Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit to you my annual report for the year ending December 31st. 1939. and none found necessary, the conditions being fairly well, excepting in three cases. Two vessels from foreign parts arrived with timber. None of these had a history of disease occurring during the voyage, and the crew were in good health on arrival. No serious defects were found and the quarters clean on the whole. Examinations and inquiries were made in each case to ascertain the existence of rats, but no occasion for treatment was found necessary.

FOOD.

No meat or foreign food was imported. The oyster beds on the Anglesey side were discontinued and the bed remains suitable for further use should occasion arise. They are very suitable for this purpose being free from the danger of pollution. Irish potatoes were imported on four occasions during the year.

All this trade is now carried on between Liverpool, London and Ellesmere Port.

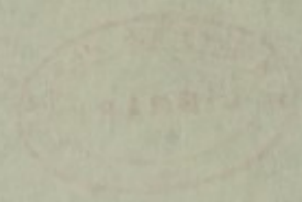
