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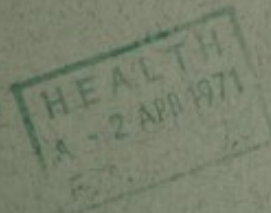

There were three infant deaths during 1968, giving an Infant Mortality rate of 30.0 which was almost twice the National average of 18.0 per 1000 Live Births.

There were four Stillbirths and one Infant death in the first week of life giving a Perinatal Mortality Rate of 48.1 which was double the County rate of 24.1 per 1000 Total Births. The National Rate was 25.0.

#### Causes of Infant Deaths

- 1) Respiratory Failure. Congenital Heart Disease.
- 2) Respiratory Distress Syndrome. Prematurity.
- 3) Asphyxia. House on Fire.

#### Causes of Stillbirths

- 1) Macerated Foetus. Intra-Uterine Death.
- 2) Intra-Uterine foetal annexia. Accidental A.P.H.
- 3) Foetal Annexia. Transportation of great vessels.
- 4) Asphyxia. Cord around neck.

### PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936, S.172

No action was taken under this section which deals with the removal to Hospital by the Local Authority of infectious persons suffering from Tuberculosis, of the Respiratory tract.

### PUBLIC HEALTH(PREVENTION OF TUBERCULOSIS)REGULATIONS

No action was taken under these Regulations in respect of persons suffering from Tuberculosis, employed in the Milk Trade.

### B.C.G.VACCINATION AND TUBERCULIN SERIAL TESTING OF CHILDREN

This is carried out by the Medical Staff of the County Health Department.

### FOOD POISONING

There was one case of Suspected Food Poisoning notified during the year, in a 4 year old girl. This was not confirmed bacteriologically.

### DYSENTERY

There were no cases of Dysentery notified during the year.

### TYPHOID AND PARATYPHOID

No cases of Typhoid or Paratyphoid were notified during the year

### VENEREAL DISEASES

There were no cases notified during the year.

The County Council has an agreement with the Regional Hospitals Board for the treatment of these cases, there are no treatment centres in the area and patients attend at Swansea Mount Pleasant Hospital, Hereford County Hospital Royal Gwent Hospital, Newport, and Moira Terrace, Cardiff. No tracing of contacts and the following up of defaulters is the responsibility of the County Council.

## NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948, S.47

No action was taken by the Council under S.47 of the above Act which provides for the removal to suitable premises of persons who : -

- (a) are suffering from grave chronic disease, or, being aged, or physically incapacitated, or living in insanitary conditions, and
- (b) are unable to devote to themselves and are not receiving from other persons, proper care and attention.

## GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES

### Public Health Officers

Mr. Gwyn Jones remained as the Public Health Inspector.

### Laboratory Facilities

During the year facilities were available at the Public Health Laboratories at Newport.

All Water samples were sent to the Public Health Laboratory at Newport, and Milk samples were dealt with at Newport and Carmarthen.

Any investigations required in the control of Infectious Diseases were carried out at the Public Health Laboratory in Newport and Abergavenny.

#### (B) WELFARE SERVICES

The County Council is responsible for the following services in the Area :-

#### Hospitals

Hospital facilities are available at Blaina, Ebbw Vale and Tredegar, Merthyr Abergavenny and Newport.

##### Infectious Disease, Hospital

Cases are admitted to the Allt-yr-yn Hospital, Newport.

##### Smallpox Hospitals.

Arrangements have been made for Smallpox cases to be admitted to Penrhys Hospital and for Consultants to be called in to suspected cases.

On diagnosing a case the Consultant will be responsible for arranging for Penrhys Hospital to be ready and staffed to receive the patient. The patient will be removed by the County Council under their Ambulance Scheme made under S.27 of the National Health Service Act, 1946.



1. Water Supply

The district is supplied with water from an impounding reservoir known as Cairns Mound Reservoir, and situated about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles north-east of the Town. The supply can be augmented by pumping water into the Reservoir from the Ffynnon Gisfaen Springs at Clydach Valley.

The water is subject to slow sand filtration; three filter beds are provided.

The reputed capacity of the reservoir is 20,000,000 gallons, but in all probability the capacity is considerably less than this. The reliable out-put of the reservoir is estimated about 120,000 gallons per day, but probably during periods about 300,000 gallons per day could be relied upon.

Brynmawr is particularly fortunate in being able to supplement their reservoir water supply with pumping from the Ffynnon Gisfaen Springs. The supply from these Springs has shown them to be practically inexhaustable and well able to provide Brynmawr with a plentiful supply of water at all times, even after a long drought. The 60 h.p. Sigmund Electric Pump and Motor which the Council installed in a Pump House sited over the Springs in July 1956, gives maximum yield of 12,000 gallons per hour, pumping against a head of 640 ft through a 6 inch main delivery pipe to the reservoir or to the Balancing Tank as required. The main leaving the reservoir is 7 inches in diameter.

On 1st April, 1959, the whole Water undertaking was taken over by the South-East Breconshire Water Supply Board, formed by four local authorities viz, Brecon Borough, The Urban District of Brynmawr, and the Rural Districts of Brecknock and Crickhowell. Each local authority being represented on the Board. Mr.K.F.Lewis, A.M.I.C.E., A.M.I.W.E., is now Clerk and Engineer to the Board.

The Public Health Inspector takes periodical samples and these are submitted to the Public Health Laboratory at Newport for biological examination.

SWIMMING BATHS

Regular visits are made to the Open Air Swimming Baths during the season with frequent checks on the conditions of the water in the baths. The chlorine content of this water is assessed thrice daily by the Baths Superintendent. The Surveyors' Department is responsible for the maintenance of the Baths and Plant whilst the purity of the water is, of necessity, a Public Health matter, and both Departments co-operate to achieve the best possible results.



## DRAINAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

2. The whole Town, with the exception of a few cottages situated in isolated parts of the district is served by public sewers.

In some of the older parts of the Town, the sewers are brick built and have been in existence for a great many years. The system is combined the sewers taking both foul sewage and storm water, the Bryn Farm Estate, Old Bryn Farm Estate and the new houses built in Aneurin Crescent are on the dual system, all surface water being excluded from the sewage system.

The sewage is purified at a Sewage Disposal Works owned by the Local Authority and the effluent discharged into the River Clydach. These Works were built in 1924 and will probably need to be enlarged at some future date.

In May 1963, the Council applied to the Usk River Board, in accordance with Section 1 of the Rivers(Prevention of Pollution) Act, 1961, for consent to discharge to the River Clydach a D.W.F of 340,000 g.p.d of fully treated sewage effluent from the Brynmawr Sewage Disposal Works. Following earlier discussions the Ministry of Housing and Local Government in November, 1964, suggested to the Council to consider a scheme to improve the treatment given at their Sewage Disposal Works.

In December, 1964, the River Board, sent to the Council a draft of the consent proposed, the principle conditions being the effluent should be of a Royal/Common 20/30 standard and there should be a dilution of not less than 8 to 1 in the receiving stream.

The maximum quantity of effluent which the River Board were prepared to accept at the existing effluent outfall in any weather was 64,000 g.p.d., and this fell short of the estimated dry flow of 340,000 g.p.d., being treated at the Works to say nothing of the expected future average in the D.W.F. In view of this the River Board suggested that : -

1. The provision of an authorised treatment plant to effect a much greater degree of purification, or,
2. Discharge the effluent to a point further down stream in the river where the flow would be sufficient to provide adequate dilution.

At about this time the Council had preliminary discussions with the Western Valley (Mon) Sewage Board about the probability of diverting to the latter trunk sewer about half of the sewage from Brynmawr.

In April, 1965 the Council engaged Consulting Engineers to advise them on the methods and apparatus at present being used for sewage treatment and disposal within the Urban Area.

Accordingly, 1. Continuous flow recording of sewage inflow to the Works and river flow is now being made.

2. Trade effluents are being investigated with a view to establishing the degree of any treatment now necessary (this in particular applies to the large Slaughterhouse in the Area.)

3. A complete survey of the sewage system be made with a view to preparing record plans.

4. Re-construction of the Sewage Works.



## PUBLIC CLEANSING

### REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

The Council operate a twice weekly collection of refuse from all parts of the Town, and a daily collection from the central sections of the Town, and disposal is by means of of controlled tipping designed to level sites of disused workings of outcrop coal seams, which are numerous in the area.

In January 1956, the Council commenced tipping refuse on the Site known as "The Patches" and this is the only site now used for this purpose.

Two Bedford Tippers are employed full-time and one 12 cubic yard Karrier is employed part-time on refuse collection.

### PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

The work of rats and mice destruction has proceeded satisfactorily and has been carried out in accordance with the provisions of the above Act.

Two maintenance treatments of the Town's sewers have been completed during the year.

The bait was deposited on the 'benching' of the manhole or, upon the metal baiting trays to the manhole walls. Each manhole being pre-baited upon alternate days, and on the third day, a proportionate amount of poison was added to the base bait and laid at all points.

In accordance with the instructions issued by the Ministry of Agriculture Fisheries and Food (Infestation Control Department), the base bait and poison used are alternated for sewer treatment, and the results proved the efficiency of this of this change in bait and poison.

The Operator does these duties part-time and he has other Council duties to perform but Rodent Control is given priority over his other work.

## 5. Surface Properties and Sewers

During the year the Council agreed to give Messrs Rentokil Ltd., a contract to cover the Rodent Control Work. This contract is to commence as from 1st January 1969, and initially is for a period of one year. It is hoped that as a result of this a superior service will be provided.

## 6. Sewage Disposal Works

Treatment of the Town's sewers for the destruction of rats were followed by inspection and test baiting at the Sewage Disposal Plant. Several minor infestations responded to treatments at intervals.

## 7. Refuse Disposal Tip

Periodical inspections were made at the refuse tip. During the year treatments for the destruction of rats were successfully completed. The tip was rather heavily infested, but as a result of treatment, the infestation was cleared. However, regular inspections were continued to be made and any infestation immediately treated.

## 8. Surface infestations

Every complaint of infestation by rats or mice was investigated, and surveys of the Town periodically carried out.

## CLEAN AIR ACT

Apparatus to determine the sulphur dioxide and pollution of the air was set up in January. Returns to Warren Springs Laboratory at Stevenage were made from February 1968. The results show that the air pollution of the Town is not great at any time and it is only when the wind is southerly or, south-easterly that any pollution occurs.
