OVERCROWDING.

4 cases of overcrowding were noted during routine housing inspections and 2 families were rehoused.

BUILDING BYELAWS AND FLANNING.

During the year 97 plans for buildings and alterations were approved, 8 of which were subject to temporary licences.

CONTROL OF CIVIL BUILDING.

During the year a total of 13 Building Licences were issued to the value of £6,942. Of the above, 2 licences to the value of £2,134 were in respect of new dwellings. The remaining 11 licences amounting to the sum of £4,808, were in respect of repairs and extensions and £1,728 of this total was used for the restoration of a building after damage due to fire.

WATER SUPFLY.

The parishes of Portskewett, Rogiet most of Caldicot and a few premises in Mathern parish are supplied with water purchased in bulk from Chepstow Water Company. Quality and quantity have been satisfactory during the year.

The Parish of Undy is supplied by water purchased in bulk from Magor and St. Mellons R.D.C., the source of supply being Newport Corporation's gathering grounds at Wentwood. Quantity and quality have been satisfactory during the year.

Highmoor Hill, in the Parish of Caldicot, is supplied with water purchased in bulk from Newport Corporation. Quantity and quality have been satisfactory during the year.

Parts of the Parishes of Mathern and Caerwent are supplied by Monmouthshire County Council with water purchased from Chepstow Water Company. Quality has been satisfactory, but pressure has been poor on some sections of mains in Caerwent Parish.

Devauden Farish is supplied by a scheme employing hydraulic rams. In the past the spring has been insufficiently protected from contamination and the quality of the supply has varied, being at times below a satisfactory standard as laid down by the ministry of Health. Approval of proposals to protect the spring and provide additional pumping and storage capacity has been awaited for some time. Protective measures to the spring were regarded as being too urgent to admit of delay and consequently these were carried out during the summer, although no formal approval to the Council's proposals has yet becreeived. The result has been reported as being bactericlogically highly satisfactory.

There is ample water at the source, but pumping and storage capacity is insufficient to meet growing demands in drought periods consequently at such times it has been difficult to maintain a satisfactory supply.

St. Arvans village is supplied by a small water scheme; of 6 samples taken during the year 2 were bacteriologically below the standard laid down by the Ministry of Health. Quantity has been satisfactory during the year. The supply is slightly plumbo-solvent, therefore iron or copper pipes are used for this scheme.

The remainder of the district is served by small private schemes wells and springs. Quality and quantity of water from some of these sources has been unsatisfactory and the provision of adequate piped supplies is the only satisfactory solution.

SEWERAGE.

No new works of sewerage or sewage disposal have been commenced during the year. Schemes for Rogiet, Caldicot and Fortskewett are needed as soon as possible owing to anticipated building development in the Severn Tunnel Area.

The problem in Caldicot is particularly urgent as the present pumping equipment is totally inadequate for dealing with the flow during storm periods.

FOOD.

No slaughtering of animals has been carried out during the year, carcass meat coming from Newport abattoir, where inspection is carried out at time of slaughter. Routine inspections are made at Caldicot distribution centre. 16 lbs of decomposed imported beef was condemned after inspection.

HOUSING.

The speedy erection of new houses and repair of many existing ones is necessary, for the housing problem is still acute.
