FOOD POISONING

Salmonella liverpool. Observation and investigation continued of an elderly female who remained positive for Salmonella liverpool to the end of 1965 from a family outbreak which occurred late in that year, a summary of which appeared in my report for 1965,

By May, 1966 three successive negative results were obtained from the examination of stools of the patient.

Salmonella typhi mirium. Two mals numbers of a family of four were reported on July 1st, 1906 as having been contacts of Salmonella typhimurium cases. These had both attended a social function on June, 24th outside the authority's area.

Information indicated that a cooked meal had been provided and that turkey appeared to be the likely source of the infection.

Investigation of the two local contacts established that one had partaken of the meal including turkey and the other did not eat any of the turkey.

Both had not shown any symptoms of the infection.

Laboratory examinations resulted in Salmonella typhimurium being isolated only from the stool of the one contact who had eaten turkey.

A report of the findings was sent to the patient's Doctor who arranged treatment.

Further stools were submitted for examination from time to time and by the end of the year three successive negative results had been obtained.

Experience in Wales and elsewhere continues to show the value of maintaining a high level of immunisation in the population against certain diseases. In particular those against diphtheria, whooping cough, poliomyelitis and tetanus. Vaccination against smallpox infection has also proved invaluable. It must be emphasised that where these diseases have been absent for many years, the prevention of a possibly serious epidemic depends on the percentage of susceptible persons in the population who have been immunised or vaccinated against these diseases.

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NATIONAL BLOOD TRANSFUSION SERVICE

Two Sessions were held, for general public blood donors, at the Memorial Hall during the year. A total of 91 donations were received.

Regular sessions for the general public are held at the neighbouring town of Llanelli. Most people can donate blood to the 'Blood Bank' and the amount of blood taken is quickly restored from the body's reserve which is replaced in a matter of days. With the everlasting and ever increasing need for blood, I appeal that, in future, more people will denate blood for this most worthy and needy cause.

No action was deemed necessary under this section during the year, for the removal, to suitable premises, of persons in need of care and attention. That the power is available is often sufficient to persuade such persons to agree to be moved.

MENCAL HEALTH SERVICE

The County Council provides the service for the care and after care of people suffering from mental illness or subnormality and whole time mental welfare officers are employed for this work.

The District Velfare Officer is Mr. D. David, Glen View, Gwendraeth Town, Kidwelly who is a duly authorised officer to take initial proceedings under the Health acts for the provision of care and treatment of mentally ill persons in the area.

OFFENSIVE TRADES:- There is one Gut Scraper in the area at which 5 inspections were made during the year.

Prior to the setting up of the Llamelli & District Water Board, on 1st October, 1962 the Urban Area purchased its requirements of water from neighbouring authorities' supplies. These supplies now come under the jurisdiction of the Water Board the constituent authorities being Llamelli Borough, Llamelli Rural District, Burry Port Urban District and Kidwelly Borough Councils.
