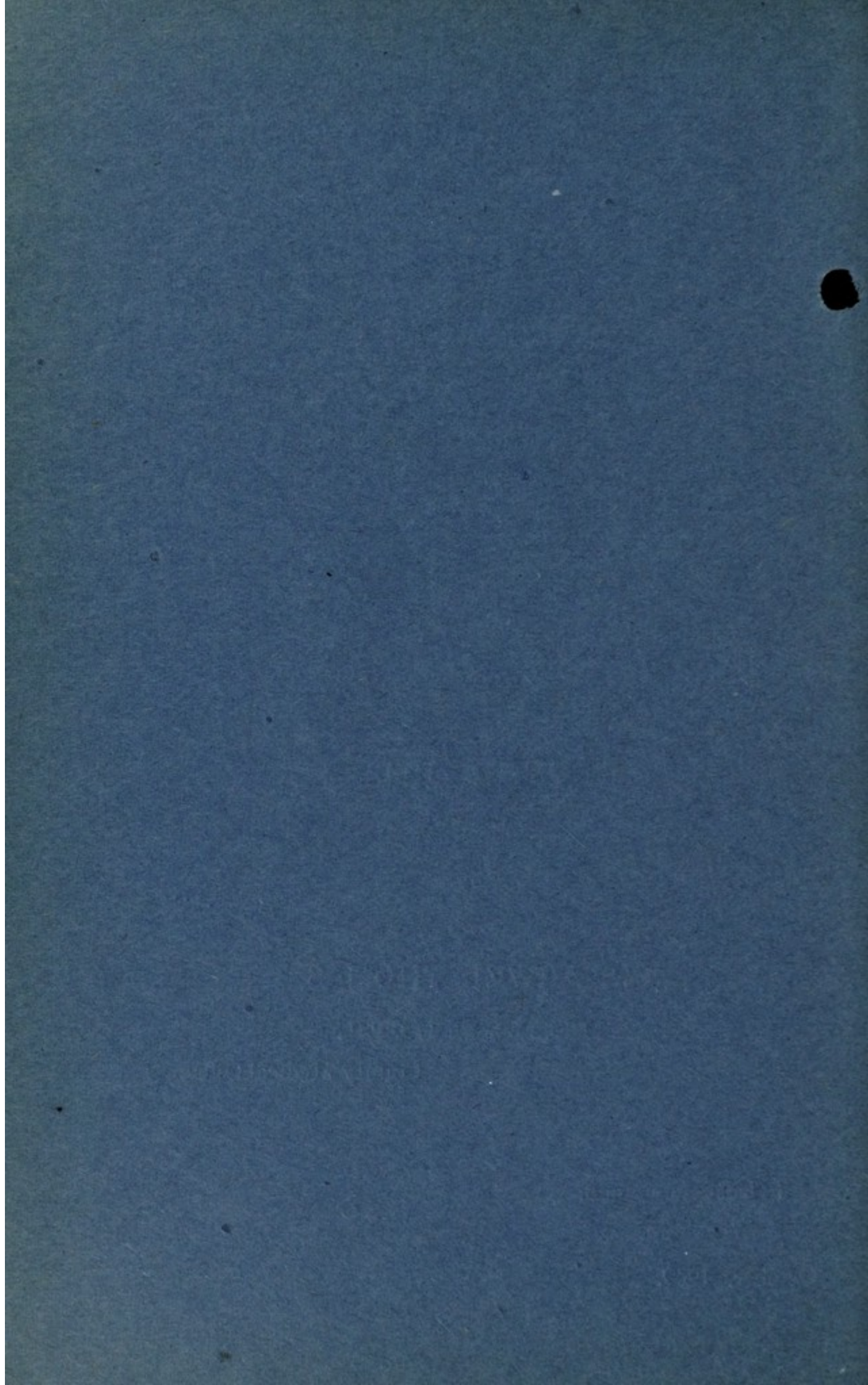

PREFACE.

To the Chairman and Members of the County Health Committee.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour of presenting my Annual Report for the year 1948.

Once again it is a pleasure to announce yet a lower Infant Mortality Rate than last year, which was the lowest on record. The rate for 1948 was 38.2 as compared with 43.4 in 1947 and 39.0 for the same year in England and Wales.

The position in regard to Diphtheria Immunisation is satisfactory. There were no deaths in the County during the year 1948 from Diphtheria and the notifications were the lowest on record, being 8 compared with 25 in the previous year.

It is gratifying to state that there is a decrease in the Maternal Mortality. During the year there were three deaths from Puerperal causes and no deaths from Puerperal Sepsis. The Mortality Rate was 0.9 per 1000 births, being the lowest figure on record. The next lowest rate was in 1944 when the number of deaths was 3 and the mortality rate was 1.0 per 1000. Last year the mortality rate was 1.4 and the deaths 4.

The National Health Service Act, 1946, came into operation on July 5th, 1948, and the report for the year therefore deals with the Health Services for six months prior and six months subsequent to the appointed day.

On July 5th, 1948, all District Nurse Midwives and District Nurses in the employ of the County and District Nursing Associations were transferred to the staff of the County Health Department. My sincerest thanks are due to Mrs. C. Lloyd, Secretary of the County Nursing Association, and to the Secretaries of the Local District Associations for their helpful co-operation.

I have to thank the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their assistance and interest taken in all aspects of the work of the Health Department. My thanks are also due to the Clerk of the County Council and members of his Department for able assistance rendered so willingly at all times.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the efficient manner in which the members of my staff—Medical, Dental, Nursing and Clerical—have carried out their work during the year.

Heart Disease.

Heart Disease constitutes the principal cause of death. 569 deaths were recorded in 1948 as compared with 614 in 1947, this being a percentage of 28.1 of the total deaths from all causes, and equivalent to a death rate of 3.3 per thousand of the estimated population.

Of this figure of 569 total deaths due to heart disease, 466 or 81.8% occurred amongst persons of 65 years or over.

Maternal Mortality.

3 maternal deaths occurred in the County during the year as compared with 5 in the preceding year. This gives a maternal mortality rate of 0.9 per thousand (live and stillbirths).

Each maternal death is investigated by the County Obstetric Officer, Superintendent Nursing Officer and Health Visitors; confidential reports on the circumstances of each death being forwarded to the Ministry of Health.

Infant Mortality.

The infant mortality rate for 1948 was 38.2 per 1000 live births as compared with 43.4 in 1947, a reduction of 5.2 per 1000. The rate for England and Wales was 39.0.

The chief causes of the deaths of infants continue to be "prematurity" and the group known as "congenital malformation, birth injury."

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

Scarlet Fever.

273 cases of Scarlet Fever were notified in the County during the year, as compared with 149 in the previous year. The largest outbreaks occurred in Wrexham Rural (135 cases), Wrexham Borough (53 cases) and Colwyn Bay (30 cases).

Whooping Cough.

Cases of Whooping Cough notified during the year numbered 906, as compared with 259 cases in 1947. Two deaths only were registered (Wrexham Rural).

Measles (excluding German Measles).

There were 1537 notifications of measles during 1948 as compared with 1317 in the year 1947.

Diphtheria.

8 cases only of Diphtheria were notified during the year, as compared with 25 in the preceding year.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION

(National Health Service Act, 1946) (Section 26)

Parents are given the alternative of the immunisation of their children being undertaken by the family doctor or by one of the Authority's Assistant County Medical Officers. In the former case the parents' consent, obtained by the County Medical Officer, is forwarded to the Medical Practitioner who is asked to send particulars to the County Health Department on a prescribed form after immunisation has been completed. The majority of parents prefer having their children immunised at the Welfare Centres and School Clinics or School premises by the Assistant Medical Officer.

Between the period 5th July, 1948, and December 31st, 1948, 2313 were immunised by the Authority's Medical Officers and 174 by general practitioners.

CARE OF MOTHERS AND YOUNG CHILDREN (Section 22).

Ante-Natal Clinics.

There are 11 Ante-Natal Clinics established at convenient centres in the County. These are attended by the County Obstetrician, Resident Medical Officer at Trevalyn Maternity Hospital and Assistant County Medical Officers. The County Obstetrician and the Resident Medical Officer are, since 5th July, 1948, in the joint service of the Regional Hospital Board and Local Health Authority. The arrangements are found to be working very satisfactorily, and because of these dual appointments the admission of mothers to Maternity Hospitals and to maternity beds in hospitals in the area has raised no difficulty.

Post-Natal Clinics.

Post-Natal cases are usually seen at the Ante-Natal Clinics but in Wrexham, where the number is large, a separate Post-Natal Clinic has been established. This is held weekly.

Young Children.

The Health Visitor is supplied with particulars of notifications of births in her area and all infants are visited as

soon as possible after the 14th day after birth. These visits are continued at regular intervals until the child attains the age of 5 years or attends school.

Dental Treatment.

The dental treatment of expectant and nursing mothers together with the treatment of children under 5 years of age is undertaken by the Senior and Assistant Dental Officers who also undertake the treatment of school children. It is proposed to employ one full-time dentist and one dentist (half-time) for maternity and child welfare work but this has not been possible so far owing to lack of staff. The time devoted to the work has been equivalent to 7/10ths time of a whole-time officer. There are three vacancies for dental officers in the County and no response has been received to advertisements in professional and lay press.

Care of Unmarried Mothers.

Unmarried mothers and/or their children are admitted to suitable homes outside the County by arrangement with the St. Asaph Diocesan Association. During the year 2 mothers were sent to homes under these arrangements, the County Council undertaking the cost of maintenance.

Conference of representatives of the North Wales Counties have met to discuss the question of establishing a hostel for unmarried mothers in North Wales, and it has been decided to open Bersham Hall for the purpose.

2159 cases were examined at the various Clinics.

A separate weekly post-natal clinic is now held at Wrexham.

Trevalyn Manor Maternity Hospital.

There were 1009 admissions in the year.

The maximum number of admissions in a month was 92 (in May).

Maternal Deaths.

There were three maternal deaths, one from Gresford, one from Cwmpennaner and one from Rhos.

The causes were:—

- (1) General septicaemia from a septic throat, followed by birth of twins.
- (2) Ante - partum haemorrhage which required Caesarean hysterectomy.
- (3) Post-partum haemorrhage.

One of the changes following the National Health Service Act is that doctors are to ante-natally examine their own cases. It was, therefore, anticipated that there would be a considerable reduction in clinic attendances. The attendances have not, however, gone down.

REPORT OF SENIOR DENTAL OFFICER.

Dear Dr. Thomas,

I have pleasure in submitting for your consideration my report on the work of dental treatment for Expectant and Nursing Mothers during the year 1948.

Clinics have been held at Wrexham, Ruthin, Denbigh, Cefn, Rhos, Chirk, Llangollen and Llanrwst.

The premises at Cefn have been decorated and an electric engine, pump chair and fountain spittoon installed. Rhos, Denbigh and Colwyn Bay Clinics have also been equipped with pump chair, electric engine and fountain spittoon. Arrangements have been made to decorate Rhos and Denbigh Clinics.

Owing to the shortage of staff it has not been possible to inspect every expectant mother following her first attendance at the Ante-Natal Clinic.

Three-hundred sessions were devoted to this work or 7/10ths of the time of a dental officer.

The number of extractions (2,345) is high and is an average of 8 extractions in respect of each patient receiving dental treatment.

It is gratifying to see a considerable increase in the number of teeth filled. 140 fillings were inserted against 29 during the previous year.

39 children under five years of age were inspected and 22 were made dentally fit.

HEALTH VISITING SERVICE

(Section 24).

Health Visiting in the County is carried out by 13 whole-time Health Visitors. With the exception of 2, they all act also as School Nurses. Each Health Visitor is responsible for all Health Visiting in her area. She visits the homes of all infants as soon as possible after 14 days after birth; attends and assists the Assistant County Medical Officers at the Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics and also attends at Antenatal Clinics. Since July 5th, 1948, she has additional duties in giving advice as to the care of persons suffering from illness and also giving advice as to measures necessary to prevent the spread of infection.

All Health Visitors working in rural and semi-rural areas possess a car.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

(Section 27).

Prior to the 5th July, 1948, most of the Ambulance Services in the County were provided by voluntary organisations. Since that date the Service has been run on an agency basis, the County Council becoming responsible for all costs including depreciation of the vehicles.

It is proposed to come to some agreement with the Welsh Home Service Ambulance Committee whereby the Committee become responsible on full agency basis for all Ambulances in the County, with the exception of the Colwyn Bay and District Voluntary Motor Ambulance Corps. A separate agreement will be made with the latter on the lines of the agreement with the Welsh Home Service Ambulance Committee.

It will be seen from the above figures that the cost of the Sitting Case Car Service is rapidly increasing month by month, and consideration will have to be given, if this persists, to the question whether the cost could be reduced by the County possessing its own sitting-case cars for the Service.

It is to be pointed out that Wrexham is a busy hospital centre and caters for patients outside the County boundary. The North Wales Sanatorium, Llangwyfan, and the Denbigh Hospital for Mental and Nervous Diseases are also situated in the County and take in patients from the six North Wales Counties. It is the responsibility of the Local Health Authority in whose area the hospitals are situated to convey patients to their homes, if they are not capable of travelling by public conveyance.

Use is made of the Volunteer Car Pool Service which has been organised in certain parts of the County.

PREVENTION OF ILLNESS, CARE AND AFTER-CARE (Section 28).

It is proposed under this Section that the day to day administration of the service for the prevention of illness, care and after-care of sick persons, be administered through District Committees. These committees have not so far been formed.

Tuberculosis.

A Chest Physician is employed as Joint Officer of the Regional Hospital Board and the Local Health Authority. All suspected Pulmonary Tuberculous children found in schools and all contacts are referred to the Physician for examination and report. It is regretted that no response has been received to advertisements for two whole-time Tuberculosis Health Visitors. Visits to the homes of patients have now to be made by the Health Visitors.

Provision of Nursing Equipment.

The Local Health Authority has made arrangements with the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John for the supply and loan of equipment from their Depots situated in various centres in the County. The Local Health Authority will become responsible for replacements or any additions required at the respective depots. The charges made to the patients will be the same as the charges made prior to July 5th, 1948, by the Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John.

DOMESTIC HELP

(Section 29).

Previous to 5th July, 1948, the County Council delegated the work in connection with the Home Help Scheme to the County Nursing Association. Subsequently the County Council have directly employed 12 Domestic Helps. 6 of these were employed full-time and 6 part-time.

All applicants for service as Domestic Helps are interviewed by the Superintendent Health Visitor, and if found suitable, their names, with particulars, are entered in the County Register. The arrangements for placing Home Helps in homes where their service will be of greatest benefit takes an appreciable proportion of the Superintendent's time and consideration should be given to the appointment of a Domestic Help Organiser.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE.

The Health Committee constitutes a Mental Health Subcommittee which meets quarterly immediately after the meeting of the Health Committee.

Staff.

The County Medical Officer, Deputy County Medical Officer, and all Assistant County Medical Officers undertake the ascertainment of Mental Defectives in the community. All have attended a special Course in Mental Welfare and have been approved for the purpose of examination and ascertainment of defectives with the exception of Dr. Jones Roberts who, however, has attended the Course but approval of the Ministry has not yet been sought in her case.

The Child Guidance Clinic in the County is staffed by a Psychiatrist, Psychologist and Social Welfare Worker, all of whom are attached to the North Wales Hospital for Mental and Nervous Diseases. The Psychiatrist and his staff are also available for consultation in cases of mental ill-health and mental defect.

Persons suffering from mental ill-health are usually referred to the Out-patient Department of the Wrexham Emergency Hospital, where the Psychiatrist holds a weekly out-patient session.

Five part-time Duly Authorised Officers have been appointed. These Officers were, previously to July, 1948, acting as Relieving Officers and, as such, dealt with cases under the Lunacy Act. These Officers now, however, deal with all persons suffering from mental ill-health, including those coming under the Mental Deficiency Acts and also Mental Treatment Act, and every assistance is given them by the Assistant County Medical Officers. The Senior Duly Authorised Officer also acts as Petitioning Officer. The Duly Authorised Officers also act as Mental Social Workers and for the proper understanding and performance of such duties they should attend a special course for Social Workers which is arranged from time to time.

The supervision of patients on trial or on licence from Mental Hospitals and Institutions for mental defectives is undertaken by the Duly Authorised Officers and the Mental Social Workers on the staff of the Denbigh Hospital for Mental and Nervous Diseases.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WORK OF THE NORTH
WALES SOCIETY FOR THE BLIND IN THE COUNTY
OF DENBIGH FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st MARCH,
1949.**

The Society employs three full-time and two part-time Certificated Home Teachers in the County, and at March 31st, 1949, they were responsible to the Society for the care and welfare of 423 Registered Blind Persons. The duties of the Home Teachers include regular and systematic visits, additional visits in urgent and special cases, those in need of hospital treatment, etc., seed potatoes for enthusiastic gardeners and allotment holders. The Home Teachers also include, where necessary, the teaching of Braille and Moon and Pastime occupations.

The Society's Necessitous Grants Committee dealt with 80 applications, submitted by the Home Teachers on behalf of the Blind, all the applications were sanctioned, the total cost amounting to £102, which was paid out of the Society's General Charity Fund. In addition to this sum, the cost of providing White Sticks; Library Books; Equipment and Materials for Home Workers was also borne by the Society. The cost of postage on Library Books both to and from the Blind Person is borne by the Society. Motor Tours were organised, the expenses amounting to £106 being paid by the Society.

The Social Centre at Wrexham continues to give good service weekly to the blind persons in that area. Social Teas, Games, Lectures, etc., are provided free, the whole cost of running this centre is borne by the Society. Another Social Centre has been opened at Colwyn Bay, this is also proving a boon to the blind. Both centres are supervised by a voluntary committee of ladies and gentlemen, the Home Teachers concerned render every possible assistance which ensures the success of these two centres. Motor Tours for the blind are also organised in Wrexham and District, also for the residents at the Llys Onnen Home for the Blind of Abergele and Colwyn Bay.

The Llys Onnen Home continues to function very satisfactorily, the accommodation is fully booked for 8 months of the year, the largest number of holiday residents are from Denbighshire. The Llys Onnen Sub-Committee meets monthly at the Home, and owing to the interest taken by this Committee the blind are assured of a warm welcome and their needs are immediately dealt with.

Electric and Battery Wireless Sets are issued free through the generosity of the British "Wireless for the Blind" Fund. The cost of repairs and replacements such as Batteries and Accumulators is borne by the Society.

A Christmas Gift of 12/6 was presented to each Blind Person in the County; this gift is made possible from the collections made at the various schools of three North Wales Counties. All expenses—printing envelopes and list of previous subscriptions and postages are borne by the Society.

The Agreement made between the Society, the National Institute for the Blind and the National Library for the Blind continues to work amicably and to the benefit of the Society.

The payments of Domiciliary Assistance ceased on July 3rd, 1948, and was taken over by the National Assistance Board. During the three months April 1st to July 3rd, 1949, the sum of £47 was expended in Sick Grants.

The Crosville Motor Services Ltd. issue Bus Vouchers to a large number of Blind Persons in the County. The cost of the Vouchers is 2/6 each and is a boon to the Blind.

There are 4 Permanent Residents from the County at Llys Onnen.

In Denbighshire there are 8 Home Workers, 60 Pastime Workers and 12 in Open Industry.

As will be observed from the above Table, 47 retail, 1 “on delivery,” and 7 “in transit” samples of milk were certified by the Public Analyst as being not genuine by reason of their failure to attain the standard of fat, or of solids-not-fat prescribed by the Sale of Milk Regulations. The 47 retail samples described as “not genuine” comprised 40 in which the deficiency involved was too slight to justify drastic action, but in several instances advice was tendered, and a caution was administered where requisite. Three retail samples were eliminated by “appeal-to-cow” samples, and the remaining four were the subject of prosecutions. One informal sample of milk taken “on delivery” was found to contain added water, and an attempt to obtain a formal “follow up” sample from the same source was frustrated, the vendor apparently having emptied the contents of the churn down the side of a field upon our approach. The 7 “not genuine” samples taken “in transit” included 2 which were deficient in fat, and 5 containing added water, and two producers responsible were prosecuted.

In considering the above Table, I would respectfully beg to emphasise the point that the proportion of “not genuine” milk samples as shown under the various headings should not be accepted as reliable criteria of the actual state of the County milk supply, for these samples represent, in many instances, the result of concentration on certain vendors in consequence of specific complaints, suspicious circumstances, or other information, a course which must, of necessity, distort the normal position.

In addition to the above-mentioned samples of milk submitted to the Public Analyst, 92 informal samples of milk were tested at the Wrexham and Colwyn Bay Offices, on behalf of farmers and dairymen, and also for preliminary information.

The milk supplied to the Children's Homes, County Welfare Establishments, Schools and certain Hospitals in the County was also periodically examined.

Samples of food, other than milk, which were certified as "not genuine" comprised:—

An informal sample of Sweetening Tablets consisting of Saccharin and Dulcin certified as being "not genuine" by reason of the proportions of these ingredients being incorrectly marked on the container.

A Fancy Bun received with a complaint from the private purchaser was found to contain Paraffin Wax, but two official samples of this commodity, obtained from the same source, proved to be genuine.

An informal sample of Apple and Strawberry Jam was 0.9 per cent. deficient in Soluble Solids.

All other samples were certified by the Public Analyst as being genuine and free from all prohibited preservatives and colouring matter.

I again have pleasure in recording my indebtedness to the Clerk of the Council for his learned advice and advocacy, services always generously placed at my disposal throughout the year.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COUNTY SANITARY
INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER,
1948.**

I herewith submit the Annual Report on the administration of the Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1936-46 in the County.

Tuberculin Tested Milk.

The number of Licences issued to produce Tuberculin Tested Milk during the year was 356, this being an increase of 46 on the previous year. The percentage increase may be considered as fairly satisfactory, but having regard to the total number of registered milk producers in the County, which is 3,440, greater progress was expected. Much pioneer and educational work has been done in creating a public demand for milk produced from a Tuberculin Tested Herd, and in getting milk Producers to qualify for Licences. I must pay here tribute to the Sanitary Officers of the Local Authorities, the Veterinary Officers and the National Agricultural Advisory Service who, as a team, has given great assistance in this important work. With the impending changes that are to take place in the supervision and control of milk production in the country it is hoped that this co-operation will continue. I am certain that the number of Tuberculin Tested Milk Producers in the County will increase far more rapidly in the near future. Many non-designated milk producers are applying for advice on the reconstruction and adaptation of their premises and good progress is being made in the clean up of dairy herds.

There is, however, much advisory work to be done in improving the methods of milk production. That is from the time the milk leaves the cow until it is offered for sale to the public.

The milking machines are fast becoming part of the standard equipment in dairy farms, which as an economic factor, has many advantages. It has, however, been my experience that the lack of proper attention in the cleaning and sterilisation of the machine has been the cause of unsatisfactory results on milk tests. Although the County Council

insist that a Steam Steriliser is installed before a Tuberculin Tested Licence is granted, I am afraid the regular use is not made of this valuable equipment by many producers.

Accredited Milk.

The number of Accredited Milk Licences issued during the year was 431, this being 19 less than the previous year. The decrease was due to a number having been able to take out a Licence to produce Tuberculin Tested milk.

Pasteurised Milk.

Regular samples are taken from the pasteurising establishments in the County for Methylene Blue and Phosphates tests. The results of the tests proved satisfactory.
