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
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

To the Chairman and Members of the Caerphilly Urban District Council.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

In accordance with the instructions of the Ministry of Health, I herewith beg to submit my Annual Report for the year 1948.

As judged by the vital statistics, the health of the community is generally as good as can possibly be expected.

The number of notifiable diseases, excluding whooping cough and measles, was 215, whilst the latter accounted for 282 notified. The notifications of tuber-culosis of all kinds numbered 83 for this year, with 15 deaths from pulmonary tuberculosis. The birth rate remained consistently high at 22.7 per thousand population, and the death rate also low at 12.4 per thousand population. As will be seen from the table later on in this report, this compares with a birth rate of 19.3, and death rate of 11.9 for all urban districts in the country.

Diphtheria immunisation has continued to be carried out with all the pressure it is possible to bear, and at the 30th June, 1948, the number of children who had completed a full course of immunisation was 336 between the ages of one to five years, and 1 between the years of five and fourteen, giving a total of 337. This means that practically 90% of the child population has been protected against diphtheria. The number of cases notified, and proved to be so, from bacteriological examination of the throat swab, was 1.

This Annual Report for 1948 records a historic occasion, an occasion which it is hoped will open an era of greater health and thus greater happiness for all British people. The National Health Service Act, 1946, was implemented on the 5th July, 1948, and from that date, all duties of social and health service were removed to the Glamorgan County Council and the Regional Hospital Board. The duties are now carried out by the delegation of powers from the Glamorgan County Council to Divisional Committees, and it is apparent that these Committees are endeavouring to maintain or raise the standard of social service demanded by this Authority for so many years.

I cannot close these preliminary notes without expressing regret that the infantile mortality rate for the year should again be over 60. It shows an improvement over the figure of 69 for 1947, but is very far from satisfactory when it is remembered that the infantile mortality rate for the administrative County shows 41 and for England and Wales as a whole, 34. However, it is a great pleasure to record that no mother's life was lost in childbirth during 1948. This must relieve the sombre picture of the infantile mortality rate.

GENERAL HEALTH SERVICES.

LABORATORY FACILITIES.

Laboratory facilities are available at the City and County Laboratories, Cardiff, the Pathological Department, Cardiff Royal Infirmary, and the Blood Transfusion Laboratories at Newport Road, Cardiff. All examinations of throat swabs, faecal and urine specimens, cerebro-spinal fluid, were carried out at the City and County Laboratory. In addition, 24 water samples were submitted for bacteriological and chemical analysis, 30 ice-cream samples, together with samples from the Nelson Sewerage Works effluent. Of the milk samples, 26 were submitted for general examination, and 24 samples for the presence of tubercle bacilli and in one case tubercle bacilli was found during the year.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

Under the National Health Service Act, 1946, the ambulance service became part of the General Health Services and is now administered by the Glamorgan County Council. The Austin ambulance belonging to this Authority was taken over by the Glamorgan County Council.

As far as the transport arrangements for patients to and from Energlyn Hospital are concerned, apart from early "teething" difficulties the service has been most efficient.

NURSING IN THE HOME.

Arrangements as described in previous reports held up to 5th July, 1948, but all home nursing has now become the responsibility of the National Health Service Act, 1946.

DOMESTIC AND HOME HELP SCHEME.

Until 5th July, 1948, the Council operated a comprehensive scheme of domestic and home helps, employing a supervisor and sixteen of these helps in a full-time capacity. They were supplied to many cases and rendered great service in homes where difficulties from every angle were making for sub standard domestic arrangements.

WATER SUPPLY.

The water supply for the Rhymney Valley portion of the area, the Aber Valley and Nelson, is supplied by the Rhymney Valley Water Board, which is a constituent authority of the Taff Fechan. The Taffs Well Ward is supplied by the Pontypridd Joint Water Board.

The quality of the water is satisfactory over a large part of the area and is under bacteriological control.

The Rhymney Valley Water Board has completed arrangements for improving the quantity of supply in the Aber Valley and in the South Ward of Caerphilly, with the result that there are very rarely any complaints of a shortage of water.

The private supplies to Aberfawr Terrace, Abertridwr, and the houses of the National Coal Board at Senghenydd, have been condemned, and will be connected to the public mains as soon as the Rhymney Valley Water Board are in a position to lay these mains.

There are no plumbo-solvent waters in the area.

The supply of water to rural areas has caused considerable concern from time to time and during the year 1948 a start was made in assessing the needs of the high, sparsely populated wild part of your area, known broadly as Caerphilly Mountain. Samples were taken from seventeen sources for bacteriological examination, showing 12 of them to be satisfactory, four unsatisfactory and one suspicious. The unsatisfactory samples were sent for second examination and two cases proved to be satisfactory. I append herewith the results of the bacteriological examination.

Whilst it is true that the actual pollution found is small, the potential pollution is great and some form of supply from the Rhymney Valley Water Board is strongly indicated.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

The Rivers and Streams still remain polluted owing to the activities of colliery washeries.

ICE CREAM.

Your Sanitary Inspectors have given much time to the urgent question of ice cream production so that healthy products may be sold to the public. The Ice Cream (Heat Treatment, etc.) Regulations, 1947, were partly implemented in May 1948, but with the greatest attention to cooling, pasteurisation and general production the following were the results of the 30 samples submitted for examination:—

so that half the samples submitted were really not fit products to be sold to the public. A register is kept of producers and manufacturers and there are 46 of the former and 19 of the latter in the area, two of which are wholesale manufacturers.

The general position is still unsatisfactory. Producers of ice cream having followed the instructions of your Inspectors sincerely are extremely disappointed to obtain analyses which virtually again condemns their product. The standard of products is judged by a method which does not produce anything approximating determinate results and the terms used, "unsatisfactory," "satisfactory," etc., are, in my opinion, too loose and based upon a test of too wide a scope.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

A problem of some years standing was dealt with during the year when it was decided to connect properties extending from Pontygwindy Inn to Pwllypant to the main sewer. A loan was obtained for this purpose and it is hoped the work will be undertaken very early in the coming year.

The Rhymney Valley Sewerage Board and the Pontypridd and Rhondda Sewerage Board provide means for collection and disposal of sewage, except at Nelson, where it is dealt with by the Council Sewage Works.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

MATERNITY SERVICES.

The following is a short report on the work done to the 5th July, 1948:—

The attached Table shows the most recent list of Clinics, together with the appropriate time-table. The work at the Ante-Natal Clinics has again been most impressive. 666 expectant mothers attended these Clinics, thus there are very few pregnancies in this area who have not had pre-natal attendance at your Clinics, whilst most of the remainder received attention from their family doctor. The total number of examinations conducted up to 5th July was 1998 Ante-natal cases and 98 Post-natal cases.

In addition to the provisions of the Ministry of Food, many forms of additional nourishment were provided for expectant mothers all at cost price, when the income fell below the Council scale.

A Specialist Consultant Service was provided, in addition to Dr. Garfield Evans, and cases were referred to Professor Strachan and Mr. Arwyn Evans. Cases showing any abnormality, difficulty or bad obstetrical history were sent into Cardiff Royal Infirmary Maternity Department, or the Maternity Wards of the Llwynypia Hospital.

The number of patients admitted to Cardiff Royal Infirmary Maternity Department were 25, and Llwynypia Hospital, 26.

The Glamorgan County Council opened a Nursing Home in conjunction with Llwynypia Hospital, at Glyncornel, and 19 cases of bad home conditions, poor nursing facilities or shortage of help, were treated at Glyncornel and 18 at Gwaunfarren Maternity Home, Merthyr.

The Maternal Mortality rate for 1948 is nil.

Dental services were provided for expectant and nursing mothers through the private dental practitioners of this area.

The County Council, through lack of staff, are unable to carry on this work, and arrangements have been made with the Dental Practitioners to provide dentures at National Health Insurance rates to all expectant and nursing mothers referred to them by the Council. This is more costly than the County Council Scheme, but, nevertheless, shows a considerable saving to the mother and the Council on what she would have to pay if treated as a private patient.

Complete sets of artificial dentures are provided at approximately £8. 8s. 0d. per set, with a diminishing scale varying with the size of partial dentures.

The activities of the Ministry of Food has relieved the Council to a considerable degree in the provisions of additional nourishment both for expectant mothers, nursing mothers and children under 5 years of age.

The cost of free nourishment provided was negligible, but a considerable amount of free medicines were supplied at the clinics. These were of a simple type, but were much appreciated.

Dental, Orthopaedic, Ophthalmic, Ear, Nose and Throat treatment were all provided as in previous years.

The number of deaths of children under one year showed an increase over that of last year.

The Infant Mortality Rate for the year under review was 63 per thousand births.

Prematurity, again, is a prolific cause of death in the early weeks of life, and this wastage can apparently only be stemmed by the provision of a Baby Hospital.

GENERAL SANITATION.

CESSPITS AND CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

During the year cesspools were cleansed and disinfected at a cost of £28. 0s. 0d. The work was carried out by contract and was satisfactory. There has been no conversion from conservancy systems into water carriage systems.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

The scavenging of the area, with the exception of Taffs Well, Groes Wen and Cwmheldeg, was done by direct labour. This was the first year for Nelson and Ystrad Mynach to be done by direct labour, and it has proved to be very satisfactory.

SMOKE ABATEMENT.

The Council have become members of the National Smoke Abatement Society, a body doing excellent work in connection with atmospheric pollution. Fortunately, the problem in the Caerphilly area is largely confined to the Taffs Well Ward, and the people of this ward are joint sufferers with the inhabitants of the contiguous parts of the Pontypridd U.D.C. and the Llantwit Fardre R.D.C.

During 1948 some complaints were made of smoke nuisance at Messrs. Osband Bros., Clothing Factory, Pontygwindy Road, Caerphilly. Your Inspectors investigated this matter and found that first class, latest type of furnaces and boilers had been installed; stoking was carried out in an efficient manner and the only reason for the nuisance was the very poor quality coal supplied to the Factory. As in previous reports, this is the cause of the nuisance at the Treforest Power Station and the Managers of both these premises have been candid and have tried to abate the nuisance by all the means in their power short of stopping the Factories.

During the year a case of anthrax occurred and was not notified. The case in question, was a young girl employed by Messrs. Shermans Pools at Cardiff, and work in connection with the Cardiff City Public Health Department failed to establish the source of infection.

Considerable public concern was felt by the diagnosis of a case of typhoid fever in Van Road, Caerphilly. This case was admitted to Energlyn Isolation Hospital and proved to be a case of dysentery of the salmonella type (Stanley).

Dr. Godbey, Tuberculosis Physician for the Rhymney Valley, submitted the following Report:—

Tuberculosis in 1948.

Attendances at the Caerphilly Chest Clinic are increasing steadily, and during the year reached the record number of 6776. The incidence of pulmonary tuberculosis has unfortunately shown a tendency to increase; but a greater proportion are being discovered in the early stages, when the prospects of successful treatment are more hopeful. This is due to mass radiography and the fact that more people are seeking medical advice as soon as they feel out of sorts.

The waiting lists for hospital and sanatorium treatment are long. This is due to the shortage of nurses. Treatment cannot always be carried out in the patient's home, because of overcrowding or other circumstances. Re-housing of tuberculosis families in such cases is an important public health measure, which has been assisted by the points system which gives preference to such families.

Energlyn Hospital. Both wards have been fully occupied during the year. Treatment is still based on rest of body and mind. To assist this, air is sometimes introduced into the chest or abdomen, in the treatment known as artificial pneumothorax, and pneumoperitoneum. These treatments were started in 20 cases, and air refills were given 325 times.

Crushing of the phrenic nerve has been done when necessary by Mr. Dillwyn Thomas or Mr. J. D. Wade.

Consultations with Mr. Dillwyn Thomas are held when necessary, and patients needing other forms of surgical treatment are transferred to surgical units.

The Council have also a scheme in hand for the erection in the various Wards of a number of Old Age Pensioners' houses and several sites have been scheduled for the purpose.

SLUM PROPERTIES.

In addition to providing for the needs of those without homes of their own, the Council have also had to provide alternative accommodation for a large number of families who were living in dilapidated properties in Nantgarw, Taffs Well, Nelson and Senghenydd.

Therefore, it can be stated to their credit, that the Caerphilly Urban District Council are facing up to their responsibilities in their housing problem.
