*To the Chairman and Members of the Breconshire
County Council.*

I have the honour to submit to you my Annual Report for the year 1964.

The plans for 1964 for the provision of clinic premises has not proceeded as quickly as one would wish but the new clinic premises at Cefn Coed was brought into use during the year. The facilities offered here to patients and staff at this new clinic are far superior to the old accommodation in which the medical work was undertaken formerly at the old school clinic.

The addition of fluoride to water supplies by the water undertakers is still not possible on account of technical difficulties but the scheme has the full approval of the Breconshire County Council. The possibility of initiating such a scheme is constantly borne in mind and it is hoped that before long a start can be made in this direction.

In 1964 the Chiropody scheme continued to function with the services being operated by 3 parti-time Chiropodists.

I wish to record my appreciation of the services rendered by the voluntary agencies who contribute to the running of the ambulance, chiropody service and the distribution of welfare foods. Such help is of inestimable value to this department in running these schemes in a rural county such as Breconshire.

Thanks are also due to my medical colleagues and the nurses, dental and clerical staffs for their continued assistance and co-operation throughout the year. It is also fitting that I should express my thanks for the whole hearted co-operation which I have enjoyed from colleagues in other departments and from members of the County Council.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1946.

Section 21.—Health Centres: No action has been taken during the year regarding the provision of Health Centres.

Section 22. — Care of Mothers and Young Children: This Section covers the following activities: — (a) Ante-natal clinics, (b) Post-natal clinics, (c) Child welfare clinics, (d) Day nurseries and residential nurseries, (e) Mother and baby homes, (f) Dental treatment given to expectant or nursing mothers, and children under 5 years of age, (g) care of premature infants,

(h) Ophthalmia Neonatorum, and Maternal Deaths, etc., and replaces the old heading of Maternity and Child Welfare.

Information and figures relating to the various sections are given below:—

Care of Premature Infants, i.e., babies weighing $5\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. or less at birth irrespective of period of gestation:—

Special equipment for the domiciliary nursing of premature infants is held at the offices of the local health authority.

If found necessary to admit such infants to hospitals, the local hospital authority would be approached by the nurse or mid-wife and the greatest possible assistance is always given in arranging accommodation.

During the year all cases of premature births have again been followed up, including those delivered in hospitals, which has necessitated the interchange of records between Local Health Authorities. The co-operation of the hospitals has been freely given and the information required is readily provided by them.

Table VIII appended to this report shows the weight of the infants at birth and the number of infants who survived 28 days.

Complicated Maternity Cases.

The investigation of cases for hospital confinements is undertaken by the department. Such cases are brought to the notice of the authority in four ways:— (1) the general practitioner, (2) the Clinic Medical Officer, (3) the midwife, or (4) the patient herself.

In each individual case, a report is then obtained on the housing conditions (or other social defects) and consideration is given to the question of whether hospital accommodation is required. Where the request for a hospital confinement is based solely on lack of assistance, this is in some cases overcome by the provision of domestic help, though the extent to which this help can be given depends on the domestic helps available and the accessibility of the home. Having decided that the case requires accommodation in hospital, a request is then made to the most convenient hospital to book for accommodation.

When necessary, cases are referred to their own doctors or to Hospital for treatment or consultation.

The clinic held fortnightly at the Bethel Church Vestry, Hirwaun, is organised by the Glamorgan County Council, and mothers from the Vaynor and Penderyn district of Breconshire are catered for by arrangement with Glamorgan. Breconshire pays a proportionate cost of this clinic based on the population of the area covered and a Breconshire Health Visitor attends regularly.

Ante-Natal Clinics.

Facilities for ante-natal examinations are provided by the local health authority at the following centres where a Medical Officer is in attendance. These clinics are held at the times and places stated:—

1. Abercrave: 2nd Wednesday, 10 a.m. to 12 noon.
2. Brynmawr: 1st Wednesday, 10 a.m. to 12 noon.
3. Ystradgynlais: 1st and 3rd Thursdays, 10 a.m. to 12 noon
4. Brecon: 3rd Friday, 10 a.m. to 12 noon.
5. Hirwaun: Bethel Church Vestry, fortnightly, Wednesdays, 9.30 a.m.
6. Builth: 2nd Monday, 10 a.m. to 12 noon.

These clinics are held in:— One Welfare Hall and one Church Vestry, which are hired premises, and four permanent clinic premises which are owned by the Education Authority and/or the Local Health Authority.

The clinic at Hirwaun is held fortnightly by the Glamorgan County Council and persons from the Hirwaun and Penderyn portion of Breconshire attend under a joint arrangement between the two authorities.

As a result of discussions between the Local Health Authority and the Local Medical Committee, reports are sent to the General Practitioners in respect of their patients in attendance at the Ante-Natal Clinics.

Post-Natal Clinics.

There are no specially held post-natal clinics—all patients attend the ante-natal sessions.

Specialist Clinics.

There are no specialist clinics held under the auspices of the local health authority.

Assistance given at Clinics in General Practitioners' own Premises.

Assistance at one General Medical Practitioner's Surgery is now given by a midwife in the Sennybridge area. This arrangement was reached after the closure of the Council's Ante-Natal Clinic in Sennybridge (Defynnog) some years ago.

Blood Testing.

Arrangements are made for collecting blood specimens at the clinics and these are sent to the National Blood Transfusion Laboratory at Cardiff, and elsewhere.

The findings are in all cases reported to the patients' General Medical Practitioners.

A special session is held at the Ystradgynlais Clinic on the 4th Tuesday of each month, for collecting blood specimens.

Liaison Committee.

During the year Liaison Committees were held at various hospitals situated within the County and at hospitals having a catchment area for Breconshire. Such committees are attended by the General Medical Practitioners, Local Health Authority Staff and the Staff of Hospitals.

The Personal Maternity Record card is still proving useful to the General Medical Practitioner, the Hospital Medical and nursing staff and the domiciliary midwives.

Institutional Provision for Unmarried Mothers, Illegitimate Infants, and Homeless Children in the District—

Arrangements are made with the Swansea and Brecon Moral Welfare Association to carry out this work the Health Authority being responsible for the maintenance of the mother for approximately one month before the confinement and for a period of 14 days after birth. Maintenance after this date becomes the responsibility of the Welfare Committee. A grant of £100 p.a. is also given to the Association.

During the year arrangements were made for the accommodation of one mother at the Church Home, Llandaff, Cardiff; two mothers at St. Martin's Home, Hereford; and two mothers at the Northlands Salvation Army Home, Cardiff.

Family Planning Clinics.

The Family Planning Association continues to hold Family Planning Clinics in Breconshire, in clinics provided free of charge for this purpose. During the year a request to set up additional clinics in Breconshire, at Ystradgynlais and Brynmawr clinics was agreed by the County Council.

Maternity Outfits.

Maternity outfits are distributed free of charge to expectant mothers by the midwives who are booked for the cases. The outfit provided is a standard sterilised pack, supplied by a manufacturer of surgical dressings.

Necessary items required for the lying in, which are not included in the maternity outfit, are provided by the midwife attending the case.

Day Nurseries, Hospitals for Children, and Mother and Baby Homes.

There are none in the County. The Education Committee has one Nursery School at Brynmawr.

Maternal Deaths.

There were no deaths of mothers during the year.

Supply of Dried Milk.

The supply of proprietary brands of dried milk is not undertaken at the clinics. The demand for the various brands is so small, stocks would deteriorate before being used. In parts of the County there is a system whereby cheap Cow and Gate or Ostermilk can be bought from local chemist's shops. This scheme is dependent on the readiness of the local chemists to stock the brand of milk. Many chemists consider that the demand is so small that they do not feel it justifies them taking part in any scheme,

This question is, of course, always under review, together with the possibility of providing other medicaments at Clinics.

Distribution of Welfare Foods.

Formal approval was given by the Welsh Board of Health to the Council's Scheme for the distribution of Welfare Foods on the 8th November, 1954, and the scheme continues to function with 6 main Distribution Centres and 24 voluntary distributors from shops and private dwellings.

The main centres are manned by an officer engaged for this purpose and from the following times of distribution it will be seen that his time is fully taken up by these centres, and leaves little opportunity for other work. These main Centres are as follows and open on the days and times stated.

Mr. E. R. Morgan, Pentwyn, Gilwern, continues to give his services free and delivers Welfare Foods to these voluntary distributors from the main centre at Crickhowell. Much useful work is done by Mr. Morgan in assisting the small shopkeepers to check stores and complete their returns. For this service Mr. Morgan is merely re-imbursed for mileage covered in his car.

Delivery of Welfare Foods is made to Llanwrtyd Wells on Monday afternoons, as necessary, by the Welfare Foods Officer from Builth Wells. Mrs. Peace, of Campsie, Llanwrtyd Wells thereafter distributes the National Dried Milk, etc., to various points in the area such as Tirabad, Beulah and Llangammarch. For undertaking this service she is re-imbursed for mileage similar to Mr. E. R. Morgan, of Gilwern, and paid a small sum for storage.

Again I offer my thanks to both these volunteers, and to all the voluntary distributors who have distributed milk from their homes, shops, or centres provided by the County Council. Their help has permitted us to continue to run this scheme so smoothly.

The distribution of Welfare Foods at Sennybridge is still undertaken on behalf of the Breconshire County Council by volunteers of the St. John's Ambulance Association, from the Market Hall, Sennybridge.

The amount of Welfare Foods distributed is not large and has dropped this year again, however, as stated previously, the nature of the County makes it necessary that some centres issuing small amounts must remain open to provide the necessary service although it is anticipated that the service will be restricted in 1965.

Dental Care of Mothers and Young Children—1964.

Dental treatment is provided for expectant and nursing mothers and young children under 5 years by the School Dental Officers at the following clinics:—

Brecon, Brynmawr, Builth Wells, Cefn Coed, Crickhowell, Hay-on-Wye, Tirabad, and Ystradgynlais.

The new clinic at Cefn Coed, now situated outside the school premises, has proved much more convenient for the treatment of mothers and young children.

57 mothers were examined and treated during the year and 42 courses of treatment were completed.

49 children under 5 years and not eligible for the school dental service were examined. 29 were treated and 13 courses of treatment were completed.

In addition to the detailed figures shown in Table VII one denture was repaired.

Section 23 — Midwifery Services.

Under the provisions of Section 23 of the National Health Service Act, 1946, the local health authority fulfilled its obligations by covering its area with a sufficient number of

qualified midwives to meet the needs thereof. The Authority had in its employ on the 31st December, 1964, 1 whole-time and 21 part-time midwives, giving an equivalent whole-time staff of 8.8 midwives available to attend upon women being confined in their own homes. In addition to these there were hospital midwives practising in the County on the 31st December, 1964. There were no private midwives practising in Breconshire.

One Superintendent Nursing Officer is employed who is also the Non-Medical Supervisor of Midwives. Periodic inspections are made to the midwives employed by the local health authority, and supervision of Hospital Midwives is also carried out.

The midwifery work is mainly undertaken by District Nurse/Midwives and in 2 instances by District Nurse/Midwives/Health Visitors. At present there are insufficient night calls to warrant a night rota system. In some areas, i.e., Ystradgynlais, Abercrave, Cefn Coed, Brecon and Builth Wells, there are whole time relief District Nurse/Midwives. Other areas are relieved by District Nurse/Midwives in adjoining areas.

Tables dealing with midwifery, notification of births, etc., are given below:—

Supervision of Midwives—

Forty-six Midwives notified their intention to practice in the County, viz., 43 residents and 3 border midwives.

Of the above—

20 were resident in Institutions.

3 Radnorshire midwives functioning in Breconshire, by arrangement between the Authorities.

23 were employed by the Breconshire County Council.

Ante-Natal Supervision by Midwives—

Domiciliary midwives undertake ante-natal supervision of their patients. This supervision is backed by a comprehensive service provided by the general practitioners, the local health authority at their ante-natal clinics, and the Hospital Service.

The domiciliary midwives work in close co-operation with the local general practitioners undertaking maternity medical services. They attend with their patients whenever required to do so, at the doctors' surgeries. Doctors are notified of births by the Public Health Department within a week of the notification of birth being received. This has been arranged at the request of the Local Medical Committee.

Notifications from Midwives during 1964.—

Refresher Courses for Midwives.

There are no facilities for holding refresher courses for midwives within the County.

During the year 5 midwives attended refresher courses at Hastings, Cardiff, Bangor and Exeter.

All midwives employed by the Authority comply with the "Midwives Rules Approval Instrument No. 1955," having attended refresher courses within the prescribed time limits

Training of Pupil Midwives.

No facilities exist for the actual training of pupil midwives within the County.

The cost of training midwives is, of course, a pool arrangement and Breconshire contributes to the Central Midwives Board, the amount levied for this purpose.

Notification of Births.

Section 24—Health Visiting.

The health visiting staff consists of 1 Superintendent Nursing Officer and 14 part-time health visitors, who also act as school nurses and/or district nurses, 2 of these nurses perform duties of Health Visitors under dispensation by the Minister of Health.

The Health Visitors visit monthly, children under one year of age and thereafter at three-monthly intervals those between one and five years, although the two year olds are visited more frequently.

In addition to health visiting of expectant mothers and nursing mothers of young children, the health visiting staff works in close co-operation with the hospitals. When notices of discharges are received from the hospitals these are forwarded to the appropriate health visitors for the area, giving the diagnosis, treatment and recommendation as to further treatment. In some instances the health visitor, being also the district nurse, undertakes any practical nursing required.

The County Council offers allowances of 75% of the minimum salary of Health Visitor, for the duration of the course to suitably qualified persons who are prepared to train for the Health Visitor's Certificate, plus the usual allowance made by the Breconshire County Council in respect of uniform and laundry, as well as reasonable travelling expenses, tuition and examination fees incurred in pursuing the training course approved by the County Council.

Training of Health Visitors is now subject to financial pooling arrangements, somewhat similar to Midwives Training. The expenditure of the Authority will be adjusted by a further claim against them, or by re-imbusement of excess expenditure.

There are no facilities for the training of student health visitors within the County.

Particulars of the number of visits paid to mothers and babies are to be found in Table VI appended.

During the year 5 Health Visitors attended a week-end course held at Plasgwyn University College, Bangor.

HEALTH EDUCATION

Ante Natal.

Classes continue to be run at Brecon Clinic by the Health Visitor and midwives and at six County Council Clinics. For further details of this one should refer to page 19 of this report under the heading of "Relaxation Exercise and Mothercraft Training Clinics."

Individual teaching is still being given by the Health Visitors at Infant Welfare Clinics.

Lung Cancer.

Health Education in relation to Lung Cancer is still mainly directed to the teenagers in schools. Posters, are freely displayed at all County Council Clinics and other premises, drawing the attention of members of the public to the dangers of smoking.

Visits were made to all Secondary Schools in the County, when the pupils were lectured on the hazards of smoking. It is hoped that these lectures to, and discussions with, the senior pupils can be undertaken by members of the Health Department staff annually.

During the year posters were received from the Cancer Information Centre, Cardiff, for distribution, and the film "Smoking and You" is available for free loan to Youth Clubs etc. The Authority also purchased a 16 m.m. projector and all necessary equipment, during the year so that arrangements can also be made to show Health Education films to those groups not possessing such equipment.

Section 25 — Home Nursing.

A whole-time nursing service is provided by the local health authority. The staff consists of 3 whole-time and 21 part-time nurses, giving an equivalent of 15.4 full-time nurses. The nurses in the various districts co-operate to the fullest extent, and work in conjunction, with the general practitioners. The supervision of the nursing in the home is exercised by the Superintendent Nursing Officer. Liaison with the hospital and domiciliary nursing services does not generally exist in a direct nature. In the small hospitals within the County, the doctors at the hospitals are normally the general practitioners who are already in close contact

with the district nurses. In the case of the large base hospitals situated outside the county, the patient's doctor is aware of the requirements of discharged cases and he requests what attention is necessary. Also, as in the case of health visitors, hospitals contact the department when they require domiciliary nursing of any case being discharged.

Classification and Proportion of Main Types of Cases attended by Home Nurses.

During the year 1,895 patients were nursed in the homes and 45,613 visits were made.

Further analysis of the above figures show that 722 patients were over 65 years of age, and 119 were under 5 years.

The average number of visits per case for all patients works out at 24.0 visits each.

Section 26 — Vaccination and Immunisation.

Under the provision of Section 26 of the National Health Service Act, 1946, arrangements are made for Smallpox vaccination and immunisation against diphtheria to be carried out by the general practitioners and at clinics by the local health authority's Medical Officers.

Health Visitors in their visits to the homes encourage the parents to avail themselves of the opportunity of having the children vaccinated against Smallpox.

Health Visitors also encourage the mothers to bring their children to the clinics for immunisation against diphtheria or take them to the general practitioner.

The following tables show the work carried out in the County during 1964.

(a) Vaccination—

Vaccination can be carried out by the family doctors at their surgeries at the request of the parents, and is also undertaken by the County Council Medical Staff. Practitioners who have expressed a wish to undertake this work are supplied with lymph free of charge on request to the appropriate Public Health Laboratory, and record cards are supplied from the Health Department on which to enter the necessary particulars, these cards being returned to the County Medical Officer for statistical purposes and for payment to the General Practitioner.

Vaccination is free of charge to the patient.

(b) Diphtheria Immunisation—

Diphtheria Immunisation work is being carried out quite satisfactorily at the various Infant Welfare Centres, on school premises and clinics, and from the figures obtainable to the end of the year, there is no doubt that the scheme continues to work most efficiently. In addition, children are immunised by private practitioners at their surgeries, and record cards are provided by the Health Department. Completed records are returned for statistical purposes.

(c) Immunisation against Whooping Cough.

The immunisation against Whooping Cough, like other injections, can be given at the County Council Clinics and Schools or by the general medical practitioners at their own surgeries or in the homes.

The Council's Scheme for Vaccination and Immunisation Section 26, was extended in 1954 to include the inoculation of children against whooping cough.

Antigen is supplied to General Practitioners for the combined inoculation against Diphtheria-Pertussis, or a Whooping Cough vaccine itself.

(d) Tetanus.

A scheme for inoculation against tetanus was commenced in 1961 and has been in operation for close on three years. The injections are normally combined with injections for Diphtheria and whooping Cough or Diphtheria only. Occasionally anti-tetanus injections are given alone when necessary.

(e) Poliomyelitis Vaccination.

The scheme for the vaccination of children and adults against poliomyelitis continued to work very smoothly throughout the year.

Sessions for vaccination were held during the day at School Clinics, or alternatively patients could be vaccinated by their own doctors.

Section 27—Ambulance Service.

The Ambulance Services in the County were undertaken by the St. John's Welsh Home Ambulance Association who continued to act as sole agents for the County up to the 31st March, 1964.

From the 1st April, 1964, the Breconshire County Council took over the operational control of the Ambulance Service.

Eight ambulances were used as operational vehicles with a reserve of two vehicles, although it is anticipated in the near future that this number will be increased.

As well as assuring operational control, the day to day administration continued to be the responsibility of the County Medical Officer on behalf of the Local Health Authority.

The ambulance arrangements remain as follows, at Brecon, Builth, Crickhowell, Hay, Brynmawr and Ystradgynlais, since the Breconshire County Council has entered into agreement with garage owners to operate the scheme on similar lines to the garage arrangements previously made between the St. John's Association and the garages (excepting Ystradgynlais).

1. Brecon Ambulances.—Two ambulances cover Brecon Borough and the whole of Brecon Rural District.
2. Builth Ambulance covers Builth Urban, Llanwrtyd Urban, and Builth Rural District, with the exception of the parish of Llanwrthwl at the very north of the County. This ambulance will also, by arrangement with Radnorshire, in emergency cases only, continue to cover as heretofore a small area of the County adjoining Builth Urban, viz., the parishes of Llanelwedd, Llansantffraed-in-Elvel, Aberedw, Disserseth, Rhulen, Llanbadarn-y-garreg, Llanfared and Cregrina, Glas-cwm and Colva. Radnorshire, on their part covers for us the three Breconshire parishes of Llys dinam, Llanfihangel Brynpabuan, and Llanwrthwl in the north of the County by their ambulance from Llandrindod Wells.
3. Hay Ambulance covers Hay Urban and Hay Rural Districts together with the Radnorshire District of Painscastle Rural and parishes of Newchurch and Michaelchurch-on-Arrow.
4. Crickhowell Ambulance covers the whole of the Crickhowell Rural District, other than Clydach and Darenfelen Areas.
5. Brynmawr Ambulance.—This ambulance covers Brynmawr, Clydach and Darenfelen.
6. Ystradgynlais Ambulances.—Two ambulances in this area are operated within the framework of the County Ambulance Service by full time personnel.

Apart from what has been mentioned above, in connection with Radnorshire, there are two areas of the County, both situated on the southern border, for which arrangements have been made for them to be covered by outside authorities as follow:—

- (a) Vaynor and Penderyn Rural District, including the Brecon Rural appendage of Hepste. Glamorgan has undertaken to cover this area in their scheme by their ambulances stationed at Seven Sisters, Glynneath and Aberdare.

- (b) The Village of Cefn Coed and the adjoining Parish of Vaynor (Pontsticill). The Borough of Merthyr Tydfil has undertaken to include this area in their ambulance scheme.

Since a considerable number of people live in the rural part of the Penderyn parish situated on the eastern border of this parish where it adjoins the parish of Vaynor but live within easy access of the main Brecon-Merthyr road, arrangements have been made that these people should be covered for ambulance purposes by the Merthyr Borough, even though they actually live within part of the area for which Glamorgan has undertaken responsibility since it is much more easy to obtain ambulance transport from Merthyr and Merthyr General Hospital is the one to which they always go when in need.

The arrangements with the Border Counties have worked satisfactorily, and I think it can be reported again that the scheme is working very well.

A County Ambulance Transport Committee meets quarterly and includes representatives of the County Council, the Regional Hospital Board, and co-opted representatives of other interested bodies.

Ambulance Station Telephone Numbers.—Table IX appended to this report gives the telephone Numbers of Ambulance Stations serving the County. These numbers are not necessarily the same as those exhibited in Telephone Exchanges to which all emergency calls are directed. For instance, the emergency calls for Brynmawr are relayed to Caerleon 283. A local arrangement exists whereby calls directed to Monmouthshire are immediately referred to the Brynmawr station or, if need be, the calls are answered by Monmouthshire.

Sitting Car Service.

This service is running quite efficiently and works as follows:—

Each medical practitioner, midwife, hospital matron, etc., is supplied with voucher books authorising journeys to be made by private car at the expense of the local health authority in all cases where by reason of physical or mental defect the patient is unable to travel by public conveyance, and the starting point is situated within the County. The charges permitted are agreed by the local health authority, who advertise for tenders from car proprietors who are willing to undertake the conveyance of patients. For this purpose the County is divided into 13 areas which are covered by 10 contractors. The following table shews the contractors and the parishes covered since 1/4/64. The contract for conveyance of sitting patients is for a period of three years. The present contracts will thus remain in operation until 31st March, 1967. At Ystradgynlais, sitting patients are conveyed by the ambulances since whole time

personnel are employed. Penderyn, although not covered by an official contractor, present no difficulties, much of the work being done by the bordering authority on our behalf, and cases are also conveyed by local garage proprietors.

No tenders were received in respect of District No. 7, Penderyn and Ystradfellte.

It is pointed out that no tenders were invited and, therefore, no contracts entered into in respect of the Ystradgynlais District, in view of the fact that this district is at present adequately covered by the County Council's ambulances operating in the district. From time to time use is made of Local Garages to supplement this service if demands are too heavy.

The Ambulance Service in Breconshire has no 24-hour central control but on the whole the service operates very smoothly indeed, in spite of this. Much consideration has been given to the question of central control and the question has also been subjected to considerable investigation by the officers of the Welsh Board of Health and the Ministry of Health, with the conclusion that a compromise has been arranged whereby a 24-hour service is guaranteed by the garages, and the County Health Department can act as central control during office hours. Calls for sitting cars during the day are normally made from hospitals outside the County to the County Health Department or to one of the ambulance stations. Requests from doctors within the County are made direct to the various contractors.

The limit of 40 miles, over which it is necessary to obtain prior approval from the County Medical Officer, continues to be imposed and has enabled the local health authority to combine a considerable number of journeys thereby reducing the cost accordingly.

Doctors and hospitals are from time to time reminded of economy and letters have been repeatedly written to hospitals requesting them to change times of appointments in order to fit in more than one patient in a car proceeding to the hospital.

The inconvenience and remote situation of many dwellings must have a direct bearing on the demand for transport under this scheme and although general practitioners are being constantly informed of this, it is inevitable that it must tend to increase the demand.

With the withdrawal of train services and the curtailment of certain bus services in Breconshire, it is inevitable that this problem will be felt to a greater extent in the future.

There does not appear to be any deliberate abuse of the scheme, which the local health authority supervises very carefully.

It will be noted that the number of journeys undertaken, mileage covered and the patients carried by sitting car rose again during the year. The sitting car service made 692 more journeys, carried 1370 additional patients and covered 25,116 more miles than in 1963.

Section 28.—Prevention of Illness, Care and After-Care.

Under this heading comes the after-care of patients suffering from tuberculosis, mental illness or defectiveness, all types of illnesses, the provision of equipment and apparatus (medical comforts) required for nursing the patients in the homes, and accommodation in recuperation homes. The local health authority, as was the case previously, is responsible for the provision of extra nourishment and clothes for the patient and his family, except in the case of patients who are in receipt of

National Assistance, when these items would be the responsibility of the National Assistance Board. Provision of out-door shelters, special beds and bedding, and other nursing requisites, etc., is the concern of the local health authority, and applications for any of these services are dealt with after furnishing particulars of all members of the family income, etc. When assistance is given, it is either free of charge or on whole or part payment by the patient. The amount of payment to be made by the patient is assessed on an income scale adopted by the local health authority and approved by the Ministry of Health.

Such items as wheel-chairs and crutches are provided by the County Council if the need is a temporary one, but if the necessity is likely to be permanent, then the responsibility for the provision of the articles rests with the Regional Hospital Board, such items being supplied through the Ministry of Pensions. Any applications of this nature are forwarded by this Department to the appropriate Hospital Management Committee requesting them to deal with the case.

Nursing requisites of a minor nature are provided free in all cases.

(1) **Tuberculosis** — The treatment of Tuberculosis in the County is carried on by the Welsh Hospital Board (Tuberculosis Division). Table V (appended) shows the number of cases notified on Form "A" during the year.

Where necessary, the local health authority will provide tuberculosis patients with shelters on loan, and extra nourishment can be provided by the local health authority for them. The health visitors visit households in which there are tuberculosis patients and offer advice as to contacts and preventive measures which should be taken by them. Cases of bad housing conditions are referred to the local housing authorities.

The local health authority, with the Welsh Hospital Board, arrange for the joint appointment of medical officers who are employed in connection with the local health authority's services in relation to the prevention of illness, care and after-care of persons suffering from tuberculosis.

The Domestic Help Scheme under Section 29 also plays its part in the prevention of illness, care and after-care of these cases.

The Chest Physicians undertaking duties in Breconshire still undertake the work of B.C.G. Vaccination in the County Areas under their control in respect of contact cases.

The Council's Scheme for B.C.G. Vaccination was approved by the Ministry in March, 1954, and since this date the Authority's Medical Officers have been skin testing and vaccinating school children between their thirteenth and fourteenth birthdays.

In 1959, proposals were submitted by the County Council to the Ministry for the extension of this scheme, to include the skin testing and vaccination or re-vaccination if necessary, of all children over the age of 13 years in school. This scheme was later approved by the Ministry during that year, and was brought into operation in 1960.

T.B. Serial Testing in Schools.

In addition to the above scheme a further scheme for annual skin testing and the X'Raying of any positive reactors was introduced for all school children.

Annual tuberculin testing of all school children provides accurate and reliable information regarding the number of children infected from natural sources during any period of twelve months.

The annual conversion rate of non-reactor children will serve as a reliable index of the prevailing risk of infection in the community. When the conversion rate is found to be abnormally high in any class, school or district it indicates that viable tubercule bacilli are being disseminated freely and that

intensive case finding investigations should be applied including possibly the mass radiography service.

Contacts in the home or at school would be traced and thus prevent the further spread of the disease.

It is hoped, therefore, that by this method we will be able to detect the sources of infection which otherwise would not have been discovered until later.

(2) Illness Generally—

Arrangements exist for the follow-up of all cases discharged from hospital and work in the after-care of patients is closely linked with Domestic Help and Home Nursing Services.

Nursing equipment and apparatus are loaned to patients direct by the local health authority free of charge.

Items are also loaned by the St. John Ambulance Association and British Red Cross Society. The local health authority has assisted St. John's by providing suitable premises for storage where possible, by grants, and also by the provision of equipment.

In Crickhowell, Llanwrtyd and Gilwern, the British Red Cross Society have set up Comforts Depots, for which we have purchased the equipment. In Crickhowell, the County Council provided the storage facilities at the Market Hall.

During the year, in addition to the items which have been loaned to patients direct and by St. John and the British Red Cross, the following action has been taken to assist patients:—

In addition to the above known applications, the nurses have for their own use such items as air rings and rubber sheeting which are loaned to patients.

Orthopaedic Work.

Although this Report covers the calendar year 1964, I feel I must comment on the tragic death of Mrs. N. G. Neat, the Orthopaedic Nurse, who died in April 1965 following a road accident in which she was involved. She had only been a short while in Breconshire but was well liked by her patients who greatly appreciated her services. The sympathy of the Department has been extended to her family, and particularly her daughter.

The treatment of orthopaedic cases is undertaken by the Authority, and the services of Mr. E. R. Treasure, F.R.C.S., Orthopaedic Specialist, St. Tydfil's Hospital, Merthyr, are available by arrangement with the Welsh Hospital Board.

The Local Health Authority employed an Orthopaedic Nurse, Mrs. N. G. Neat, who payed domiciliary visits as and when necessary. She also held frequent fixed clinics throughout the County.

Mrs. Neat assisted at Mr. Treasure's clinic in Brecon Hospital, for which service the Welsh Hospital Board pays to the Local Health Authority an agreed sessional fee.

Chiropody Service.

The County Council's Chiropody Service, which started in April, 1960, still continues to function very satisfactorily, although demands made on the service are increasing. It is a service which is growing and which, of course, is a great help to the elderly.

The number of clinic sessions has again been increased during the year and from time to time the Chiropodists, who are engaged on a sessional basis, allocate extra sessions to us to reduce the waiting lists.

In the first instance the categories of patients catered for are

- (i) The elderly.
- (ii) The physically handicapped.
- (iii) Expectant mothers.

(iv) Other patients at discretion of County Medical Officer.
and in view of the ever increasing demands made upon the service by these categories alone it is still impossible to extend the scheme beyond these at present.

All Chiropodists were assisted by teams of volunteers drawn from the British Red Cross, St. John Ambulance Association, Old Age Pensioners' Association, and the W.V.S. There is no doubt that the efficiency of the scheme owes much to the valuable services rendered by these good ladies and it is once again recorded that we deeply appreciate this work undertaken by them.

Due to the death of Mr. E. H. Spencer Jones, early in 1964 it became necessary to seek an extension of sessional work undertaken by Mr. T. J. Smith and by the employment of a few sessions by Mr. C. W. Roberts, of Merthyr Tydfil.

Mr. Smith gave 2 days (4 sessions) per week to this service, and Mr. Roberts undertook the Brecon Clinic weekly.

It thus became necessary to re-arrange the days and times of clinics.

The above times were for those clinics which were fixed, but additional sessions were frequently held.

It has previously been stated that at some future date clinics will be extended to Talgarth, Llanwrtyd Wells and Sennybridge. When clinic premises are erected in these places it is hoped to put the extension plan into operation.

The method of obtaining treatment is still the same as hitherto and patients can either ask for an appointment direct from the local volunteers running the clinic in their area, or write to the County Medical Officer.

Transport of patients to the Chiropody Clinics can be undertaken under Section 27 of the National Health Service Act, 1946, if the patient is unable to attend by means of alternative public transport. Alternatively, when a patient is conveyed to the Clinic by the voluntary agency, using a member's car, such member is paid at the rate of 6d. per mile. Authorisation by the patient's doctor, however, is required before transport can be provided either by the Ambulance Authority or the Voluntary agency.

All Chiropodists employed are qualified and satisfy one or other of the qualifications stated in Section 3 of the National Health Service (Medical Auxiliaries) Regulations, 1954 (Statutory Instrument No. 55, 1954), and the Local Health Authority has been most careful in seeing that the requirements of these Regulations have been fully met.

Elderly and handicapped patients have treatment free of charge; expectant mothers and other patients pay 2/6d. per treatment.

Three part-time Chiropodists were engaged by the local Health Authority on a sessional basis and they attended clinics and paid domiciliary visits as required.

Mrs. M. A. Llewellyn, 36, Gough Road, Ystalyfera, Glam., attended at the Abercrave, Ystradgynlais and Cwmtwrch Clinics, Mr. C. W. Roberts, 112a Brecon Road, Merthyr Tydfil, visited Brecon and Mr. T. J. Smith, Parame, Llangynidr, attended at the remainder of the clinics throughout the County.

VENEREAL DISEASES—

The authority's health visitors are available for the visiting of these cases to encourage them to keep up their attendance at special clinics and continue with the prescribed treatment.

Free posters are issued for display at Clinics and elsewhere.

Apart from any assistance as above, treatment of V.D. is provided by the Regional Hospital Board. There are no treatment centres in the County and patients attend at Swansea Mount Pleasant Hospital, Hereford County Hospital, Royal Gwent Hospital, Newport, Moira Terrace, Cardiff, Merthyr Tydfil, and V.D. Clinic, 1, Belmont, Shrewsbury.

CANCER—

During the year, the number of deaths from Cancer and the death rate decreased, the figures being, 104 deaths and the death rate 1.91 per 1,000 population, as compared with 120 and a death rate of 2.20 in 1963. Of the 104 there were 20 cases of lung cancer.

Deaths from Cancer accounted for 14.02% of all the deaths. The deaths from lung cancer were 23.81% of the total cancer deaths.

The death rate per 1,000 population of Lung Cancer was 0.36 for 1964 compared with a figure of 0.42 for 1963.

Section 29.—DOMESTIC HELP—

This scheme under Section 29 of the National Health Service Act, 1946, continues to work quite well throughout the County. The difficulty previously encountered owing to the lack of domestic helps has almost disappeared, and difficulty is now only experienced in the odd case where domestic helps are unwilling to accept the case.

Domestic Helps are registered with the authority and then engaged on a case basis as required.

During 1963 the Welsh Board of Health called for a revised set of figures, and it will therefore, be noted that the figures given in the following tables cannot be a true comparison with previous years. In an endeavour to give a comparison with the last four years it is necessary to repeat some of the categories helped in this table.

On the 31st December, 1964, the number of domestic helps employed by the Authority was :

Mrs. F. J. McLean (nee Thorogood) supervises the domestic helps by frequent visits to patients' homes. There is now a closer liaison between the domestic helps, the patients and the Department since the appointment of a Domestic Help Supervisor, and irregularities, however slight, are investigated by the Supervisor immediately.

Holiday Scheme for Domestic Helps.

During 1963 the Breconshire County Council introduced a holiday scheme for domestic helps based on the number of hours worked and the continuity of each domestic help's service during the previous year.

The scheme was one formulated by the Authority and is not a national agreement. Domestic helps being engaged on a case basis were not considered to be covered by any such agreement nationally and this scheme was formulated and is operated by the County Council without prejudice to any further decision which the Authority may make in this matter.

The conditions applied in the operation of the scheme are as follows:—

“The Domestic Helps will only be entitled to holidays in any year, provided they have worked for an average of **5 hours or more per week** during the previous year, and also worked for a period of **27 weeks or more**.

The scheme introduced will operate as under:

- (i) Domestic Helps who work between 27 weeks and 39 weeks in the year ... 1 week's holiday
- (ii) Domestic Helps who work 40 weeks or over in the year ... 2 weeks' holiday

Provided that in (i) and (ii) the employee has worked for an average of 5 hours per week throughout the year of 52 weeks.

- (1) Work undertaken this year will govern the holiday entitlement or payment in lieu for next year.
- (2) Because of the nature of the Domestic Help Service and because most persons are in the main working short hours, the holiday will be calculated in hours and not in days and payment will be made in lieu of holidays.
- (3) Domestic Helps take holidays as they require them as hitherto, but the payment in lieu is calculated as soon as practicable after the end of the financial year and payment will be made to all persons say at the end of May each year.
- (4) Persons leaving the service will only receive their holiday entitlement (if any) at the appropriate time, as mentioned in paragraph (3).

It will thus be seen that the minimum payment to be made to any domestic help in lieu of holidays is for five hours.

The cost of this scheme to the County Council in the first year was £723, and for the year 1964 was £821.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE.

Mental Health Act, 1959.

The Mental Health Act, 1959, came into operation during 1960. All previous legislation relating to mental illness and mental deficiency and contained in the Lunacy and Mental

Treatment Acts, 1890-1930 and the Mental Deficiency Acts, 1913-38, was repealed in the new Act.

The Mental Health Act, 1959, makes provision with respect to the treatment and care of mentally disordered persons and with respect to their property and affairs. The emphasis throughout this Act is on treatment and not custody. Every effort will be made to encourage patients to seek treatment informally and without compulsion. A mentally disordered person can now enter any Mental Hospital or General Hospital for observation without any formality or certification whatsoever.

Types of Mentally Disordered Persons.

- (a) **Mentally Ill.**
- (b) **Psychopathic Personality.**
- (c) **Severely Subnormal Personality.**
- (d) **Subnormal Personality.**

The magistrate no longer has any part in the compulsory admission of patients to hospital. This lays stress on medical, as opposed to the administrative outlook on mental disorder. The compulsory admission for observation or treatment will now be on the recommendation of two doctors. One doctor must have special psychiatric experience, and the other doctor if possible should be the patient's general medical practitioner.

Adequate safeguards against unnecessary detention are provided by the establishment of Mental Health Review Tribunals. One Tribunal is formed for each area for which there is a Regional Hospital Board, to consider applications from patients already in mental hospitals for their release from hospital.

The Local Health Authority is responsible for the community care of all mentally disordered persons not in hospital.

Local Authority Services

Under Section 28 of the National Health Service Act.

(a) The provision, equipment and maintenance of residential accommodation and the care of persons resident in such accommodation.

(b) The provision of centres for training or occupation and the equipment and maintenance of such centres.

(c) The appointment of officers to act as Mental Welfare Officers.

(d) To supervise persons placed under Guardianship.

(e) The provision of a home training service.

(f) The provision of day centres.

(g) The provision of social clubs.

(h) The provision of a Home Visiting Service.

Under Education Act, 1944.

The ascertainment of children unsuitable for education in school.

ORGANISATION AND STAFF OF THE MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES.

(A) The following is, in outline, a description of the existing organisation and staff arrangements:—

(1) Mental Health Sub-Committee.

The Local Health Authority has appointed a Mental Health Services Sub-Committee which is a sub-committee of the Local Health Committee.

(2) Officers responsible for organisation and control.

The County Medical Officer, Dr. R. G. Evans, assisted by the Deputy County Medical Officer, Dr. J. K. Jones, and the Assistant Medical Officer, Dr. C. M. S. Evans, advise the authority on mental health matters. The County Medical Officer undertakes the overall organisation and control of the services and the direction of all mental health workers carrying out the function of the local health authority. The Deputy Medical Officer is responsible for the day to day organisation of the mental health services.

The ascertainment of subnormal or severely subnormal personality is undertaken by the County Medical Officer, the Deputy County Medical Officer and Dr. C. E. Edwards, Assistant Medical Officer and District M.O.H. (Southern areas) who are approved by the Breconshire L.E.A. for the ascertainment of children who are unsuitable for education at school.

The psychiatrists of the Welsh Hospital Board co-operate to the fullest extent and borderline or controversial cases are referred to them for opinion. In this connection Dr. G. Diggle, Medical Superintendent of the Mid-Wales Hospital, Talgarth, gives every possible help.

Dr. Michael Craft, Consultant Psychiatrist for North and Mid-Wales, co-operates fully with this department and he is

always ready to advise on any cases on his visits South. Dr. Craft is also the Medical Superintendent of Oakwood Park Hospital, Conway, North Wales.

Dr. D. C. Wynn Jenkins, Medical Superintendent, of Ely Hospital, Cardiff also co-operates with the department. Four such cases were admitted to Hospitals for short periods in 1964.

During the year cases were also referred to Mr. J. McDonald Child Psychiatrist, at Swansea, and to Dr. Gaynor N. Lacey, Consultant Psychiatrist to Merthyr Tydfil Education Committee for assessment.

The co-operation, help and guidance of all these Consultant Psychiatrists, and that of the staff of the Welsh Hospital Board at Cardiff, has greatly helped us in surmounting our problems and is much appreciated.

(3) Administrative and Clerical Staff.

Two part-time officers assist the County Medical Officer in the administration of the Mental Health Services.

(4) Psychiatric Social Worker.

One Psychiatric Social Worker is employed by the Welsh Border Hospital Management Committee (Regional Hospital Board) jointly with the County Councils of Breconshire, Radnorshire and Montgomeryshire. She devotes 5/33rds of her time to Breconshire.

(5) Mental Welfare Officers.

Mental Welfare Officers.— Six give part-time service only, as they are also Welfare Officers and Registrars of Births and Deaths. They work in the following five areas:—

- (a) Brecon and Sennybridge — Mr. H. G. Edwards.
- (b) Brynmawr and Crickhowell — Mr. T. V. Rees.
- (c) Builth, Hay and Talgarth — Mr. W. B. Hargest.
- (d) Ystradgynlais — Mr. W. T. Davies.
- (e) Vaynor and Penderyn — Mrs. M. M. R. England.
- (f) Whole County (Relief) — Mr. R. I. Jones.

A system of relief has been devised to ensure that a Mental Welfare Officer is always available for any district. Each Mental Welfare Officer relieves his or her neighbouring colleague, and as a further safeguard, Mr. R. I. Jones, Chief Clerk in the Public Health Department, has been appointed and approved as Relief Mental Welfare Officer.

Table XI appended to this report shows the names, addresses and telephone numbers of the Mental Welfare Officers; giving their normal areas served together with the areas they each relieve.

Although these officers only give part-time service in the Mental Health field, those at Brecon, Brynmawr and Hay are actually whole-time officers of the Council, whereas those at Vaynor and Penderyn and at Ystradgynlais are only part-time officers.

The duties of the Mental Welfare Officers are to exercise the functions given to them by Sections 22, 135 and 140 and Parts IV and V of the Mental Health Act, 1959.

It is proposed to send all Mental Welfare Officers on approved Courses in Mental Health at the earliest possible time.

(6) **Health Visitors and Home Visiting Services.**

Periodic visits are paid by the Health Visitors to all sub-normal patients in their area. Some of these patients are also visited by the Psychiatric Social Worker.

The Health Visitors also visit and submit a periodic report on patients discharged from mental hospitals, as part of a Home Visiting Service. Cases suitable for surveillance by the Health Visitors are forwarded by the Psychiatric Social Worker and the Health Visitors work under the guidance of the Deputy County Medical Officer and the Superintendent Nursing Officer.

The majority of the home visiting of mentally disordered patients is still, however undertaken by the Psychiatric Social Worker working from the Mid-Wales Hospital, Talgarth.

(7) Training of Staff.

(a) Mental Welfare Officers.

It is proposed to send all the Mental Welfare Officers on an approved course in Mental Health at the earliest possible date.

(b) Health Visitors.

Health Visitors employed by the Local Authority attended a course of "In-Service" training organised by the Medical Superintendent, Mid-Wales Hospital, Talgarth, and visited the Rehabilitation Unit at Cardiff, during the year.

The Deputy County Medical Officer, the Medical Superintendent of the Mid-Wales Hospital, Talgarth and the Psychiatric Social Worker, have given lectures on the Mental Health Act to all nursing staff.

Miss Gwendoline Morgan, the Psychiatric Social Worker discusses individual patients with the Health Visitors at frequent meetings throughout the County.

An excellent liaison has thus been established between the staff of the Mid-Wales Hospital, Talgarth and the Health Department of the Council.

In-service training is being continued at the Mid-Wales Hospital and Health Visitors attend a series of one-day study courses. These are held for one day each month.

(c) Supervisors of Occupation Centres.

At the beginning of 1964 two trainee Supervisors of Occupation Centres were undergoing full time training for a one year and a two year course at Birmingham and Bristol respectively. Both these candidates were sponsored by the Authority and they will work in Breconshire for two years after training if required to do so. During the course they were paid 75% of the salary of a qualified Supervisor.

Miss Carole Powney completed her course in July, 1964, and was absorbed into the staff of the Local Health Authority. She is now engaged as a peripatetic teacher for the mentally handicapped and visits handicapped patients in their own homes. This arrangement will exist until such time as our occupation and training centre for adults and children is ready for occupation.

Miss M. Bann will complete her course in July, 1965.

(8) Training Centre.

There are no Junior Training Centres or Adult Training Centres at present available in the area, although the erection of the Centre was commenced in September, 1964.

Social, educational and occupational training will be provided as governed by the demands made for such services. Ancilliary services such as meals, medical inspection, dental treatment and provision of transport will be provided.

Arrangements have been made with adjoining Authorities for the attendance of certain patients at their occupation centres.

Eight patients attend Occupation Centres in adjoining Counties.

One boy is resident at the Sunfield Children's Home, Clent, Worcs., and another "chair-bound" boy is at the Cheshire Home, Hawthorn Lodge, Dorchester.

(9) Residential Accommodation.

No form of residential accommodation is available at present, but this may well warrant serious consideration sooner than was anticipated.

The authority will, when necessary, and when possible arrange with voluntary bodies or other authorities providing such facilities, for accommodation to be available for cases from this area

(10) Home Training.

As previously stated, Miss Carole Powney is now engaged as a peripatetic teacher for the mentally handicapped and visits them in their own homes.

With the development of a Training Centre it is anticipated that there will be no need for home teaching, although the Authority will review the position from time to time to ensure that all patients who will benefit are given an opportunity to receive training.

(11) Day Centres, Social Clubs, Etc.

There are no existing arrangements of this nature.

It is the Authority's intention, with the aid of the Voluntary Agencies, to provide Social Clubs and other activities, but that at the onset a pilot scheme should operate in the County Town (Brecon) and that the service should be extended as soon as the demand warrants the establishment of Social Centres and Clubs elsewhere.

(12) Guardianship.

The Authority will ensure that they will exercise their functions under the Mental Health Act, 1959, in respect of

persons placed under guardianship, whether that of the Authority or of other persons.

There were no cases under Guardianship in the County during 1964.

(13) Statistics.

Details of patients receiving home visits, attending Occupation Centres, waiting for admission to Occupation Centres. Admissions and Discharges from Hospitals, etc., are given in Table XII as an appendix to this Report.

In Section B of this table will be found the number of cases referred to the Local Health Authority during the year 1964.

Admission of Emergency Cases to Psychiatric Hospitals.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 132 of the Mental Health Act, 1959, and due to the prevailing shortage of accommodation and the long waiting lists, it will still be necessary for the Welsh Hospital Board to continue to arrange accommodation through its central bed bureau which has been in operation since 1948. Every effort will be made by the officers of the bureau in conjunction with the appropriate staff of the local health authority to find emergency accommodation as necessary.

Ambulance Services.

The ambulance service for mentally-ill patients is the same as set out in Section 27.

Annual Report on the Psychiatric Social Work for Breconshire during the year 1964.

Three Psychiatric Hospitals provide treatment for the mentally sick of the County, the centre of treatment being mainly decided by the availability of public transport. Residents in the Swansea Valley are increasingly being served by the Cefn Coed Hospital and the Day Centre at Singleton Park, while people in the Brynmawr and Crickhowell areas find it convenient to use the Maindiff Court Hospital at Abergavenny. The North, West and central regions of the County remain the catchment area for the Mid-Wales Hospital at Talgarth. Psychiatric Social Work and after care for the whole county is provided by the P.S.W. stationed at the Mid-Wales Hospital and by the Health Visitors of the Local Authority. Cases treated at Swansea and Abergavenny are referred for follow up through the Medical Officer of Health of the County.

The outstanding problem of the psychiatric welfare service remains the rehabilitation of the chronic schizophrenic in that suitable employment is seldom available and the more rural areas do not provide the community and social stimulus needed. Despite difficulties, there is, however, a regular flow of improved schizophrenic patients being adapted into the community after leaving hospital. In the south, two chronic schizophrenics have been engaged at a Remploy Factory with excellent results, while in the north a leucotomised schizophrenic patient has been found a niche as a house painter in the building trade. In both

cases, the sympathetic handling and tolerance of workmates and employers have been instrumental in bringing about the successful readjustment to normal living conditions. Without doubt, carefully selected employment is the best social therapeutic means of helping the long-stay schizophrenic sufferer. His physical and mental limitations at first make it difficult for him to compete in normal society in that his speed and concentration are below par and he is unable to cope with responsibility until he has had a considerable period of readjustment. The attitude of his fellow men can either make or break his effort to return to normality but where a sympathetic employer is prepared to encourage and train him, he can become a worthwhile and loyal worker. Patients suffering from other psychotic disorders are more easily assimilated into the community but employment as a whole is a difficult problem in the County. The services of the Ministry of Labour provide a useful channel for resettlement. At regular monthly conferences between medical officers, the group Resettlement Officer and the Psychiatric Social Worker, the needs and prospects of improved psychiatric patients are assessed and whenever possible, arrangements are made for periods of training to be given at Industrial Rehabilitation Units.

Facilities for in-patients to discuss their personal and domestic problems are provided by regular visits to the Wards by the Psychiatric Social Worker. Anxieties concerning families, finance and employment are remedied wherever possible and the relationship between the patient and his home environment is sustained. The need to keep long stay patients in touch with modern trends is always a major concern in a psychiatric hospital and in the past year, classes have been arranged in Beauty Culture and Physical Education to prevent institutionalism and to encourage interest in personal appearance and well being.

Local Authority workers and hospital staff have combined to meet for monthly Case Conferences in order to discuss the progress of patients and to hear lectures on psychiatric treatments.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

I am indebted to the Welfare Department for supplying information of work under the National Assistance Act.

The Welfare Committee of the Council is responsible for the work under this Act.

Section 21—(i) (a) Homes for the Aged.

Ashburnham House, Talgarth	... 15 beds

Each home can provide accommodation for both male and female residents and, if necessary, married couples. During the year 33 people have been admitted to Homes for the Aged in the county, and 37 discharged (18 to hospitals for short periods and 11 for long periods). Eleven residents have died in the Homes. There is one Breconshire person in a Home maintained by a voluntary organisation and one person in accommodation of another authority. Accommodation is provided for 21 persons from other authorities. Two new Homes, one of 45 beds incorporating an annexe of 15 beds of blind persons, and the other of 15 beds are to be erected in the near future at Brecon and Cefn Coed, respectively. Building on the latter home has commenced. In addition, the ex. Public Assistance Institution, Cockcroft House, Hay-on-Wye, is to be replaced with a new 28 bedded Home at an early date.

Section 21—(i) (b) Provision of Temporary Accommodation.

Temporary accommodation, for persons who are in urgent need thereof, on account of circumstances which could not reasonably have been foreseen, is provided at Welfare House, Llangattock.

Section 29—(i) Handicapped Persons (General Classes).

Under this section of the Act, a scheme for handicapped persons has been adopted. There are 104 people registered under the scheme. There are 8 handicapped persons in accommodation provided, on behalf of the County Council, by voluntary organisations, e.g. Cheshire Homes, etc.

The Council also assist many other registered handicapped persons, e.g., with holidays, adaptations in the home, special aids, etc. The Council has also entered into an agreement with the Cambrian Factory, Llanwrtyd Wells, whereby the factory take registered disabled non ex-servicemen for training and subsequent employment under sheltered conditions—8 persons

are so assisted. Also, special car badges can be issued to disabled drivers which will assist them with parking.

Section 31—Contributions to Old People's Organisations.

The Council may make contributions to Old People's Welfare Organisations upon application, and during the year under review, 9 grants were made.

Section 48—Temporary Protection of Property.

The Council may, where no other suitable arrangements have been or are being made for the temporary protection of property of persons admitted to Hospitals, etc., arrange for such property to be protected and take reasonable steps to prevent or mitigate the loss or damage thereof.

Application.

Application for the above services should be made to the County Welfare Department, Council Chamber Building, Glamorgan Street, Brecon (Tel. Brecon 2311).

Section 29—Welfare of the Blind and Partially-Sighted.

A Welfare Officer and qualified Home Teacher of the Blind are employed to carry out the Scheme. Anyone appearing to be suffering from seriously defective vision is visited and, where necessary, an examination by an Ophthalmic Surgeon is then arranged with a view to certification and registration on the appropriate register. Usually, these examinations are arranged in the nearest consulting rooms or clinics, but, when a person is housebound, a domiciliary visit is arranged.

During the year the Ophthalmic Surgeons examined and completed Forms B.D. 8 in respect of 99 persons, certifying them as follows:—

MISCELLANEOUS—

Smallpox Hospitals. — Arrangements have been made for Smallpox Cases to be admitted to Penrhys Hospital and for Consultants to be called in to suspected cases. On diagnosing a case the Consultant will be responsible for arranging for Penrhys Hospital to be ready to receive the patient. In emergencies, where the consultants are not immediately available, a telephone call should be put through to the City Isolation Hospital, Cardiff (Telephone: Cardiff 21466), giving details to a responsible officer. The patient will be removed by the County Council under their Ambulance Scheme made under Section 27 of the N.H. Service Act, 1946.

Examinations of Staffs—The Medical Staff of the County Health Department undertake, often at short notice, the examination of candidates for various County and Education appointments.

The Education Committee has directed that all candidates be examined and X-rayed on appointment. This is to include all persons already on the staff who are appointed to new posts.

The cost of X-ray Examination is borne by the Local Health Authority under Section 28 of the National Health Service Act, 1946, with the exception of any X-Rays of Training College Candidates, in which case the cost is paid by the Ministry of Education.

Food and Drugs Act, 1955, Section 31.

Biological Sampling of Milk.

During the calendar year, 1964, a total of 296 samples of milk were taken from schools, producer-retailers and pasteurisation plants, for bacteriological and/or biological examination by the Public Health Laboratory Service.

These samples were taken as follows:

Seven samples of Tuberculin Tested milk gave positive reactions to the Brucella Ring Test, four being confirmed by animal inoculation examination. The normal precautions of informing the District Medical Officers were carried out.

Child Guidance Clinics.

The Breconshire Education Committee has approved the setting up of child guidance clinics and for this purpose they have appointed a full-time Speech Therapist and an Educational Psychologist.

Dr. G. Diggle, Consultant Psychiatrist, Mid-Wales Hospital, Talgarth, and Miss Gwen Morgan, Psychiatric Social Worker, also of Talgarth Hospital, have kindly agreed to take part in the scheme when this can be put into operation. Dr. Diggle has agreed to give one session per fortnight for this work. The Medical Staff of the Health Department of the Breconshire County Council will also be included in this Child Guidance Team, as will also, the various Health Visitors in the County.

It was anticipated that the appointment of the Education Psychologist and the Speech Therapist would have co-incided with the erection of new clinic premises in Brecon. Provision for adequate facilities for this work was planned but unfortunately delay has been experienced with the project.

In the meantime advantage is being taken of existing Child Guidance Clinics at Merthyr Tydfil, Hereford, and at Morriston Hospital.

As mentioned in a previous report, when this service has been brought into operation it will cater for the School Age Child, and the Pre-School Age Child. The Child Guidance team will be in close touch with all medical and nursing staff of child welfare clinics and will be able to advise on emotional development and behaviour difficulties which they encounter in their contacts with mothers and young children.
