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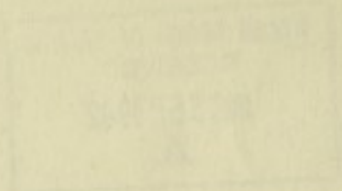

Mr. Chairman, Mrs. Davies and Gentlemen,

It is my privilege to present to you the Annual Report upon the sanitary conditions of your District during 1941.

The Dolgelley Rural District consists of 13 parishes and has an area of 150,128 acres.

The rateable value at the same date was £21,882 and the sum represented by a penny rate was £86. 13.4.

Provisions of Health Services of the Area

1. 1 H.O.H. (Part-time); 1 Sanitary Inspector (Certificated) Full-time in conjunction with Dolgelley Urban District Council.

2. Ambulance Services.

The ambulance service is controlled by a joint Committee of the Dolgelley Urban and Rural Districts and the Barnmouth Urban District Council. An Ambulance Van to serve the three areas is stationed at Dolgelley.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area

The district as a whole is well served in respect of water supplies.

Drainage and Sewerage.

These services have been satisfactorily maintained during the year.

3. Rivers and Streams.

River and stream pollution is confined to careless individuals who use them for the disposal of house refuse. Warning notices have been erected where necessary to prevent this objectionable habit but it is not easy to abolish the habit.

INSPECTION and SUPERVISION of FOOD.

There are licensed by the County Council, 7 producers of Tuberculin Tested (Certified) milk within the district. This milk is the genuine article produced under ideal conditions. It is high time the public realised the full value of milk as a food, and appreciated the necessity of having this important article of diet in as wholesome and uncontaminated condition as possible. I sincerely hope that the number of T.T. producers will increase yearly and that soon the public will refuse to consume only some form of graded milk. Samples of T.T. milk are sent once a month to Aberystwyth for analysis on behalf of the County Council, and the results have been satisfactory.

The cowsheds and dairies are periodically inspected. The dairies on the whole are kept clean and are periodically linewashed. In some cases there is a genuine need for improvement in the structural condition of the cowsheds, and in the sanitary conditions of the surroundings. Grooming of the cow is not carried out in the small farms. The milkers on the whole are clean in their person, but washable smocks are not so generally used as they should be.

MEAT.

No animals are slaughtered for human consumption in the Rural Area. The slaughtering is now carried out at the abattoir situated in the Urban District Area.

BAKEHOUSES

All these are very small and are periodically inspected. They are kept clean, and are lime-washed at intervals. In the case of bread, like meat, the great bulk of it is brought in Vans from the adjoining districts. There are no underground bakehouses.

CHEMICAL and BACTERIOLOGICAL EXAMINATION of FOOD.

This work is carried out for this Authority at the Public Health Laboratories, Aberystwyth, both for water and milk.

WORKSHOPS and WORKPLACES.

These are few in number and are very small. They are occupied for the most part by the owner. Their sanitary conditions are on the whole satisfactorily.

SCHOOLS.

The supervision of the Schools is carried out in close co-operation with the School Medical Officer, who is also the County Medical Officer of Health.

No Schools were closed during the past year.
