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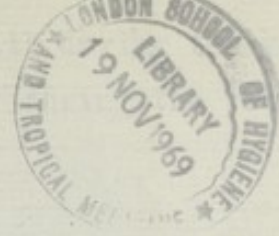

To the Chairman and Members of the Cardiff Port Sanitary Authority.

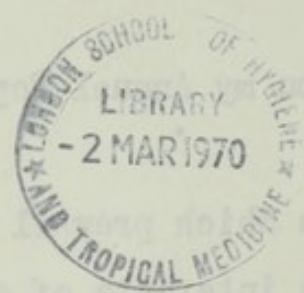

CHOLERA, YELLOW FEVER & PLAGUE : - - -

During the year 1917, only one vessel entered the port directly from an infected port and it was dealt with under the Cholera, Yellow Fever & Plague Regulations. 309 rats were caught and destroyed on board.

Your Committee are aware of the systematic destruction of rats which is carried out in your Port Sanitary District.

During the year the rat-catchers were engaged on board 65 vessels and the total number of rats caught and subsequently destroyed amounted to 16,499.

Seventy-nine rats were submitted for bacteriological examination to the Cardiff & County Public Health Laboratory, with a view to detecting Plague infection and in each case a negative result was obtained.

PREVENTION & TREATMENT OF VENEREAL DISEASE: - - -

Regulations relating to the above were made by the Local Government Board on the 12th July, 1916, enabling the Local Authority to make arrangements with the managers of hospitals approved by the Board for the treatment of Venereal Disease.

A further circular letter was issued with respect to the treatment of sailors coming within the jurisdiction of Port Sanitary Authorities.

In accordance with a scheme submitted to the Board by the Local Authority, arrangements have been made with the Managers of the Royal Naval Asylum Seamen's Hospital for the treatment of Venereal Disease amongst sailors as an out-patient clinic and as in-patients.

The actual date of the commencement of this work at the hospital was the 16th April, 1917.

VENTILATION & TREATMENT OF VENEREAL DISEASES: - - -

Regulations relating to the above were made by the Local Government on the 12th July, 1916, enabling the local authority to take steps in accordance with a scheme submitted to the Board by the Managers of the Hospital for the treatment of Venereal Diseases.

A further circular letter was issued with respect to the treatment of venereal diseases within the jurisdiction of the Port Sanitary Authority in accordance with a scheme submitted to the Board by the Local Authority. Arrangements have been made with the Managers of the Hospital for the treatment of Venereal Diseases to run as an out-patient clinic and as in-patients.

The actual date of the commencement of this work at the hospital was the 16th April, 1917.

During the year ended Dec 31st, 1917, 69 cases of Scabies amongst seamen were treated at the Corporation cleansing and disinfecting station.

INSPECTION OF SHIPPING : - - -

During the year, six thousand five hundred and ninety vessels were inspected on arrival. Two thousand eight hundred and thirty extra inspections were made of work in hand and ships in dock, making a total of nine thousand four hundred and twenty-six inspections. One hundred and one written notices were served on masters of vessels; six hundred and eleven verbal orders were given; fourteen letters were sent to owners or their representatives at various ports in this country in connection with nuisances and sanitary defects on board ships.

Thirty-one notices were also served on masters of vessels having polluted water on board for drinking and domestic purposes, being the result of bacteriological examination and analysis at the Cardiff and County Public Health Laboratory. One hundred and sixty samples of drinking water from vessels entering, also from H.M. Transports taking water at this port, were submitted to the Bacteriologist at the Cardiff & County Public Health Laboratory for examination. One hundred and twenty-eight were found to be of good quality and thirty-two contaminated. All tanks containing contaminated water were emptied and cleansed and a fresh supply taken on board.
