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To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of Denbigh Borough Council,
Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

It is a privilege to submit the final report on the health of Denbigh Borough for the year 1973.

The statistics have been prepared from records maintained by the Health Department and although they are not strictly accurate, they are sufficiently so, to be able to affirm that the general standard of health has been satisfactorily maintained during the past year. Previously, it was customary to await the Registrar General's returns which had taken into account the transfer in and out of deaths, births, infant and maternal mortality but this would have meant waiting until after the dissolution of the Authority. We, your officers, felt that it was desirable to make every effort to include the last chapter on health before finally closing the record book. It is gratifying that the statistics for the final year are satisfactory and that there has been no sudden or serious deterioration in health standards but rather that a steady progress has been maintained.

Towards the end of 1973, Mr. Aldrich was already engaged in planning the environmental health services for Glyndwr. Undoubtedly, he will serve the new authority with that dedication and sincerity which has characterised his service to Denbigh.

Dr. Lyn Williams and I wish to express our appreciation to all the Borough staff for their unstinting support and constant courtesy. We also wish to thank the Chairman and members of the Health Committee for their keen interest in all matters affecting the health of the people of the town. Undoubtedly, their constant stimulus and perseverance have ensured that the standards of service has been maintained at a high level which it is hoped will influence and guide the new authorities.

The most important cause of death was Ischaemic Heart Disease which accounted for 28 deaths. Malignant Disease caused a total of 18 deaths with cancer of the lung the most common (6 deaths) closely followed by cancer of the stomach (4 deaths).

Two deaths occurred in infants under one year of age, one due to acute respiratory infection and one in the early neonatal period due to cerebral haemorrhage. There was one death in the 1/4 year age group associated with congenital disease. There were only 7 deaths in the age groups 5/44 years of which 5 were the result of injury or violence. 80% of all deaths occurred in persons aged 65 years and over.

INFANT DEATHS

There were 2 infant deaths during the year, compared with none in 1972, giving an infant mortality rate of 15 compared with nil for 1972 and 15 for 1971.

The total number of cases of infectious diseases was 81 compared with 76 in 1972. An outbreak of measles occurred in the summer months with 71 cases of measles compared with 12 in 1972.

BRUCELLOSIS

There was no human cases of brucellosis during the year, compared with 1 human case in 1972. The County Public Health Inspector takes regular samples of milk from all producer/retailers of milk and during 1973 evidence of infection was found in 6 cows in 2 separate herds. Until this disease is completely eradicated from cattle all whose work brings them into contact with cows or drink milk from infected animals are at risk of contracting this disease. Many human cases probably occur without being diagnosed because of the insidious chronic and indefinite nature of the disease, in man. Pasteurisation of milk is an effective method of killing the brucella organism and other organisms such as Salmonellae which cause diseases in man and cattle.

ANTHRAX

No cases of this disease in animals or man was notified during the year, as in 1972.

LABORATORY SERVICE

The Public Health Laboratory at Conwy carries out bacteriological examination of water, food, etc., to detect any contamination. Milk is also examined bacteriologically and biologically for the presence of tubercule bacilli and brucella abortus.

Examination of throat swabs, blood faeces, etc., are carried out to detect the presence of bacteria and viruses at Conwy Public Health Laboratory and specimens have also been accepted at Rhyl Hospital Laboratory.

DENTAL CLINIC

The Mobile Dental Clinic visited the majority of the schools in the area during the year.

SCHOOL HEALTH ATTENDANT

The School Health Attendant visited the schools in the area for the purpose of routine testing of children's vision and hearing. Children who were found to have defective hearing and/or vision were followed up and referred to a consultant for further examination where necessary. Colour vision tests are given to all boys at the age of 10 years.

The commonest defects amongst school children are those of vision and hearing. These are often symptomless and if uncorrected frequently impair the child's educational progress. The work of the School Health Attendants in screening children for these defects, is extremely important.

SPEECH THERAPY CLINIC

This clinic is held at the Clinic, Middle Lane, by appointment on Thursdays. The children are referred from School Teachers, Health Visitors, General Practitioners and through Medical Officers.

The Speech Therapist, who is Welsh speaking, also visits the schools to discuss cases with the teachers and gives advice on how to handle speech defects amongst the children.

CHIROPODY CLINIC

This clinic is held at the Clinic, Middle Lane, Denbigh, on Monday and Thursday by appointment. Patients are referred to this clinic by General Practitioners, Health Visitors and District Nurses. The Denbigh Family Planning Clinic commenced on the first Tuesday in June, 1973. There is one session per month, held at the Clinic, Middle Lane, Denbigh between 2.00 - 3.00 p.m. 16 females availed themselves of the service when the clinic first commenced.

The Ruthin Family Planning Clinic now holds only one session per month on the 4th Thursday evening from 7.00 to 8.30 p.m.

There were 40 new patients during 1973, of these, 21 were referred to the clinic by friends, 10 by the Family Doctor, 6 F.P.A. transfers 2 were officially referred, and 1 from other sources.

11 patients were within the age group 25/29, 10 within 20/24 years, 9 within 30/34 years, 5 were over 35 years and 5 were under 20 years.

17 patients had had 2 pregnancies, 16 had had no pregnancies, 5 had 1 pregnancy, 1 had had 4 pregnancies and 1 had had 3 pregnancies.

REFUSE COLLECTION

A weekly collection is made throughout the area, all domestic properties are provided with paper sacks, whilst business premises use bins or sacks whichever is appropriate. 3,400 and 500 bins are collected each week.

Large families and families with central heating are issued with two sacks on request, whilst the general public are able to purchase extra sacks from the Health Department at Whitehall. Provided the quantity is reasonable all refuse including garden refuse is removed.

A free collection of refuse is made from business premises once per week of three bins and any flattened cardboard boxes. Any additional collections are charged for.

The Dennis Paxit IIIC and the Musketeer were tested by the Ministry of Transport at Wrexham and were granted a certificate of roadworthiness.

REFUSE DISPOSAL

All the refuse from the area is deposited at one tip at Meifod, Henllan. A full-time attendant is employed to regulate the Tip.

General refuse and old motor vehicles from the Borough are accepted free of charge at Meifod Tip during working hours.

SALVAGE

Waste paper is sorted and baled at the Old Butter Market, Factory Place. The depot is near the town centre and waste paper and cardboard can be brought to the depot for disposal at any time during normal working hours.

The bonus scheme paid out £215 to the refuse collection staff in the year ending 31st March, 1973.

Householders who find difficulty in making the refuse sack last the week would ease their problem if all the cardboard, newspaper, and clean waste paper were to be kept separately for collection.

Animals are slaughtered daily including Saturday and Sunday from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. The inspection of the meat takes up a large part of the Department's time and an inspector has to be on duty every weekend to inspect the animals slaughtered. This involved 102 hours of duty outside normal working hours.

All the Slaughterhouses are subject to regular detailed inspections regarding food hygiene and all three were generally satisfactory.

Many of the carcasses rejected as unfit for human consumption were brought to the slaughterhouses as casualties, all the persons involved have been warned of the risks of accepting this type of animal.

NORTH WALES HOSPITAL SUPPLY

22 rural properties in the West of the Borough are supplied with untreated water from the North Wales Hospital Main. These properties have a piped supply of this water which is drawn from Llyn Bran and which is liable to contamination. All the properties on the supply have been warned either to fit suitable water filters or to boil all water used.

In addition to the North Wales Hospital and property, 21 private properties received a piped supply of treated water from the Hospital Main.

LLEWENI ESTATE SUPPLY

Dwellings and farms on this estate have an adequate and satisfactory supply of piped water from a deep borehole.
