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
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

It is my previlege to present the annual report upon the Sanitary conditions of your area for the year ended 31st December, 1941.

Public Health Services.

1 M.O.H (part-time); 1 Sanitary Inspector (certificated); Full time in conjunction with Dolgelley Rural District.

Nursing in the Home.

There has been no change in the arrangements for (a) general nursing; (b) nursing of cases of infectious diseases.

Water Supply.

Water is supplied by a private company. Samples were taken and the results of the analysis were satisfactory; excepting periods of shortage—interference with the mains and the plumbo solvent nature of the water.

Drainage and Sewerage.

The condition of the sewers during the year has been good. During the greater part of the year an enormous volume of water from the surrounding mountains is turned into them,

and they are thus effectively flushed.

I would again call the serious condition of the Local Authority to the objectionable method of disposing of the sewerage of the district by discharging it in a crude state to the river Wnion.

Rivers and Streams.

There was no polution of rivers and streams during the past year in this area beyond that produced by few careless inhabitants who throw small quantities of some kind of waste material or rubbish in them at times. There is no excuse for this as the district is systematically scavenged three times every week. There are no large industries in the disrict to produce any material polution.

Closet Accommodation.

The great majority of the houses have separate water closets with proper flushing apparatus-

The dry closets are on the outskirts of the town, and their contents are disposed of in the gardens.

Public Cleansing.

Scavenging is done by contract, and the house refuse is collected three times a week by a motor lorry during the morning.

I have repeatedly called the attention of this Authority to

the need of a cover for the lorry when in use.

The receptacles used by some of the inhabitants for storing the refuse at night outside their dwellings are altogether unsatisfactory. The old boxes, pails, hampers etc., at present seen in use are most objectionable. These receptacles should be made of galvanised iron with well fitting metallic covers to insure protection from the sun and air. A satisfactory solution of this problem will not be reached until the Local Authority provides and maintains standard ash-bins in place of the boxes, pails etc., in common use.

The refuse is taken to a place about a mile outside the town along the Talyllyn Road, and tipped on the edge of the main road.

There is still an attempt being made at controlled

dumping, but the side of the dip sloping down to the river is still uncovered. The stench at times is objectionable and during windy weather dust and the lighter articles are scattered around. The situation of the refuse heap on the road-side, along which hosts of tourists and visitors travel, is bad advertisement for the town.

Shops.

There was no action necessary during the year under the provisions of the Shops Act, 1934, relating to ventilation and temperature of shops and to sanitary conveniences.

Smoke Abatement.

There is no nuisance from smoke in this district, and no action was needed.

Eradication of Bed Bugs.

No action was necessary during the past year.

Swimming Baths and Pools-

There are no public or privately owned swimming baths or pools open to the public.

Camping Sites.

There are about three sites (in this area) used for camping purposes on a small scale. No licenses have been issued in respect of these sites.

Schools.

The co-operation of the School Medical Officer is always secured in dealing with any matters pertaining to the Schools, and the Scholars.

The Dolgelley Infants School was closed during the year owing to the prevalence of measles.

HOUSING.

The thirty new houses erected by the Council on the Ardd Fawr site have proved very satisfactory, and it is to be hoped that as soon as hostilities cease the Council will proceed to complete their housing scheme by erecting a further thirty houses, room for which is available on this site.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Milk Supply.

Very little milk is produced within the area, and the bulk of it is imported from the immediate neighbourhood. The cowsheds and dairies are periodically inspected. There is need for structural improvement in some of the cowsheds. The dairies, and cowcheds are kept clean and are periodically limewashed.

No acton was taken by this Authority during the Year in regard to tuberculous milk or cattle.

There are four producers of Tuberculin Tested (Certified) Milk, who supply this area.

Meat.

All the slaughtering is now carried out at the abattoir situated in the Town.

Bakehouses.

These were inspected, and found to be clean and periodically lime-washed.
