Summary of Inspections.

To the Port Sanitary Authority,
CAERNARVON.



Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit to you my annual report
for the year ended 31st. December, 1942.

No vessels arrived from foreign ports, the trade being
mainly coastwise and reshipments from other ports in Great
Britain, such as food stuff for the Government Buffer Depot
in the town, and petroleum spirits, oils etc., to depots.

Nuisances. These were investigated and dealt with as occasions
arose.

Infectious Diseases. One case of Diphtheria was notified, and
the patient removed to Isolation Hospital, every precaution was taken to deal with
the contacts, and there were no further
infection on this particular vessel.

Food. The oyster beds over in Anglesey which is within the
jurisdiction of the authority, has not been used for
some years, but there is a possibility of these being
used again.

Enclosed is an account of the work of the Sanitary
Inspector.

I herewith enclose particulars of vessels inspected for the year ended December, 1942.

The crew quarters of one ship was fumigated at the request of the Captain, this was due to a case of suspected Tuberculosis in one of the crew. The quarters of a government Patrol Boat was also fumigated at Portdinorwic, following the removal of a case of Diphtheria among one of the members of the crew.

No statutory notices were issued as none was found necessary, the quarters being generally clean.

Nuisances were dealt with on four separate occasions, the cause being dead animals on the foreshore, these were immediately removed and disposed of.
