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



IMMUNISATION

Experience in Wales and elsewhere continues to show the value of maintaining a high level of immunisation in the population against certain diseases. In particular those against diphtheria, whooping cough, poliomyelitis and tetanus. Vaccination against smallpox infection has also proved invaluable. It must be emphasised that, where these diseases have been absent for many years, the prevention of a possibly serious epidemic depends on the percentage of susceptible persons in the population who have been immunised or **v**aocinated against these diseases.



In addition to the facilities of the Mass Hadiography Service, members of the general public who wish to avail themselves of the opportunity of a Chest X-Ray may do so at Singleton Hospital, Swansea or West Wales General Hospital, Glangwili, Carmarthen.

National Blood Transfusion Service

A Session was held at the Memorial Hall in July when 47 persons attended, 38 gave donations of which 1 was a new donor.

Following the poor response it was decided that the next session for the general population be incorporated with the next session at the Carmarthen Bay Power Station and hold entirely at the Station.

This second session, in December, showed a marked improvement from the previous occasion. 104 attended and 95 gave donations, which included 11 new donors, 63 were Power Station employees and 32 were general population donors.

Regular sessions for the general public are held at Ilanelli. Most people can donate blood to the 'Blood Bank' and the amount of blood taken is quickly restored from the body's reserve which is replaced in a matter of days. With the everlasting and ever increasing need for blood, I appeal that in future, more people will donate blood for this most worthy and needy cause.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948 - Section 47 (As amended 1951)

No action was deemed necessary under this section during the year, for the removal, to suitable premises, of persons in need of care and attention. That the power is available is often sufficient to persuade such persons to agree to be moved.

NATIONAL SOCIETY FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO CHILDREN

Close collaboration is maintained by the Local N.S.P.C.C. Inspector and mutual action to mitigate distress is taken when necessary. The local Chief Inspector is Mr. D.R. Lewis who resides at 44 Glenalla Road, Llanelli (Tel.Llanelli 5612)

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE


The County Council provides the service for the care and after care of people suffering from montal illness or subnormality and whole-time mental welfare officers are employed for this work.

The district delfare Officer is Mr. D.A. David, Glen View, Gwendraeth Town, Kidwelly who is a duly authorised officer to take initial proceedings under the Mental Health acts for the provision of care and treatment of mentally ill persons in the area.

MENTAL SUBNORICLS

The Carmarthenshire County Council is responsible for the ascertainment, supervision and general welfare of mental defectives. Supervisory home visits are made by a Social Worker and a Home Teacher is also employed for the home teaching of mental defectives.

There is a Junic? Training Centre for mentally handicapped children at Heol Goffa, Llanelli with teaching facilities for 75 children and residential accommodation for 12 children. Under agreement with the Velsh Regional Board facilities are made available for use of short-term care cases during holidays whenever possible or during illness of the guardians.

This is situated at Llanelli and is used under a scheme operated in conjunction with Llahelli Borough, Llanelli Rural District and Kidgwlly Borough Councils

Water Supply: Prior to the setting up of the Llanelli & District Water Board, on 1st October, 1962 the Urban . rea purchased its requirements of water from neighbouring Authorities' supplies. These supplied now come under the jurisdiction of the Water Board the constituent ... uthorities being Llanelli Borough, Llanelli Rural District, Burry Port Urban District and Kidwelly Borough Councils.

The provision of a water main to the Sandfield Road housing site was completed during 1968 by the Water Board.

The Board had no schemes under construction in the area at 31st December, 1968. . . lso, no schemes were awaiting approval of the Welsh Board of Health and none were under consideration by the Water Board at the end of 1968.

Samples for bacteriological examination and chemical analysis are taken by the Board and have proved satisfactory. The water is generally satisfactory in quality and quantity and is not plumbo-solvent.

Samples submitted for bacteriological examination in addition to those taken by the Board were satisfactory.

MILK - THE MILK (SPECIAL DESIGNATION) REGULATIONS, 1963 AND ADENDMENT REGULATIONS, 1965 MILK AND DAIRIES (GENERAL) REGULATIONS, 1959

Samples of Pasteurised Milk were taken for Bacteriological Examination at the Fublic Health Laboratory, Carmarthen. The samples satisfied the prescribed tests. No Untreated milk is produced for retail sale in the Urban area and no samples were obtained.

ICE CREAM - THE ICE CREAM (HEAT TREATMENT, ETC.) RECULATIONS, 1959

Four samples of Ice Cream were taken and upon examination were found to be in the Provisional Grade 1.

ADULTERATION OF FOOD - No action was necessary under the Food & Drugs Act, 1955

SHELL-FISH A fairly large Shell-fish processing factory operates within the area. This is regularly inspected and samples of the products have always proved to be satisfactory. There are no connercial shell-fish beds in the district, the shell-fish being imported.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES :- There are no active Slaughterhouses in the area at the present time.

OFFENSIVE TRADES: There is one Gut Scraper Factory in the area at which 9 general inspections were made during the year.

DRAINAGE & SANITATION: - The whole of the Urban Area is severed to a treatment plant which provides sedimentation with re-circulation, drying beds and effluent discharge into the Burry river estuary.

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REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

A once weekly collection is in operation in the District for which a Commer Refuse lorry, with a covered top, is used. Refuse receptacles are provided by householders and business people themselves. The refuse is disposed of by controlled tipping in a natural depression in land near the foreshore at the Old Harbour.

British Standard galvanised refuse bins are purchased and stocked by the Council for sale to residents.

RODENT CONTROL - PREVENTION OF DALAGE BY PESTS CT, 1949

A Rodent Operator is employed to carry out redent control work. A free service is given in respect of private premises and a charge is made for treatments at business and industrial premises.

In addition to dealing with notifications, of infestations, routine inspections and treatments are made at the Council's tip and other lands. The sowers are treated twice annually.

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CARAVAN SITES

There are 4 Licensed Sites within the Urban area. Three are residential sites (9, 7 and 4 Caravans) and 1 Holiday site (58 Caravans).

SCHOOLS

The schools were kept in a sanitary condition. All schools and school kitchens are connected to the main sever. The schools in the area are:- Secondary Modern School, two Primary and two Infants' Schools and a Welsh (Infants' and Primary) School - Ysgol Pare Y Tywyn - at temporary premises at the Memorial Hall and Zion Chapel Vestry. In Webruary a Nursery School was started on 3 monrings per week by volunteer parents for children between 3 years and Infant school age. The Army Cadet Force Headquarters, Stepnoy Road is used for the purpose.

Periodic inspections are carried out at the Schools and their Kitchens. The County Medical Officer of Health is motified of any defects requiring attention.

RAG FLOCK AND OTHER FILLING MATERIALS ACT, 1951 & R CULATIONS, 1961

There are no Rag Flock premises in the area.

SWIMMING BATHS AND FOOLS. There are no such pools in the area. During the summer months see bathing is enjoyed by a large number of inhabitants and visitors to the town. Also an indeor swimming pool is available at Llanelli.

NOISE ABATEMENT CT, 1960

No formal action was necessary under this Act during the year. The Council is a member of the Noise Abatement Society.

HOME SAFETY

The Council was represented at the Inaugural Conference on Hone Safety at Aberystwyth in September. At this Conference a Cales Hone Safety Council was formed.

A Local Home Safety Committee was set up as a sub-Committee of the Health Committee to deal with all aspects of Home Safety in conjunction with the Wales Home Safety Council and the Royal Soceity for the Prevention of Accidents.
