SMALLPOX HOSPITALS

Arrangements have been made for Smallpox cases to be admitted to Penrhys Hospital and for Consultants to be called in to suspected cases.

On diagnosing a case the Consultant will be responsible for arranging for Penrhys Hospital to be ready and staffed to receive the patient. The patient will be removed by County Council under their Ambulance Scheme made under S.27 of the National Health Service Act, 1946.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES

1. WATER SUPPLIES

The water supplying the Town is obtained from three main sources - Llanwrtyd Wells, Howey and the Hengwa Springs. The main supply gravitates to a high pressure filter plant for screening before chlorination and storage in an underground reservoir. During 1966 the Radnor and North Breconshire Water Board was constituted and the function of the Builth Wells U.D.C as a water authority ceased.

Water Samples

Three samples of water were submitted for analysis and in each case the reports were satisfactory.

3. PUBLIC CLEANSING

Household refuse is collected once per week. Trade refuse is collected twice per week (three times during Royal Welsh Show week), and this frequency of service is considered adequate. The refuse is stored in bins and other containers which are placed on the kerb-side to await collection. The disposal of refuse is by tipping at the Caeau Farm. The cleansing of highways is carried out jointly by this Council and the County Council. A mechanical suction cleaner traverses the main streets thrice weekly while the secondary roads are swept once per week (by mechanical sweeper i.e. Tractor & Glutton.) Litter baskets are placed liberally through the main streets and public open spaces.
