TO THE DOLGELLEY URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mr. Chairman, Mrs. Rees & Gentlemen,

It is my privilege to present the Annual Report upon the Sanitary conditions of your Area for the year ended 31st December, 1944.

The resident population of the Urban Area for the year 1944 is estimated by the Registrar-General to be 2,440.

The number of inhabited houses at the end of 1944 accor-

PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES.

1 M.O.H. (part-time); 1 Sanitary Inspector (Certificated). Full-time in conjunction with Dolgelley Rural District.

AMBULANCE SERVICE.

The Ambulance Service is controlled by a joint committee of the Dolgelley Urban and Rural Districts and the Barmouth Urban District Council. An ambulance to serve the

three areas is stationed at Dolgelley.

During the war the Red Cross Ambulance Service was very active in the district, and I should like to take this opportunity of testifying to their efficiency at all times of day and night. It is hoped that the personel of the Red Cross Service will continue to give service as voluntary attendants with the ambulance of the Local Authority. Also an endeavour is being made to get a rota of first-aid men to act as stretcher-bearers when required.

WATER.

Water is supplied by a private company. I again emphasise the importance that such an essential commodity as water should be vested in the hands of the Local Authority.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The condition of the sewers during the year has been good. During the greater part of the year an enormous volume of water from the surrounding mountains is turned into them, and they are thus effectively flushed.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

There was no pollution of rivers and streams during the past year in this area beyond that produced by a few careless inhabitants who throw small quantities of some kind of waste material or rubbish in them at times. There is no excuse for this as the district is systematically scavenged three times every week. There are no large industries in the district to produce any material pollution.

CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.

The great majority of the houses have separate water closets, with proper flushing apparatus.

The dry closets are on the outskirts of the town, and their contents are disposed of in the gardens.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Scavenging is done by contract, and the house refuse is collected three times a week by a motor lorry during the morning.

I have repeatedly called the attention of this Authority

to the need of a cover for the lorry when in use.

The receptacles used by some of the inhabitants are altogether unsatisfactory. The old boxes, hampers, pails, etc., at present seen in use, are most objectionable. These receptacles should be made of galvanised iron with well-fitting metallic covers to insure protection from the sun and air. A satisfactory solution to this problem will not be reached until the Local Authority provides and maintains standard ash-bins in place of the boxes, pails, etc., in common use.

The refuse is taken to a tip provided by the Council about a mile outside town, along the Talyllyn Road. A constant endeavour is being made by the Council's staff to effect controlled tipping, but an open tip used by contractors, shop-keepers, etc., is objectionable, unsightly, and a bad advertisement to the town.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Milk Supply

Very little milk is produced within the area, and the bulk of it is imported from the immediate neighbourhood. The Cowsheds and Dairies are periodically inspected. There is need for structural improvements in some of the cowsheds. The dairies and cowsheds are kept clean and are periodically lime-washed.

No action was taken by this Authority during the year in

regard to tuberculous milk or cattle.

There are four producers of Tuberculin Tested (Certified) Milk, who supply this area.

Meat.

All the slaughtering is now carried out at the abottoir situated in the town.

Bakehouses.

These were inspected and found to be clean and periodically lime-washed.

Chemical and Bacteriological Examination of Food. There was no need of this during the past year.

Shell Fish.

There are no shell-fish or layers in this area.

There is no hospital in the County for the isolation of Infectious Diseases. The temporary isolation hospital at Colomendy, Corwen, served a very real need. Personally, I would favour a scheme whereby three or more counties joined to have an isolation hospital. Until this matures—there should certainly be a provision within the County to receive infectious cases.
