department and to the General Practitioners throughout the County for the way in which they have co-operated in their sphere of the work.

FOR INFECTIOUS DISEASES.—Generally speaking the above arrangements suffice for the nursing of infectious cases in the separate districts. Arrangements have been made for the admission of Puerperal Fever and Puerperal Pyrexia cases to the Tydfil Lodge Hospital, Merthyr Tydfil, at £3 3s. per week. Serum for Puerperal Fever is supplied to Medical Practitioners.

MATERNITY SERVICES.

1.-Miwives Act, 1936-

The full scheme was given in the 1938 report, pages 9-12. The only alteration since being the appointment of a Nurse at Gilwern.

2.-Supervision of Midwives-

During 1939, 66 midwives notified their intention to practice in the County, 6 to cease practice, and 9 to leave the County. They are classified as follows:—

Of the remainder, 12 were in independent practice, 26 were attached to District Nursisg Associations, 2 County Council whole-time midwives, and 1 County relief nurse-midwife. Of the above 53, 1 was engaged for holiday relief work only.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT NURSE.

Since my last report, the Llanelly Hill D.N.A. have appointed a fully trained District Nurse Midwife for the Gilwern area. Nurse Goodwin commenced duties on 1st December, 1939, and the whole of the County is now covered for Midwifery service.

During the year the Midwives in the County have been regularly visited, as well as on special occasions, arising from the many requests, as a result of the various forms of notification received under the C.M.B. rules.

On each occasion it was found that my visit resulted in a good understanding with the Midwife concerned and the advice tendered was always made use of.

Home, Uniform and Equipment—

With one exception, the homes of all Midwives have been found satisfactory, although the sanitary arrangements are poor, but credit must be given to a number of Midwives, for their efforts in providing means for disinfecting clothing and equipment, a very necessary feature of their work. Considerable improvement in uniform is seen and equipment is renewed from time to time. All

the Midwives have a working knowledge of the many forms used in their practice.

It is most unfortunate that refresher courses have been cancelled during hostilities, and the Nurses are disappointed as a result.

Report on the M. & C. W. Clinics for the year 1939.

I would like to give a brief resumé on the work in the Child Welfare Clinics.

Everywhere breast-feeding is encouraged in the first instance in all very young babies; should this fail then cows milk is advised.

During the second year of life I have noticed that the babies do not thrive to the same extent as the first year and that there is a definite proportion, about 4%, who require special attention. These babies show softening of bones and flabby muscles. The epiphyses are enlarged—fontanelle gaping—dentition delayed and irregular and the temperament sometimes irritable.

On going into the history one very often finds that the mother lets the child feed itself since it can hold and play with a spoon, instead of taking time to assist the child with meals. Another point very common is the erroneous type of food, and the parent not troubling to cook nourishing and appetising meals.

As a child Welfare Officer it has been my duty to try and advise and educate these mothers on correct feeding, the value of a good night's sleep and extra to the diet such as Cod Liver Oil and orange juice. Many mothers do not realise the value of broth made from bones with the addition of fresh vegetables as well as the economy, and many boil milk instead of taking the chill off.

To Miss Daniels, the Health Visitors and voluntary workers all assisting in doing valuable service I would wish to offer my thanks.

Ante-Natal Clinic, Cefn Coed, 1939.

The following is a summary of the cases which attended the Clinic throughout the year:—

- 19 Normal confinements delivered by Nurse Thomas.
- 1 case was a normal confinement and premature birth—the infant lived 15 hours and weighed 3½ lbs.
- 1 case a normal confinement—B.B.A.
- 2 cases—instruments were used, the reason being Uterine inertia.
- 3 cases Toxemia of Pregnancy was diagnosed, 1 of these resulted in a premature birth and in the 2 others the doctor applied instruments—in the 3 cases living births were produced.
- 1 case was diagnosed as a breech—External Podalic Version was tried and failed. The case was X-rayed and found to be a breech with extended legs; the patient was sent for confinement to Cardiff where she was delivered of a living child.
- 1 case was found to have disproportion and was sent into Hospital for a trial labour; this was performed and the patient delivered herself normally within a few days.
- 4 other cases were confined in Hospital.
- 9. Ante-Natal Scheme.—The Ante-Natal Scheme adopted in 1935 is still popular.

During 1939, 298 examinations were made under this scheme, as follows:—

- 56 Second Examinations;
 - 3 Third Examinations;
- 53 Post-Natal Examinations;

at a total cost of £86 5s. 6d., compared with 254 examinations in 1938 at a cost of £76 19s. 6d.

10. Supply of Milk to Expectant and Nursing Mothers and Infants.—The scheme for the supply of free milk is in force whereby Mothers and Infants are granted monthly supplies where the family income does not exceed the scale adopted. Table showing cases allowed in 1939 is given below.

DAY NURSERIES AND SCHOOL CLINICS.—At present there are no Day Nurseries in existence in the County.

TUBERCULOSIS.—The Treatment of Tuberculosis in the County is carried out by the Welsh National Memorial Association to King Edward VII, and Table VI appended shows the work of the Association in the County during the year 1939. Table V shows the number of cases notified on Form "A" during the year.

Matters in connection with the treatment and prevention of Tuberculosis are dealt with by the Health, Maternity and Child Welfare and Tuberculosis Committee of the Breconshire County Council, which meets quarterly, and considers the Housing conditions, etc., of each patient notified. Cases of overcrowding are referred to the district Medical Officers of Health for consideration by the Local Sanitary Authorities with a view to the better housing of such patients.

HOSPITALS PROVIDED OR SUBSIDISED BY THE LOCAL AUTHORITY OR BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL.

- 1. Tuberculosis.—See page 15.
- 2. Hospitals for Children.—None are yet provided or subsidised by the County Council. A children's ward of 4 beds is provided in the County War Memorial Hospital at Brecon.
- 3. Fever and Small Pox.—No hospitals are provided or subsidised by the County Council. The number of Isolation Hospitals in the County is 2, being 1 for the Brecon Urban District, with 3 wards and accommodation for 32 beds; and 1 in the Hay Urban District, with 2 wards and accommodation for 8 beds. An extension of the Isolation Hospital at Hay has been made by the joint Councils of the Hay Union in the form of a separate building containing 2 wards. The scheme for the new Joint Hospital to be erected at Brecon to serve all the areas of the County with the exception of Hay Urban and Hay Rural has been suspended for the time being.

The Breconshire County Council is the authority for the prevention and treatment of smallpox throughout the County, under an Order issued by the Ministry of Health, Cardiff, dated 31st July, 1928. Cases of small pox which occur are isolated at the Fedw Hir Isolation Hospital, Llwydcoed, under an arrangement with the Aberdare Urban District Council. No cases occurred during the year.

- 4. PUBLIC INSTITUTION HOSPITALS.—Under the Local Government Act, 1929, the following four Institutions were taken over by the County Council on 1st April, 1930:—
 - 1. Brecon.
 - 2. Crickhowell (Llangattock).
 - 3. Hay.
 - 4. Builth (now closed).
- 5. MENTAL HOSPITAL, TALGARTH.—There is a Mental Hospital at Talgarth, with accommodation for males and females. The Hospital is jointly used by the Counties of Brecon, Montgomery and Radnor.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

(a) For Infectious Diseases; and (b) Non-Infectious Diseases. Provision is made by the Hospital Authorities at Fedw Hir for an ambulance for cases of Smallpox. The Hay Urban District Council have made arrangements whereby a horse-drawn conveyance is kept at the Isolation Hospital for use in infectious cases, and for non-infectious cases and accident a motor-ambulance is available. St. John Red Cross Ambulances now serve the County for non-infectious cases.

LABORATORY WORK.

The Breconshire County Council and nearly all the separate District Councils have made arrangements with the Clinical Research Association Ltd., Watergate House, York Buildings, Adelphi, London, W.C., for bacteriological work.

The County Council have also made arrangements for consulting Dr. A. F. Sladden, Pathologist and Director of the Laboratory of the Swansea General and Eye Hospital, in connection with any exceptional cases of infectious diseases occurring in the County. It was not found necessary to call on the services of Dr. Sladden during the year.

SANITARY ADMINISTRATION.

The Sanitary Administration of the County is carried out by the separate Urban and Rural. Sanitary Authorities, and for further information with regard to Water Supplies, Rivers and Streams, Sewage and Drainage, Sanitary Inspection, Closet Accommodation, Scavenging, etc., reference should be made to the Annual Reports of the District Medical Officers of Health.

SALE OF FOOD AND DRUGS ACT.

The duties under these Acts are carried out by Mr. Gerald E. Bastin, who is also Inspector of Weights and Measures.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1929.

This Act, which brought about many changes in the administrative work of a County Council, came into operation on 1st April, 1930. Under the Act the following Poor Law Institutions were taken over by the County Council:—
