REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1958.

To:-

Mr. Chairman and Councillors of Burry Port Urban District Council.

Introduction.

1958 was a year in which the statistics show a drop in the birthrate and an increase in the death rate. Deaths exceeded births by 43 during the year and both death and birth rates compare unfavourably to the national rates.

For the past 3 years live births exceed deaths in the area by 2.

The favourable infant mortality rate of 1957 has not been maintained, but owing to the small numbers involved too much stress should not be placed on this.

Of the deaths in area, 58.2% were caused by cardio-vascular conditions, 9.1% by 'Cancers' and 7.1% by respiratory diseases.

Of the infectious diseases, influenza was again troublesome during the first half of the year. A mild epidemic of measles also occurred. 7 Dysentery cases were notified. These, on investigation showed negative laboratory findings.

The Dyfatty Stream from the rear of Bethany Chapel to the Culvert under the main railway line is cleaned regularly, and the Council still have under consideration the piping in of this stream from Bethany Chapel to the main railway line, which would save the cost of annual cleansing. The majority of this work will be done in conjunction with the Council houses to be built at Dyfatty, and it is estimated that the work will be completed by December, 1959.
