

PREFACE.

To the Chairman and Members of the Public Health, Housing and Public Assistance Committee.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

Annual Report, 1942.

I have the honour to present to you my Annual Report on the health of the County for the year 1942.

The report is very much attenuated, but contains the essential Vital Statistics, etc.

Birth Rate. A study of the Statistical Tables reveals that the birth-rate has been steadily declining for many years—though the average of 14.4 was fairly well maintained during the years 1933—1941. It is gratifying, therefore, to note that the birth-rate for 1942 shows an appreciable increase, the figure being 15.6 as compared with 14.4 in 1941 and an average of 14.4 for the previous 9 years.

Death Rate. Another fact, to which I draw attention with infinite pleasure, is that the death-rate for 1942 (11.4) is the lowest ever recorded in the County.

Infant Mortality Rate. Yet another record is to be referred to, and that is that the death-rate among children under 1 year of age (55.6) is the lowest ever registered in the County.

The staff remains unchanged, except for the appointment of Dr. M. Jones Roberts in June, 1942, whose duties chiefly concern evacuee mothers and children and school medical inspection. An additional temporary School Nurse was also appointed in July, 1942, and she has been engaged chiefly in the Western portion of the County dealing principally with evacuated children.

I wish to record my thanks to the County Public Health and Housing Committee, to the Clerk of the County Council, Mr. William Jones, C.B.E., and Mr. William Roberts, his Deputy, for much support and assistance. I appreciate also the devotion and loyalty of the County Health Staff at the central Health Department in Wrexham.

Staff.

There has been one addition to the medical staff, Dr. M. Jones Roberts being appointed on the 1st June, 1942, as Assistant Medical Officer. Her duties are chiefly

- (a) in connection with the Government Evacuation Scheme—supervision of Sick Bays and War-time Nurseries; and
- (b) School Medical Service.

Births.

2769 births were notified as occurring within the County area during the year, the birth-rate being 15.6 as compared with 14.4 in 1941 and a total births of 2617.

It is gratifying to note that the birth-rate is the highest recorded in the County since 1930, when the rate was 160. From 1933 to 1941 the rate averaged 144.

The Birth-rate in England and Wales was 15-8.

Deaths.

The number of deaths occurring in the County during 1942 was 2015, giving a death-rate of 11.4. These figures compare respectively with 2375 and 13.0 in 1941.

Not only is the death-rate in 1942 lower than that for England and Wales (11-6), but it is the lowest registered in the County since 1902, the year to which the earliest records in Denbighshire can be traced.

Infant Mortality.

The term "Infant Mortality" describes the deaths of young children before attaining their first birthday. In 1942, the number of such deaths was 154, or 55.6 as compared with 180 and 68.7 in 1941.

It is here again to be noted that the rate for 1942 was the lowest recorded in the County in 41 years—the rate in 1902 being 127.4.

The rate for England and Wales for 1942 was 49-0.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION.

Particular attention is being paid to the question of the

immunisation of children in the County.

Talks to the mothers are given, both at the Clinics and at School Medical Inspection, by the medical staff, while the Health Visitors and School Nurses follow up with further advice, when necessary, during their visits to the homes.

Posters have been prominently displayed throughout the County, and in this connection the several air-raid shelters

were singularly useful.

YEARLY REPORT ON THE WORK OF THE NORTH WALES SOCIETY FOR THE BLIND IN THE COUNTY OF DENBIGH FROM APRIL, 1942—MARCH, 1943.

This year the County of Denbigh has 414 Registered Blind Persons and 35 Evacuees under its care. Health in general is very good. Even though visits to blind persons have to be curtailed owing to petrol restrictions, the five Home Teachers still carry on to the best of their ability and see to the general needs of blind people in their area. Applications for Necessitous Grants and Medical Aid, etc., are still being sanctioned by the Society. The Teachers also teach the blind various handicraft and some are able to read Braille and Moon Embossed Type.

Several blind persons have been trained in Basketry, etc., at various Institutions, and there are approximately 12 Home Workers; 5 in Workshops; 5 Pastime Workers; 11 Learners and 2 Blind Persons training in Denbighshire. Owing to the present war conditions the difficulty of obtaining materials will curtail production but where possible alternative occupation is being found for workers.

Unemployable Blind grants are paid to 252 of the number of blind registered, plus 17 Evacuees. These are paid out fortnightly by the Society on behalf of the County Council.

Blind persons are issued with white sticks on application and free of charge.

Library books are sent out regularly every Friday to Blind readers, the postages are borne by this Society.

Through the kindness of the British "Wireless for the Blind" Fund, Battery and Electric Wireless Sets had been supplied again this year and installed in the homes of the blind people. A great many of the repairs to old sets are carried out by the Society and batteries and other wireless accessories are supplied on application at half cost, the Society bearing the other half. Due to the war there is a very long delay in the delivery of wireless accessories, but it is unavoidable.

Each registered blind person was presented with a 10/note as a Christmas gift to celebrate the Society's Diamond
Jubilee; this gift was very much appreciated. In addition,
the County Council kindly allowed a Christmas gift to all
those blind persons receiving Unemployable Blind grants.

East Denbighshire is still worked under the Agreement with the National Institute for the Blind as far as collections, flag days, etc., are concerned, but the welfare of the blind is carried out entirely by this Society. In the Wrexham area teas, social gatherings, rambles and singing classes were held and were thoroughly enjoyed by the blind.

The Crosville Motor Company once again kindly issued approximately 114 Bus Vouchers at 2/6 per annum. No more applications for new vouchers or transfers will be considered.

53 blind persons from Denbighshire spent a very enjoyable holiday at the "Llys Onnen" Home, Abergele, during the year 1942-43, and are looking forward to another holiday next year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF OBSTETRIC SERVICE.

(a) Clinics.

1813 new cases and 2758 re-examinations were seen at the various clinics.

(b) Ruabon Hospital.

217 cases were admitted and there were 188 births. There was one maternal death, admitted for haemorrhage due to retained placenta after delivery at home.

(c) Gerwyn Hall.

282 cases were admitted, of whom 86 were County and 196 evacuees. This makes a total of 681 since the Home was opened, 595 being evacuees. There has been no maternal death. All except two were ante-natally examined by me before admission and a special form of drug relief given in most cases. The results have been such that a report is being prepared later for publication in the current obstetric journal.

Instrumental delivery was only resorted to in ten of the cases and 9 Caesarean operations were found necessary. There were no notified cases of puerperal pyrexia. The still-birth rate (16 in all) was 23.5 per 1000, which compared most favourably with the County rate of 39.5 for the same period and with a rate of 59.9 10 years ago.

- (a) The advantages of hospital confinements.
- (b) The excellent results of non-interference in midwifery.

(e) Maternal Deaths.

Of the 7 deaths, 2 had attended the ante-natal clinics. One was admitted to hospital with haemorrhage after normal delivery at home, and died soon after admission. The other died at the Emergency Hospital following abdominal operation for evacuation of the uterus due to nephritic toxaemia at six months pregnancy, seen ante-natally for the first time two days before.

The others were due to:-

3. Infection following self-induced miscarriage (Colwyn Bay case at Ruthin Hospital).

4. Obstetric shock following delivery of twins-toxaemia

(Denbigh Infirmary).

5. Infection following criminal abortion (War Memorial

Hospital).

6. Pulmonary Embolus with nephritic toxaemia who refused to have the pregnancy terminated (Colwyn Bay).

7. Cerebral Embolus following femoral thrombosis

(died at home in Wrexham).

(f) Hospital Accommodation.

Whilst the County Maternity Hospital will have to wait until after the war, the policy of admitting some County cases to Gerwyn Hall has been a step forward. Otherwise the accommodation now available for post-natal and gynae-cological cases at the Wrexham Emergency Hospital and the Wrexham War Memorial Hospital has been a great help. At the latter, 151 operations were carried out, 51 being repair operations for injury incurred during child-birth, 16 were women operated on for sterility, 5 were pregnant, 3 were extra-uterine emergencies and 15 were incomplete miscarriage cases.

At the Emergency Hospital, not only gynaecological cases are seen, usually women in the services or factory workers, but also some ante-natal cases. The old difficulty of where to deal with miscarriages has been considerably eased by the beds available at these two hospitals, whereas the problem of infected miscarriages remains. The ideal method would be cubicle isolation as for infectious fever cases.



REPORT OF J. H. WYNNE, COUNTY VETERINARY OFFICER FOR THE YEAR 1942.

DISEASES OF ANIMALS ACTS AND ORDERS.

The Quarterly Reports of the Divisional Veterinary Inspector, Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, show the total number of confirmed cases to be:—

Anthrax	1
Sheep Scab	- 22
Tuberculosis	103

No Swine Fever, no Parasitic Mange (Scabies), no Foot and Mouth Disease, and only 1 of Anthrax is a very desirable record, while Sheep Scab has diminished from 30 outbreaks confirmed in 1941. Tuberculosis has increased by 10 cases from 93 dealt with in 1941.

MILK AND DAIRIES ACTS AND ORDERS.

During the year 38 "Tuberculin Tested" licences and 446 "Accredited" licences were issued under the Milk (Special Designations) Orders.

CLINICAL INSPECTION.

(a) Tuberculin Tested Herds are clinically examined every 6 months in addition to the testing with tuberculin.

There were 63 herd inspections involving 2473 animals, none of which had to be dealt with under the Tuberculosis Order.

- (b) Accredited Herds. Clinically examined every 3 months; 40,448 examinations were conducted resulting in the detection and slaughter of 42 cows under the Tuberculosis Order.
- (c) Non-designated Herds. Clinically examined every 6 months in Denbighshire, the only North Wales County where these herds are periodically examined.

25,695 examinations resulted in the detection of 21 cattle affected with Tuberculosis, and these were slaughtered under the Order.

The 60 herds involved include 50 that were supplying milk to a Milk Collecting Depot (Creamery) in this County (with about 210 herds from other Counties).

The County Medical Officer of Health received complaints from two County Boroughs that milk sent by the Creamery to their Boroughs contained living Tubercle Bacilli, and there was a second report from one of the Medical Officers of Health some time later; Dr. Arwel Thomas decided to send for biological examination a sample of milk from each of the Denbighshire herds contributing to the bulk collected by the Depot involved, and of the 50 samples 7 were certified to be positive.

Although veterinary investigation only resulted in one case of tuberculosis of the udder being found, on two other farms cows had been slaughtered under the Tuberculosis Order subsequent to the taking of the original samples, but prior to the tuberculous milk investigation.
